

TORONTO'S TOTAL ASSESSMENT FOR 1901, AS COMPARED WITH THAT OF THE PREVIOUS YEAR, IS CHIEFLY IN NEW BUILDINGS.

Great Improvement Shown in Ward No. 6, Where York County Loan is Building.

The Assessment Department on Saturday issued a comparative statement for the years 1900 and 1901 of the assessment of Ward 6, as returned by the assessors. The total value of land in the ward is \$4,544,858, or an increase of \$700,000 over the year, being now \$5,774,568. Personal property has advanced \$25,448, being now \$142,475, and income \$9843, being now \$77,827.

This means a total assessment of \$10,540,391 in the ward. The exemptions amount to \$1,790,218, an increase of \$60,808. The population has increased by 800, being now 38,843.

In connection with these figures it may be mentioned that the ward No. 1 section of the ward showed an increase of population of 400 and an increase in the value of buildings of \$300,000. The buildings put up by the York County Loan & Savings Company are the largest in this section of the ward. There are only three vacant dwellings in the entire division.

The completion of the assessment of the Sixth Ward will be the work for the entire year. The following figures will be interesting as showing the present condition of values in Toronto.

FUNERAL OF PREMIER MARCHAND AT QUEBEC MOST IMPRESSIVE

Head of the Procession Had Reached the Basilica Before the End Had Left the Parliament Buildings—Imposing Decorations in the Cathedral—5,000 Present.



Quebec, Sept. 30.—(Special.)—Nothing could have been more impressive than the funeral ceremonies which preceded and attended the committal to mother earth this morning of the mortal remains of the deceased Premier Marchand. The bright weather of the last few days gave way to the gloom created by overshadowing clouds and the black drapery on the buildings, along the line of march and the sombre appearance of the thousands and thousands of people who attended the funeral will never be forgotten by those who saw them.

The procession should have been under way from the Parliament House to the Basilica at 9:30 a.m., but was much later before it could be marshalled and got ready to start. It was one of the most imposing ever witnessed in the country, the head of it having reached and entered the Basilica long before the end of it had left the Parliament Buildings.

IT IS NOW KNOWN THE PREMIER DID NOT AGREE WITH GERMANY

The Publication of the Story May Result in Great Britain's Reply Not Being Delivered in Hope That There Will Be a Compromise.

London, Sept. 30.—Judging from appearances, the British press is preparing the way for the announcement that Lord Salisbury has failed to agree to the proposals contained in the German note. The papers, which at first angrily declared that the statement made to the Associated Press was untrue, are now either silent or are taking the view that, after all, it is doubtful if it would be desirable for Great Britain to become a party to such a stringent measure.

Meanwhile, the attitude of the European powers towards China remains in the same chaotic state. The Conservative party managers would, so far as Great Britain is concerned, gladly see the policy of delay extended over the next two weeks, so that no more hands could be afforded the Liberals in their vigorous attacks upon the Government.
