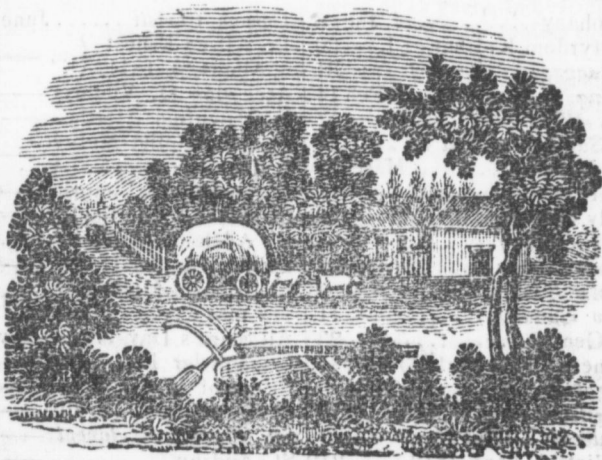

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RIES, &c.

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As many persons are not aware of the signification of several terms, the following explanation is appended:

GOLDEN NUMBER.—This is in fact the *remainder* left after dividing 1844 and 1 added, by 19 years, that being the revolution or cycle in which the conjunctions, oppositions and other aspects of the Moon happen on the same days of their respective months, as they were set down 19 years before, and also within half an hour of the same time of day.

THE SOLAR CYCLE is, the 28 years that revolve before the same days of the week return to the same days of the month; the Sun's place to the same signs, and degrees of the Ecliptic at the same dates, and the leap years begin the same course over again with respect to the days of the week on which the days of the month fall.

THE DOMINICAL LETTER, which denotes Sunday, or Day of Our Lord, (i. e. *Domini*.) was the ancient mode of notation, but is now only used to denote the Sabbaths. Thus, the ordinary year being 365 days, or one more than 52 weeks, the Sunday letter falls back one letter each year; unless it is leap year, when a second move backwards takes place. As every fourth year is thus Bisextile, and as the number of letters employed is seven, the same Dominical letters will return only in four times seven or 28 years, whereas without that intervention, it would return in seven.

THE ROMAN INDICTION is a cycle of 15 years, indicating the terms of certain payments due by the Roman land holders to their Government.

THE JULIAN PERIOD is a revolution of 7980 years, and is produced by the continued multiplication of three Cycles above, viz., 19, 28, and 15.



CIRCUMCISION.—The Festival of the Circumcision was established about the close of the 5th. century, and adopted in the Church of England, 1550.

EPIPHANY.—A festival kept in commemoration of the manifestation of our Saviour to the Gentiles, and was first observed in 813.

SHROVE SUNDAY.—So called from the future tense of the saxon verb to *Shrive*, i. e. to confess preparatory to the more religious observances of Lent.

ASH WEDNESDAY.—This day was conspicuous in the History of the Ancient Church for the severity of discipline exercised on the patients. The name is derived from the sprinkling of ashes on the heads of the offenders.

PALM SUNDAY.—The Sunday next before Easter; also sometimes called Passion Sunday, as being the commencement of Passion week, or the week celebration of the suffering and passion of our Lord.

GOOD FRIDAY.—This day is the anniversary of the Cruci-

fixion, and has been for ages solemnly observed throughout the christian world.

EASTER SUNDAY.—A high festival in commemoration of the resurrection of our Divine Expiator.

LOW SUNDAY took its name from the observances of the Church being of a minor degree to those of Easter.

PENTECOST.—From the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles.

ASCENSION DAY.—HOLY THURSDAY.—The Thursday in Rogation week; being the day on which our Saviour's Ascension is commemorated.

TRINITY SUNDAY is the festival observed on the Sunday next after Whit Sunday, in honour of the Holy Trinity.

CHRISTMAS DAY has been set apart from time immemorial, for the commemoration of our Blessed Saviour's birth. Christmas is now no longer marked by that fervid hospitality which characterised its observance among our forefathers.

MORNING AND EVENING PLANET.

VENUS will be the Evening Star until the 29th September, after which she will be the Morning Star until the close of the year.

ECLIPSES IN 1847.

There will be **FOUR** Eclipses this year, *two* of the **SUN**, and *two* of the **MOON**.

