GERMANY BACK OF JOSEPH FEJERVARY

IN CRISIS OVER COALITION

HUNGARY WANTS TO SLAY

Significant Statement of Independent Leader—Former Premier Fejervary, Unable to Get Emperor to Consent to Radical Program to Defeat the Coalition Movement.

Vienna, Sept. 28.—Emperor Francis Joseph today received in audience Baron Fejervary, the former Hungarian premier, and Count Goluchowski, the Austro-Hungarian minister. The next steps of the emperor are awaited anxiously.

Baron Fejervary's audience of the emperor proved a failure, according to an Austrian authority, close to the court. The baron insisted upon a plan to defeat the Hungarian coalition by the introduction of universal suffrage, but his majesty was not willing to accept such a radical measure.

Baron Kossuth demands the union of all Hungarian parties, "for the defence" of the Hungarian constitution, and it is believed that a private meeting of deputies, which has been called for Oct. 2, the day before the great convention, may formulate plans to secure such a union.

It is learned that the position of Count Goluchowski, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, is so shaken that he will resign within a few weeks. Commanding officers of regiments in various sections of the country have refused leaves of absence, and the situation becomes clearer.

Three students with Socialist tendencies, were attacked by Nationalist students and roughly handled. Afterward, some 300 Nationalists, some of them in hospital, visited those who were injured during the rioting yesterday evening.

WITTE'S BARRACK WELCOME

THANKED FOR HIS WORK

Russia Grateful to the Man Who Ended War—A Hero Among His People.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 28.—M. Witte, the senior Russian peace plenipotentiary, returned to St. Petersburg to-day, and the enthusiastic welcome accorded by the awaiting crowds fully demonstrates the great popularity of the statesman and public appreciation of the services he has rendered his country at Portsmouth. Chief followed by the plenipotentiary alighted from the train, and when later M. Witte replied in an intensely popular strain to the address of welcome popular enthusiasm found full vent.

When he left St. Petersburg in July a small delegation of officials accompanied him to the railroad station to bid him farewell. There was no public demonstration whatever. To-day there were seven or eight times as many officials, despite the fact that the train's arrival, and an enthusiastic crowd of five or six hundred people. Among the officials present were Baron Nolde, general secretary of the committee of ministers; General Durnovo, adjutant to the minister of the interior; M. Wyszyngradski, formerly finance minister.

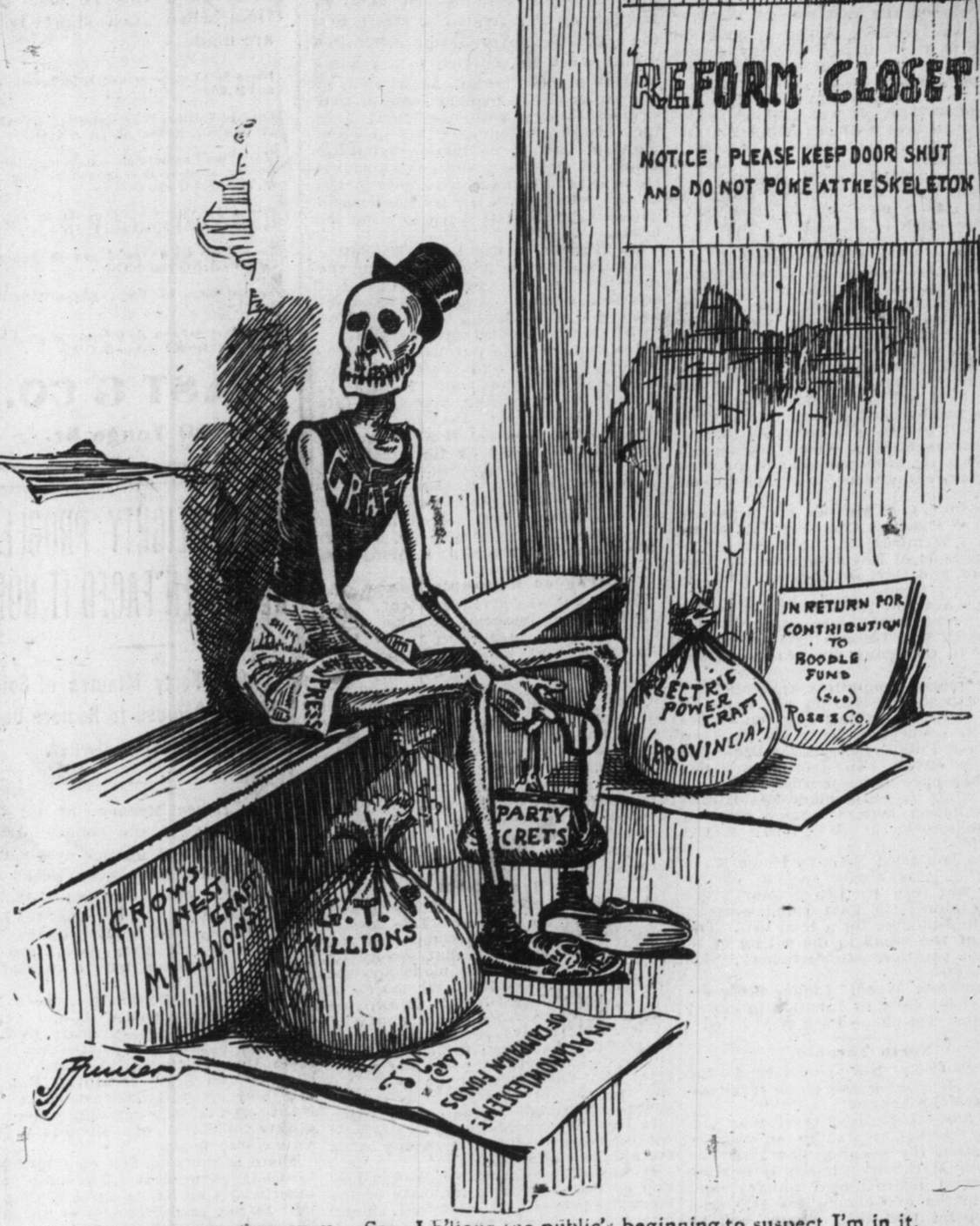
