NO CONSIDERATION FOR PARLIAMENTS

TO OPPOSE THE PARENT GOVERNMENT

CONCERNING QUEBEC

Startling Announcement Made at Meeting of Recognized Party Leaders Held in Jacques Cartier Club on Sunday—Leader Flynn Issues a Sensational Manifesto.

Montreal, Nov. 6.—(Special.)—There will be no Conservative candidates placed in the field at the coming provincial elections in the Province of Quebec. This rather startling announcement was made at the close of a meeting of the recognized party leaders from Montreal, Quebec and Three Rivers, which was held here today in the Jacques Cartier Club. The advisability of the recognized opposition nominating candidates at the local elections has been discussed both here and in Quebec for some days past, and a negative decision was reached at noon.

Hon. S. J. Flynn, leader of the party in the legislature, presided, and the matter was discussed in all its bearings by Hon. Mr. Leblanc and a few other members of the party. It was held that the party should put up a fight, the majority, perhaps wisely, ruled that as Premier Parent was playing with loaded dice a contest was quite impossible. Things in fact have reached such a pass that there is no hope of no public opinion other amongst the English or the French electors in Quebec.

The local government is simply the donkey engine of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and people ask with a good deal of reason why should they be asked to support the battle over again? As things go now at Quebec responsible government is a farce and a sham. Papers tender Sir Louis Jetté for giving the premier a dissolution without allowing the people to discuss the questions of the day. Mr. Leblanc holds, however, that it was such a farce that he called the Conservative party in France, and that the same results will follow here in the Province of Quebec.

Issue a Manifesto. A committee was named to prepare a manifesto to the people of the Province of Quebec setting forth the reasons for such a decision. Consequently the Liberal will be down as this manifesto. Already Alderman Walsh, supported by Ald. Galtier, Mr. Flynn, Hon. Mr. D. G. J. Flynn, Mr. A. J. A. and a bitter fight is expected. Hon. The opposition believes, therefore, that the interests of the province will be best served and the dignity of our institutions more successfully safeguarded by protesting against this act of the administration and in abstaining from taking part in the fight. The provincial government has created the situation, this abnormal, this extraordinary, this perilous situation, consequently let it alone bear the responsibility. Once before, in 1900, it committed a similar outrage, and the opposition at that time wrongly contended it.

JAPANESE GOVT. KUDEN FOR USE AS WINTER BASE AND FOR GOOD EFFECT

Military activity in the vicinity of the Shkobe River is limited to the extension and strengthening of outposts. There are indications that the Japanese have not given up the plan of seeking to force Gen. Kurapatkin into another general engagement, altho in military circles at St. Petersburg the belief is expressed that there will be no other big battle in the campaign this year.

JAPS WANT MUKDEN. Mukden, Nov. 6.—Quiet continues here. The Japanese are still working hard entrenching their front, which begins to look like a continuous front. It is believed they are preparing seriously to advance, making their front held by a comparatively small force while the heavier force engages in flanking movements. The Japanese have learned by bitter experience not to expect much from a frontal attack.

There is considerable evidence to indicate that the Japanese will make every effort to force the Russian out of Mukden, not only for the moral effect on Europe, but on the Chinese as well. Mukden is an important strategic point. The Japanese continue to receive reinforcements, and it is believed that their advance depends only upon accumulating sufficient men.

A DEAD-LOCK, UNLESS. St. Petersburg, Nov. 6.—The army organ to-day publishes a long list of new colonel appointments. General Leinertsch and Kaubers to the first and third armies respectively. The sweeping character of these changes made implies that there is no intention on the part of the Russian government to make any concession during this year's campaign, unless an exceedingly favorable opportunity offers.

SNOW FURRIES. Gen. Kuroki's Headquarters, Nov. 5. Gen. Fusan, Nov. 5.—The positions of the two armies are unchanged. ROOSEVELT EAGER TO WIN

ACCEPTS TRUST EVIL'S AND CHARGE OF JUDGE PARKER

Democratic Nominee for President Declares President's Denial Doesn't Deny Receipt of Contributions to Campaign Fund.

New York, Nov. 6.—Judge Parker, in a speech made at a reception given to him by the Kings County Democratic Club in Brooklyn to-night, asserted that the issue, "whether the trusts can purchase the election" has not been met by President Roosevelt in his reply to Judge Parker's speech made twelve days ago.

Mr. Roosevelt in his statement, printed to-day, asserts that the charges made by Mr. Parker were "unqualifiedly and atrociously false." Mr. Parker's charges are in effect that the president of the United States and Mr. Cortelyou, formerly Mr. Cleveland's executive clerk, then Mr. McKinley's and later Mr. Roosevelt's secretary, and now chairman of the Republican national committee, have been in a conspiracy to blackmail corporations. Mr. Cortelyou using his knowledge gained while he was secretary of the department of commerce and labor to extort money from the corporations, and President Roosevelt, having appointed him for this special purpose, after stating what his position had been in that speech, Judge Parker said to-night that he had made no criticism of the president but that he had simply called attention to a "notorious and offensive situation."

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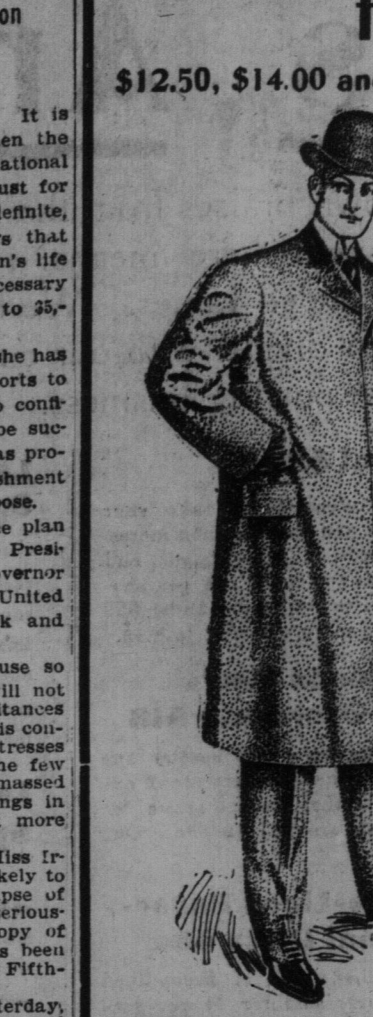

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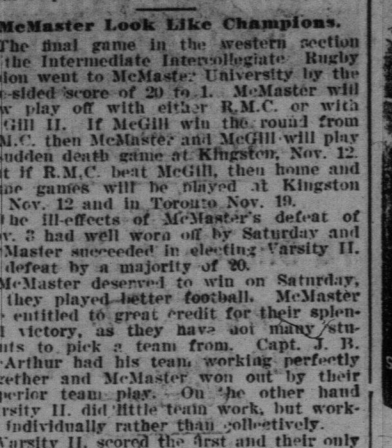