I. March 31, a partial Eclipse of the Moon, a small part of which will be visible in the British Provinces, and the United States:—

The magnitude of the Eclipse (Moon's Diameter=1.) will be 0 28 on the Northern Limb.

II. April 15, a total Eclipse of the Sun, invisible to all parts of North America and Europe, but the Sun will be partially eclipsed in the Southern and Eastern parts of Africa, and will be partly obscured at the Cape of Good Hope; central in the Southern Ocean, and will be totally eclipsed in the Southern part of New Holland.

IV. Octr. 9, an Annular Eclipse of the Sun, invisible in the British Provinces and the United States, but will be apparent at London and Edinburgh.

EXPLANATION OF THE CALENDAR PAGES.

LEFT HAND PAGE.

COLUMN, 1st and 2d, contain the days of the month and of the week. 3d and 4th. The rising and setting in mean time, of the highest point, or of the *upper limb* of the sun, corrected for refraction.

5th. Days length in hours and minutes.

6th. The Equation of Time (or quantity by which the Sun is *slow* or *fast* of the clock) at noon, *apparent* time (not mean) at Greenwich.

7th. The Sun's declination, for the same as the Equation, 6th column.

8th. The rising or setting of the Moon. The setting being given from the New Moon to Full, and her rising from Full to New Moon

9th. The place of the Moon in the Ecliptic.

10th. The time of the Moon's southing, or passing the meridian.

11th. Days increase or decrease in hours and minutes.

The top of the columns of each month shows the moon's phases, or the times of new and full moon, and of the first and last quarters, or two quadratures with the sun

The **FARMER'S CALENDAR** is placed at the foot of the columns of each month.

RIGHT HAND PAGE.

1. Contains the days of the month.

2. Sundays, Phenomena, Anniversaries, &c.

3. Time of High Water at Halifax, Nova Scotia.

4. Annapolis, Nova Scotia.

5. Charlotte Town, P. E. Island.

6. Windsor, N. S. and St. John, N. B.

of that tide which immediately precedes the southing of the moon. These four columns being computed on the supposition, that the time of High Water on the days of New and Full Moon (*L'établissement du port*) is at Halifax, 7h. 15m.—at Annapolis, 10h. 45m.—at Charlotte Town, 10h. 15m.—and at Windsor, and St. John, N. B. 11h. 45m. All the calculations in this Calendar are made to *mean* solar time, a mode of computation now in general use, and which will very soon supercede the old mode of reckoning. *Mean* time can be converted into *apparent* time, by subtracting the quantity in the sixth column of the left hand calendar pages, when the Sun is *slow* of clock, and adding it when *fast*.

interest and a value distinct from the amount of money they may bring in. They become one's teachers; they give him lessons to be treasured up, and to be used. And it is those only who seek to learn and to profit by these lessons, which are furnished by the growing corn and fruits of various kinds, who really are intelligent and exemplary farmers. Do not entertain the idea that your farm work can go on successfully, unless you give it your personal supervision. Poor Richard never drew from his stores of wisdom a better maxim than that "he who by the plough would thrive, himself must either hold or drive." Labourers may be faithful and careful, but they cannot enter fully into all the intentions and plans of the farmer, and be the guiding and directing head of the whole, or much ill directed effort will take place—a good farmer will be in the field with his labourers—he never says to them go, but come; and he knows that in the management of a farm, example is far better than precept.

them, will soon find his land will starve him. It is an important point in commencing work in the spring, that every implement necessary should be at hand, and in first rate condition when wanted—a good farmer has his house for his farm implements as well as for himself or his stock, and is careful that all shall be put in their place, as fast as the season throws them out of use. In the winter all are carefully examined and the necessary repairs are made—the farmer who permits this work to pass until the implements are wanted in the field, will find he must lose many valuable hours. if not days, at a time when one, if lost, is with difficulty overtaken. Sheep are among our most profitable animals, and on the whole, require less care than most others. Look out for the lambs and the weak ones of the flock, and do not suffer a drove of hardy wethers to pick over and trample upon the fodder, before the ewes and lambs can get a taste.

