Fifty-Four Bodes Found.

With frantic energy the search has been conducted all day and up to 9 o'clock tonight, 54 bodies had been found, although the number of dead certainly will reach 100 or more. These have for the most part been taken to the Catholic and Congregational Churches, which, although in the very edge of the storm's path, miraculously escaped its fury. In these temporary morgues the sights are such as to touch the hardest heart, as the grief-stricken living recognize in bodies, horribly mangled and often dismembered, the remains of missing dear ones. The wounded found temporary asylums in the uninjured dwellings on either side of the path of the storm, where doctors and nurses from nearby cities and towns are doing heroic work without sleep or rest. 





ANOTHER BIG GIFT TO THE CANA-DIAN PACIFIC.

The railway policy of the present Government is Judged by an entirely different standard from that which prevailed a few years ago. At that time the notion was that of most new countries, that anybody who would build a railway was a public benefactor. It was so much better to have a railway than to be without one that the proposal to hedge a railway company about with restrictions seemed like looking a gift horse in the mouth. These companies obtained subsidies not only from the province or the Dominion, but from the municipalities through which they ran. The Canadian Pacfic Railway contract was made under this condition of public feeling. The contract was made under the idea that it was a grand achievement to get the road built on any terms, it is like one of those printed forms of leases used by a landlord with many tenants, in which the tenant binds himself to everything and the landlord to nothing. The enormous grant of money and land, the pieces of completed railway handed over to the company, the exemption from taxation, the exemption from control of freight rates, did not shock public opinion; and the Liberals, who protested against the terms, obtained little public sympathy, and notably little in the west, where the monopoly and the absolute control of the company over rates were afterwards felt to be so oppressive.

But since that time the sentiment against the unrestrained private control of railways has been growing both in Canada and in the United States. In the latter country a great mass of Federal and State legislation has been enacted. In this country the late Government was compelled to abandon its intention of making the C.P.R. monopoly apply to Manitoba. And today all contracts with railway companies are judged by a far stricter standard than that which prevailed 20 years ago. Under the old idea the railway was bound by virtually no conditions. Under the new idea, whatever conditions may be imposed on the company, the cry will be raised that they ought to have been stricter; while there is a

and Grand Trunk bills were both read a third time, and passed, after a avision, which showed a Government majority of 51, and the iron and steel bountles resolution, introduced by Mr. Fielding, was considered in committee, and debated at some length.

The passing of the Drummond County and Grand Trunk bills has eased the business of the House a good deal, and as the Redistribution bill is to be taken up tomorrow, it will be possible in the course of a few days to make some sort of estimate as to the duration of the session. It may be said, however, that the present impression is that unless the Redistribution bill is withdrawn, it will, under the most favorable conditions, be the middle of August before prorogation will be reached, and it may be much longer. If the Government postpones the Redistribution bill until next year after it has been discussed a few days, as it is said there is a possibility of its doing—as only a portion of the Government on the order paper, none of them are likely to provoke any protracted opposition. Amongst the bills of which notice has been given, is the Act respecting the City of Ottawa, of which notice was given last night, and which will be introduced to-morrow. In connection with this bill, Mr. Fielding to-night gives notice of a resolution which confirms the rumor given currency to in this correspondence to-day, to the effect that the grant, whatever it might be, would be administered by a board of commissioners to be appointed by the Government. The resolution places the grant at \$60,000 a year, for 26 years, and the city is to provide water and fire protection, and improve the streets. The number of the commissioners is not decided, but it is said there will be three, one French, one English and one Irish. It is said that the postion will be honorary, and the number of the commissioners may be five instead of three.




