





Buildings show an increase of \$457,670 for the year, being now \$5,774,585. Personal property has advanced \$29,145, being now \$142,975, and income \$3643, being now \$77.

This means a total assessment of \$10,540,245 in the Ward. The exemptions amount to \$1,760,218, an increase of \$63,800.

The population has increased by 890, being now 26,843.

In connection with these figures it may be mentioned that division No. 1 of the Ward showed an increased population of 459 and an increased population of 459 and an increase in the value of building of \$380,141. The buildings put 19 by the York County Loan & Savings Company account for \$68,600 of this. The increase of population in this section is 44 per cent, the highest in any section of the city. There are only three vacant dwellings in the entire division.