Spring Wheat must be sown early, or there is little use in sowing it at all; the ground should be clear, otherwise the weeds will get the start of the slower germinating wheat—Barley and oats may be sown later.—where these crops are grown on lands infested with the thistle, the sowing should be delayed until the ground is warm and in fine condition, that the check given the weeds by the last ploughing may enable the seeds to germinate and the plants get the start of the weeds, if this is done, the thistle will do little injury, comparatively to the crop. to plant on exhausted, imperfectly prepared land, and after all your labour find your crop a failure. Corn will bear plenty of manure—every load will tell. If your soils are heavy clay, don't suffer yourself to be tempted to plough them while wet. In doing this you may inflict an injury to them, which it will require years to remove. If you sow grass seeds with your spring crops, put them on liberally, and they will succeed better if the roller is passed over the ground after sowing—stinting the supply of seeds, is miserable policy. The garden must come in for a share of your attention—there is an idea quite prevalent among farmers, but a mistaken one, that work in the garden is thrown away. The vegetable garden is an important part of the farm; the flower garden must be consigned to the wife and daughters, and they will show their good sense and good taste, in not allowing this to be neglected.

May is the month in which Indian corn should be planted; and the importance of this crop to the farmer should induce the greatest care to secure a good growth. It is generally planted in hills; and as this allows of culture both ways, it is commonly preferred; but a greater number of plants can be put on an acre if planted in drills; and most of the great crops have been produced in this way. Corn will bear heavy manuring; and to this crop and roots the barnyard manure should be applied, rather than directly to the grain crops. Soaking in saltpetre, in vitriol, in copperas, and tarring and various other contrivances have been resorted to, to keep off worms, birds, &c.; sometimes with success

but perhaps oftener without. There is an advantage, however, in some of these preparations, particularly the saltpetre, as a more rapid vigorous growth is imparted, which places the plant sooner out of danger. The plants must be kept free from weeds, the earth between the rows must be light and loose. The rows of corn, and of all other plants where practicable, should be planted North and South; as in this way, the plants receive more of the benefit of the sun in more directions than one. The distance of the hills must depend in a great measure on the kind of corn planted. The kinds in common use require about three feet each way, three or four stalks in a hill; in drills, the rows three feet apart; the stalks in the rows one foot apart, or two together at 18 inches.

