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BUSINESS BRISK IN TORONTO

Prominent Manufacturers Tell the Welcome Tale.

The World Interviews Some of the Chief Firms in the City and Receives Reports of Busy Times and a Most Encouraging Outlook.

Small retail establishments tell how the local trade in staples stands; large manufacturing concerns give a stable index as to the nation's commerce. A World reporter went out yesterday to feel the pulse of Toronto's leading manufacturers as to the prospects for spring trade.

Wherever The World interviewer went he found a prosperous and a confident air pervading the whole establishments. The consensus of opinion is that the outlook for business and trade is better than it was a year ago; and better than it has been for years.

At the Massey-Harris Co., Hon. Lyman Jones was seen. "We are too busy to talk," was Mr. Jones' salutation. In some departments this massive company is working overtime; orders are coming in from all corners of the earth. The prospects for a tremendous season's business are brighter than ever, it is ever the mode of this company to "saw wood" and talk little.

Mr. W. F. Johnston, superintendent of the works, was sought, but he was busy overlooking the bicycle department and could not be seen. In this department more men are employed than ever, and they have no Saturday afternoon off. To say that workmen are rushed is to tell the plain, unvarnished truth. Orders from Australia and Zealand are a feature of this department.

Mr. Robert working in the Menzie, Turner & Co. Window Shade Company exhibited the new addition to his premises a sign which reads "Business is doing here. This company has, after the Massey-Harris Company, the largest floor space of any manufacturing in Toronto. The engines are run all night long. Orders are coming in that total twice as many as last year, which was a good year. This company employs twice as many hands as it did last year. "We have nothing to complain of; we are doing a splendid business; and affairs wear a prosperous aspect," said Mr. Menzie. Fifteen hundred dollars a week is spent in labor at this manufactory; "an increasing trade instills the expenditure," argued Mr. Menzie.

At the Northey Manufacturing Company, Mr. J. H. Northey, president, is confident that the business is doing well. The company has, since Jan. 20, the men used to come at 7:30 and not since March 7, the hour has been changed to 7. All departments feel the effect of incoming and increasing orders. Deep well pumps are being sent out to British Columbia in this establishment to aid in mining. Steam pumps of all kinds and hydraulic machines suitable for certain kinds of mining are being made to order. The gold mining boom is being traded along these lines. "The promise for the future is one of prosperity and brisk business," was the opinion of one of the foremen.

Mr. John O. Thors, the manager of the Metallic Roofing Company, considered the prospects for trade glowing. In his business the sales have been better times than they were this time last year. The floor space has been increased one-third, to give greater shipping facilities, in order to meet the increased demand. This company does not believe in working overtime when business demands increased production—as it does now—the number of workmen is increased. "After nine hours' steady work, increased labor does not give an increasing return," was the manager's economic statement.

Mr. John Abell greeted The World in a fatherly manner and said that from excellent and steady prospects for an exceptionally bright future. "We are running only ordinary time now, but are waiting to see which way 'the cat jumps,'" was Mr. Abell's laughing remark. This year is brighter and brisker than last year. This company is filling orders for the Northwest territories to the amount of \$50,000. A complete threshing outfit was sent out to New Westminster, B. C., last week. The full capacity of the works is being used; the workmen work ten hours a day, with overtime when necessary. "If Toronto wants large manufacturing plants here, it should give them exceptional privileges. These privileges would be paid for by the increased production that would be needed to run these establishments," said Mr. Abell in reply to The World's question concerning the building up of Toronto. "I think that union labor should have a uniform rate of wages over the whole province. But doctoring the market with \$2.40 in Toronto, \$1.75 in Hamilton and \$1.50 in Galt."

At the Bertram works they are doing a rushing business. It is difficult to get a man to stand still long enough to question him. The shipyard, the machine shop and the boiler shop are all working overtime in their efforts to fill the press of orders. More workmen by half a hundred are employed than ever before. This company is building two river boats to be used on the Klondike, besides numerous other craft to aid in the exploitation of Canada's minerals. The press of work has necessitated the stopping of the Saturday afternoon holiday. Prospects for the future never looked more rosier; there is a breath of confidence in the air. "Canada is on the eve of an era of pious prosperity," was the opinion of an intelligent workman.

The manager of the Colman Manufacturing Company looked happy as he said: "We have got the business; let the prospects take care of themselves." The outlook for trade is good. The vast influx of population into the northern mining lands will lessen the number of unemployed and make things better here in the East, was his opinion. This company is doing more work, receiving more orders and employing more hands than it ever did. The manager had not time in eight weeks when "rush" work was required, more hands were added. Additional hands were employed now.

The manager of the Gurney Foundry on King-street west expressed himself as confident in the prospects of his extensive and extending trade were excellent. The month of February this year was a better month from business point of view than was last year. Every department was working well; though not overtime. Orders were being sent in from all over Canada, and some from Europe. Monday the company got a large order from a firm in Scotland; and an inquiry had been received from Sweden.
