ATHLETES DEMANDED EXPENSES

About Distinguished Americans Who Took a Trip to England. New York, Dec. 11.—James E. Sullivan, secretary of the A.A.U., has just received from C. Herbert, the Secretary of the Amateur Athletic Association of Great Britain, letters intimating that certain American athletes who visited England last summer had demanded and received their expenses. This act would make all offenders professionals, and the correspondence is likely to start a highly important inquiry. Secretary Herbert's letter is as follows: "It is a matter of common knowledge over here that some of the few Americans who came here after the Paris games last year and also this year, asked for and obtained expenses for competing at some of our athletic meetings. This is as you are aware, contrary to our laws. Were those men after Paris last year, on their own, as we say, or in any way under the control of their colleges or clubs? Also, this year were Kneeland, Duffy, and Fitzburg sent by their clubs, or were they simply attending on your side of the water? I have been asked by a division of our association in the North to ask you this.