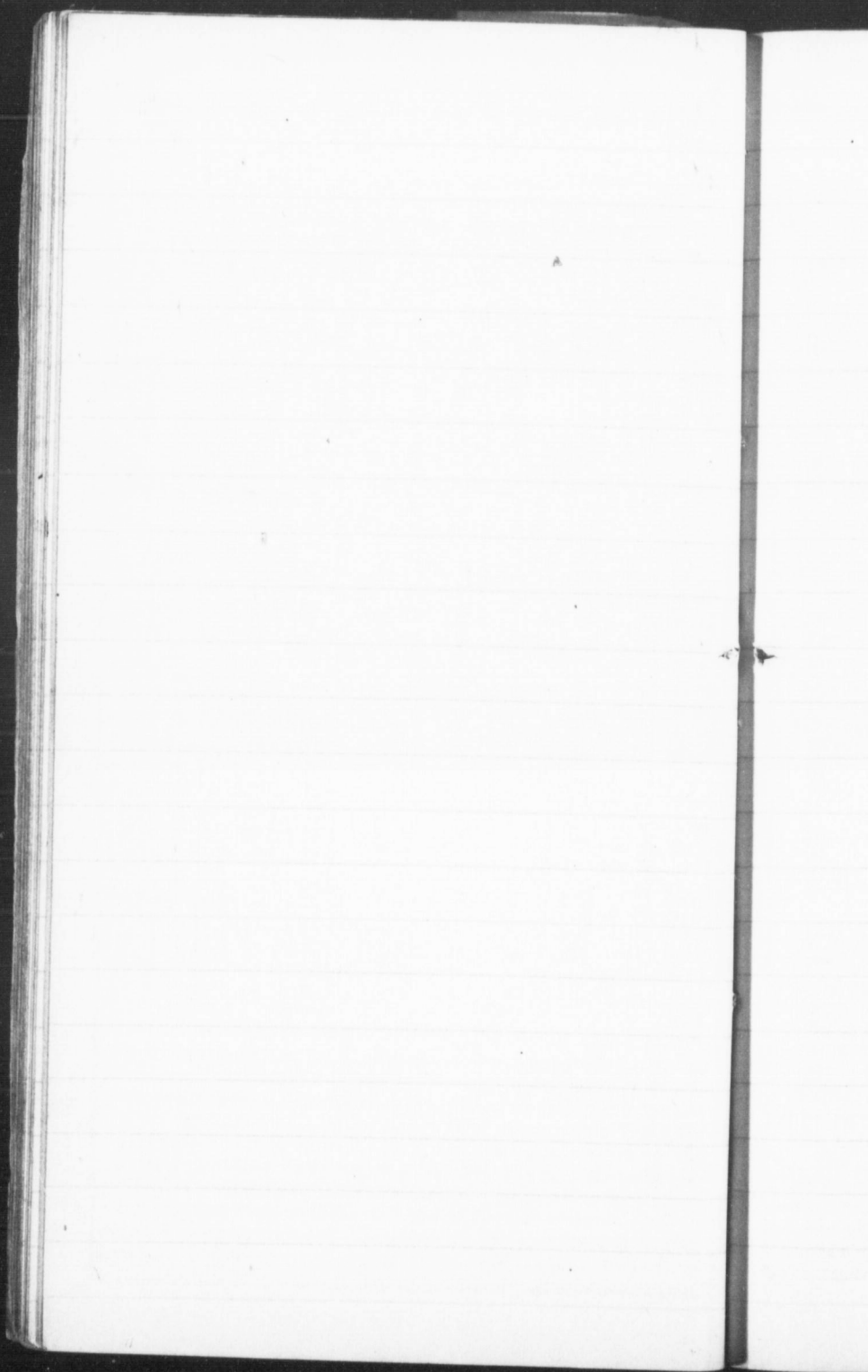

Were our farmers, who keep large stocks, to devote a few acres to the cultivation of this root, we make no doubt they will at the harvest, find themselves in possession of a large store of feed of valuable and rare qualities for sheep, horses, and cattle, which will save largely of hay and potatoes, in times of scarcity of such crops. large field, and the Altringham white. For the table the long yellow is preferable, its surface is smooth and fibre very compact in proportion to its size, it doubtless yields the greatest amount of nutriment. Next to this is the large field variety on which the horse feeds and thrives well, and it gives to the hair a peculiar smooth and glossy appearance. The Altringham white is a long beautiful root, much less nutritious than either of the other varieties, and resembles some of the finest specimens of the long white turnip—it is a hardy plant, requiring less care in its cultivation than the other varieties; stock feed and thrive well upon it. The soil best adapted to the carrot, is a deep rich loam free from gravel or sand. Carrots it is said, may like parsnips, be left in the ground through the winter, and after turnips are consumed in the spring, they will be found admirable in aid of the young grass.

