COLLIDED WITH A KNOLL IN ENDING EXPERIMENT

PETAWAWA CAMP, Aug. 2 .- (Special.)-From the aviators' standpoint, the feature of the preliminary trials of the "Silver Dart" over Petawawa common early to-day was the successful

working of the new motor. The aerodrome attained the highest speed yet made in Canada-forty miles an hour or over-and carried for the first time an additional passen-

Four flights, or hops, were made, the first three being about a half mile each and the fourth about three-quart-

Unfortunately, when making the fourth landing, the sun dazzled the aviators and the forward wheel of the aerodrome struck a knoll at an angle and the machine ricochetted and tell on its side, wrecking the wings and framework. The motor remained un-injured. The aviators received only

The trials were held before sunrise. No wind was blowing and weather conditions were perfect. J. D. Mc-Curdy, with when the "Silver Dart" has always been associated, was in the front position, in charge of the controlling apparatus, and Casey Baldwin went along as a passenger.

win went along as a passenger. The propeller was started and, under heavy pressure, the aerodrome moved swiftly forward. After traveling a short distance along the ground, until proper speed had been acquired, a slight turn in the bow control was made and the "Silver Dart" gracefully slid into the afr, moving at a uniform distance of ten feet from the ground.

How the Accident Happened,

The aerodrome made three successful flights up and down the field,

northwest to a clump of jack pines and back again to the shed, maintaining perfect balance and being under control all the time. trol all the time.

The surface of the field on which the trials took place is uneven. The ground is anything but level, and little rounded hummocks rise irregularly here and there, leaving countless small depressions, separated by tiny ridges.

One walking might notice these irre-One walking might notice these irre-gularities, but it would be difficult to do so when riding and on account of the thick scrub, almost impossible when sailing thru the air.

When the aviator is seeking a landing, the idea is to light on a crest and slide gently down the slope, but if the aim is bad and he strikes a knoll at a greater angle than on the level, the shoc kis much worse. This is just what happened to-day. On the fourth flight, McCurdy sought a landing about seventy yards from the shed, but owing to the sun, could not see the knowl. The machine was traveling eastward at a high speed and the forward wheel struck the ground heavily. The machine bounced and fell on its side fifty yards further on and about twenty yards from the shed, a shapeless mass of splinters, twisted steel

and torn silk. The loss of the "Silver Dart" is keenly felt by Baldwin and McCurdy. It was the first flying machine made in Canada and represented months of painstaking work at Baddeck. 



BRITAIN IN THE 20TH CENTURY-When the opening of the nineteenth century in Great Britain is compared with that of the twentieth it will be found they present an instructive analogy and contrast. If national conditions are bad now in many important ways they were worse then and were without the pitiless depreciating selfcriticism which is so marked to-day. England was then described as "a to exhaustion, a land without ideas, a nation without national emotions on high matters of human progress." Poverty was more severe and general than it is now and the low and oppressed state of the workers called forth passionate denunciation from the reformers of the day, whose fate was that of all men ahead of their time. For to hint that the government of the country was capable of improvement or that the masses of the people had a right to be heard on their own behalf meant prosecution, imprisonment, transportation. But all down the nineteenth century democratic ideas steadily won their way. Political emancipation was all but completely accomplished and the country passed thru a constitutional revolution without, however, weakening the fabric of the state. If the nineteenth century in Britain

saw a vast political advance the twentieth century to all appearances will be devoted to social reform. Not that this was unknown to the Victorian era. but it became operative only in particularly flagrant instances of oppression and made no effort to accomplish an organic change. But it prepared the way for the return from individualism to collectivism, which is now so clearly in evidence and coloring all departments of national life. This movement is not peculiar to Britain, but is more or less conspicuous both in the old and new world and nowhere more than in the British Australasian states. 

Three-fourths of our knowledge was learned from the testimony of others. If reason thus forced us to believe the testimony of man, the testimony of God was greater.

By fighting the fight of faith we were fighting for the rights of life, liberty and equality as found in Christlan nations, for Christian morality, for the sanctity of the home and the sta-

bility of society.

If the order were to prosper, this life must be one of constant activity.

If we loved God and our neighbor we ould make sacrifices for them.