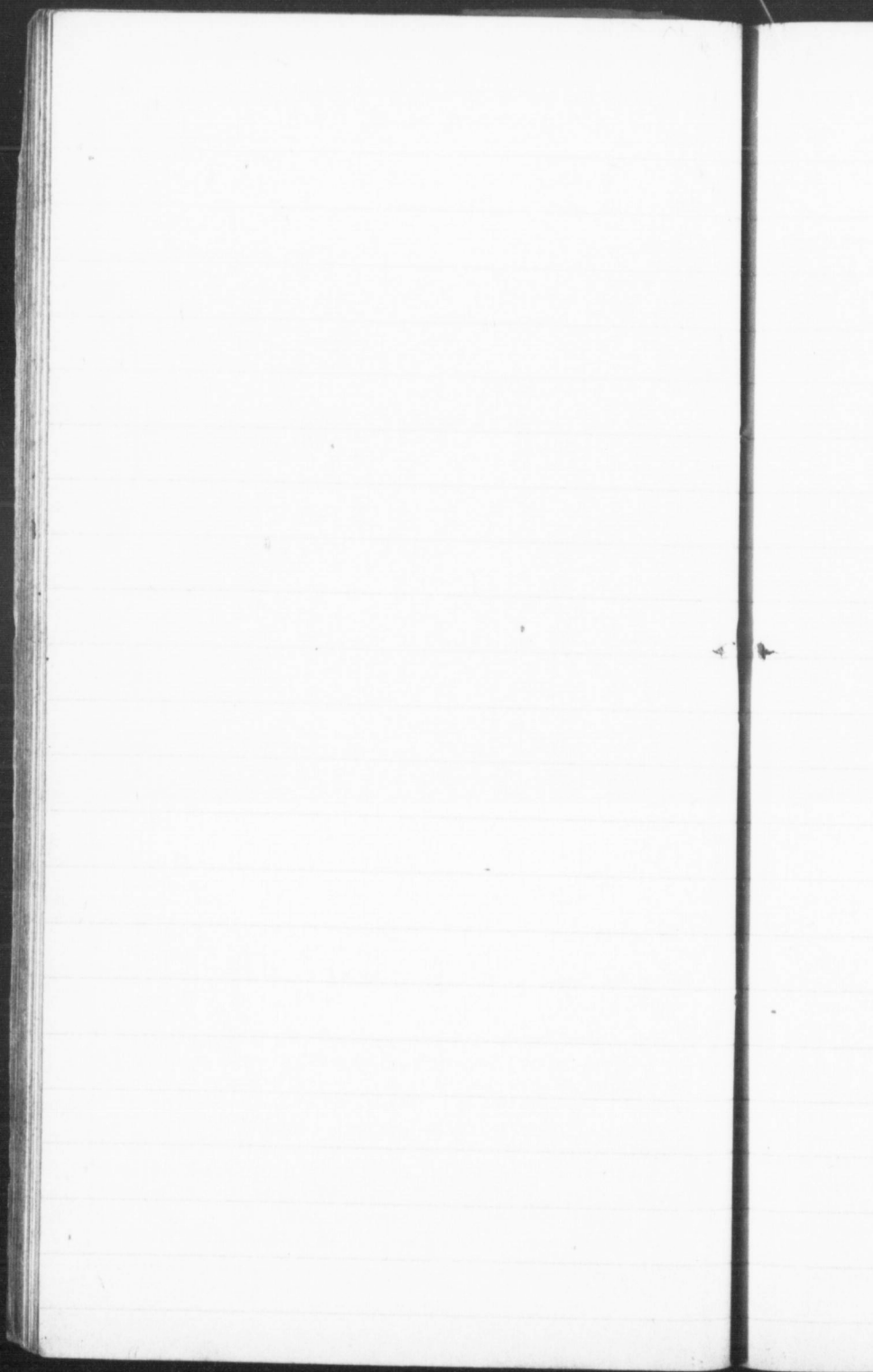

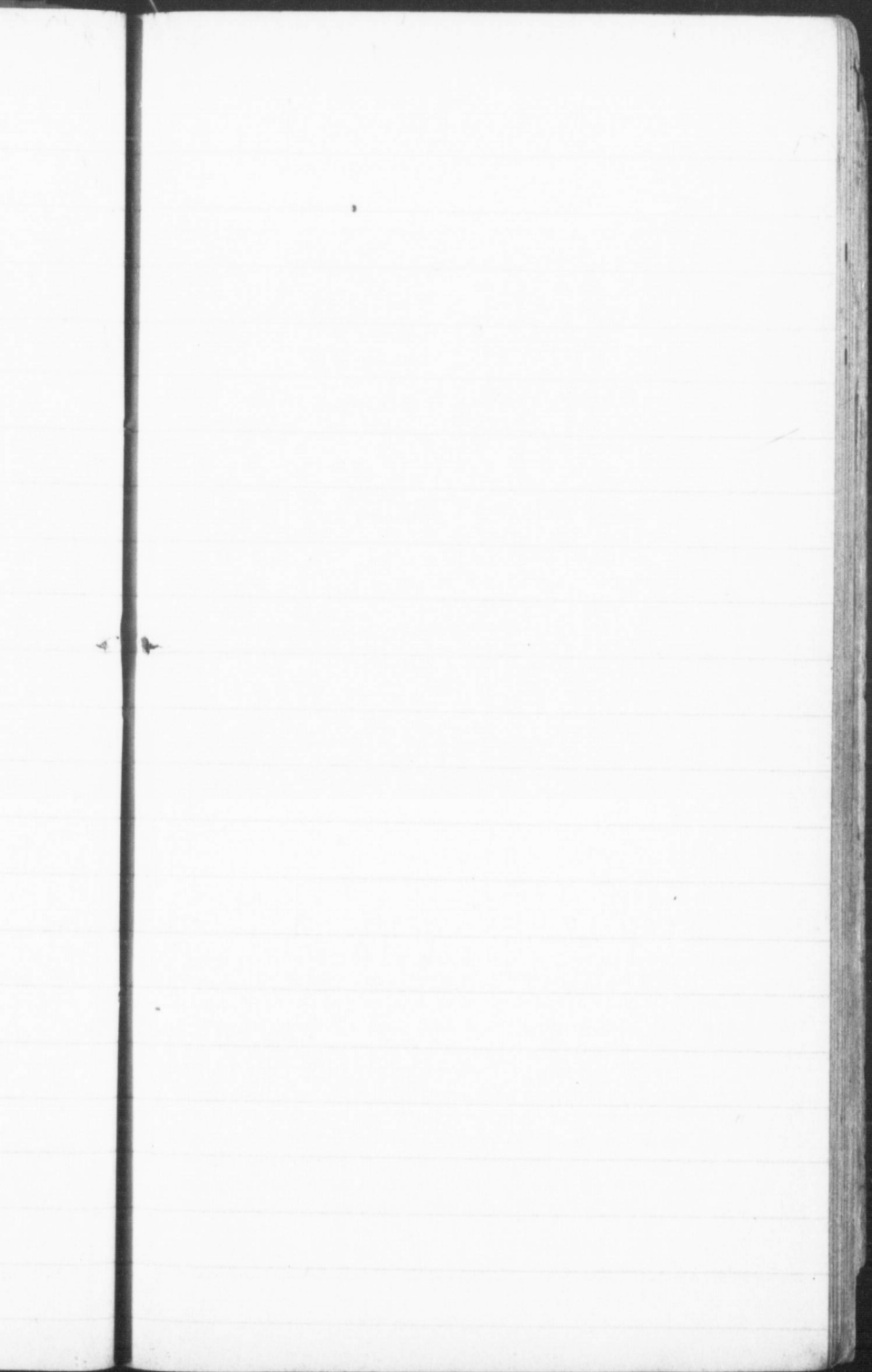
As a crop for winter feeding, the turnip is invaluable, both for sheep and cattle—the common English flat turnip, may be sown as late as the latter part of July or first of August, and will give a good yield—this kind does pretty well for feeding the fore part of winter, but becomes soft and corky by January, and is not worth much. Other kinds keep better. The yellow Aberdeen and the Swedish or Ruta Baga are probably as profitable for late feeding as any. The Ruta Baga should be sown in June (as early as the 20th) to ensure the greatest yield. Much depends on the quality of the seed, and care should be taken to

get that produced by the best shaped roots, and the more particular has been the selection, and the longer it has been continued, the better will be the seed, and the truer the roots. Turnips are better adapted to light, than heavy soils—sandy soils that are too light for potatoes will frequently give a good crop of turnips. by the application of the top dressing of ashes and some compost manure. The turnip comes to the greatest perfection in rather northern latitudes; hence it is quite an object to obtain seed from those regions. The yield of the turnip crop, varies according to the quality of the soil, cultivation, &c., from 400 to 800 bushels per acre. The flat turnip may be sown after a crop of hay has been taken off the ground, and if well cultivated will do well.

August and September are the best months for reclaiming boggy and wet lands—the first object should be to get rid of the surplus water—uplands situated on a hill side, or where there is some declivity, and sometimes too wet. may in many instances be underdrained to advantage. In such cases a good mode is to dig ditches, 2 to 2½ feet deep, and if there are plenty of small stones at hand, fill the drains with them to within 12 or 15 inches of the surface—put on a few hemlock or pine boughs and fill the ditch with earth. We have much land, where underdraining might be practised with great profit, and would in many

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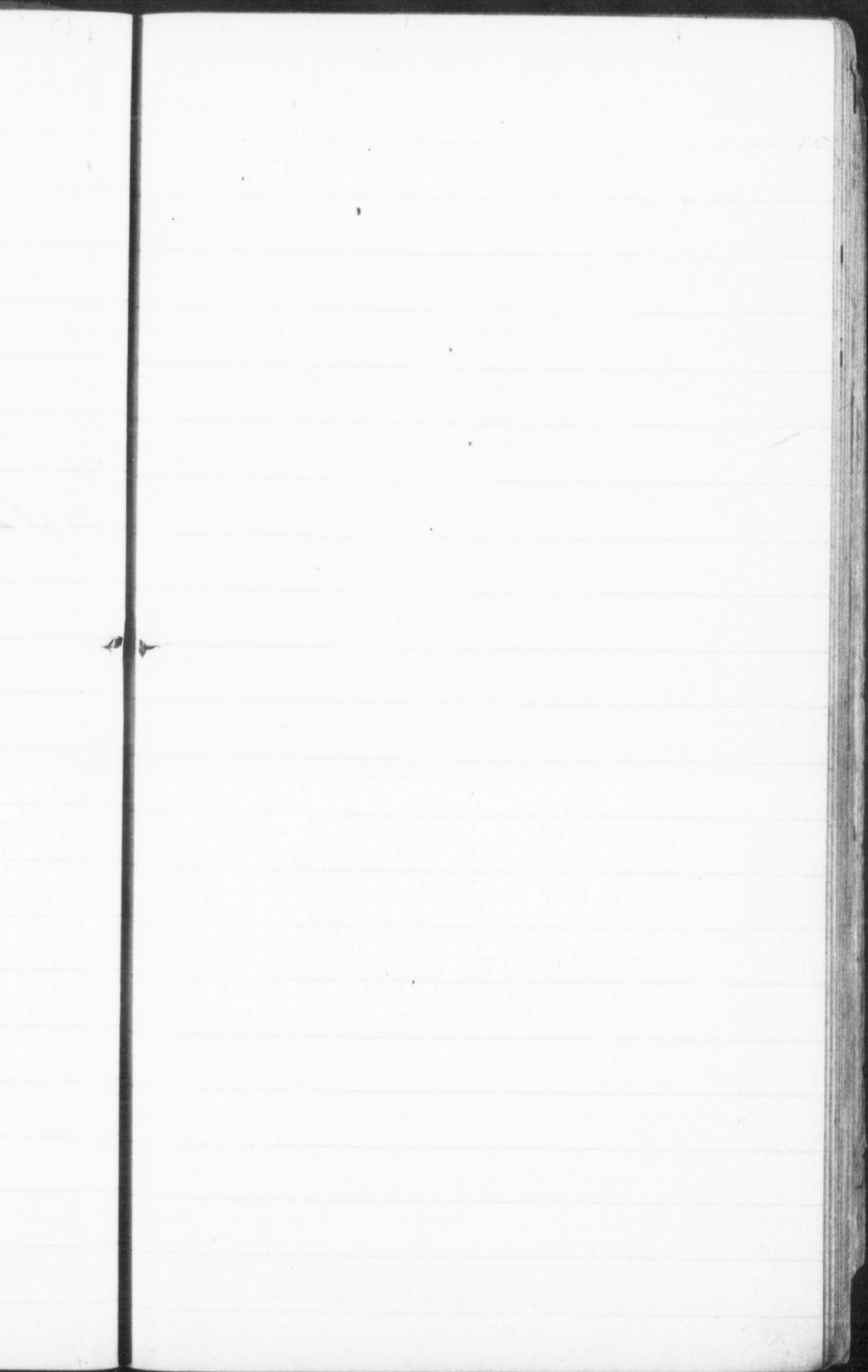

instances render those lands which now only produce a sour watery herbage, suitable for cultivated crops and artificial grasses. In draining bogs, the first step should be to cut off the spring water, which will generally be found to proceed from the surrounding high lands—cut the ditches in such a manner as to intercept this water, and convey it to the general outlet—when this is done, it may soon be seen whether transverse ditches, and how many, will be required. After the ditches have been completed, and the land has had time to settle, the next step will be the extermination of bushes, or any wild growth there may be in the way. If the draining has been well done, the land will be solid enough the succeeding season to bear a team, and a pair of good oxen, with two men and proper tools, will make rapid head way in clearing out the roots.

One of the most important operations in the culture of fruit trees, is the propagation of varieties by budding and grafting—by means of these we exchange the unpalatable fruit of the wilding for the most delicious productions which art and nature combined have been able to furnish, the cultivation and care of them costs no more than for that of the most worthless. Books on gardening describe very fully many different modes of grafting; but, the two chief points are, that the sap flowing upward through the stock passes freely into the graft, and that it returns without interruption from the inner bark of the stock. Farmers lose as much by negligence as by bad cultivation, which may be

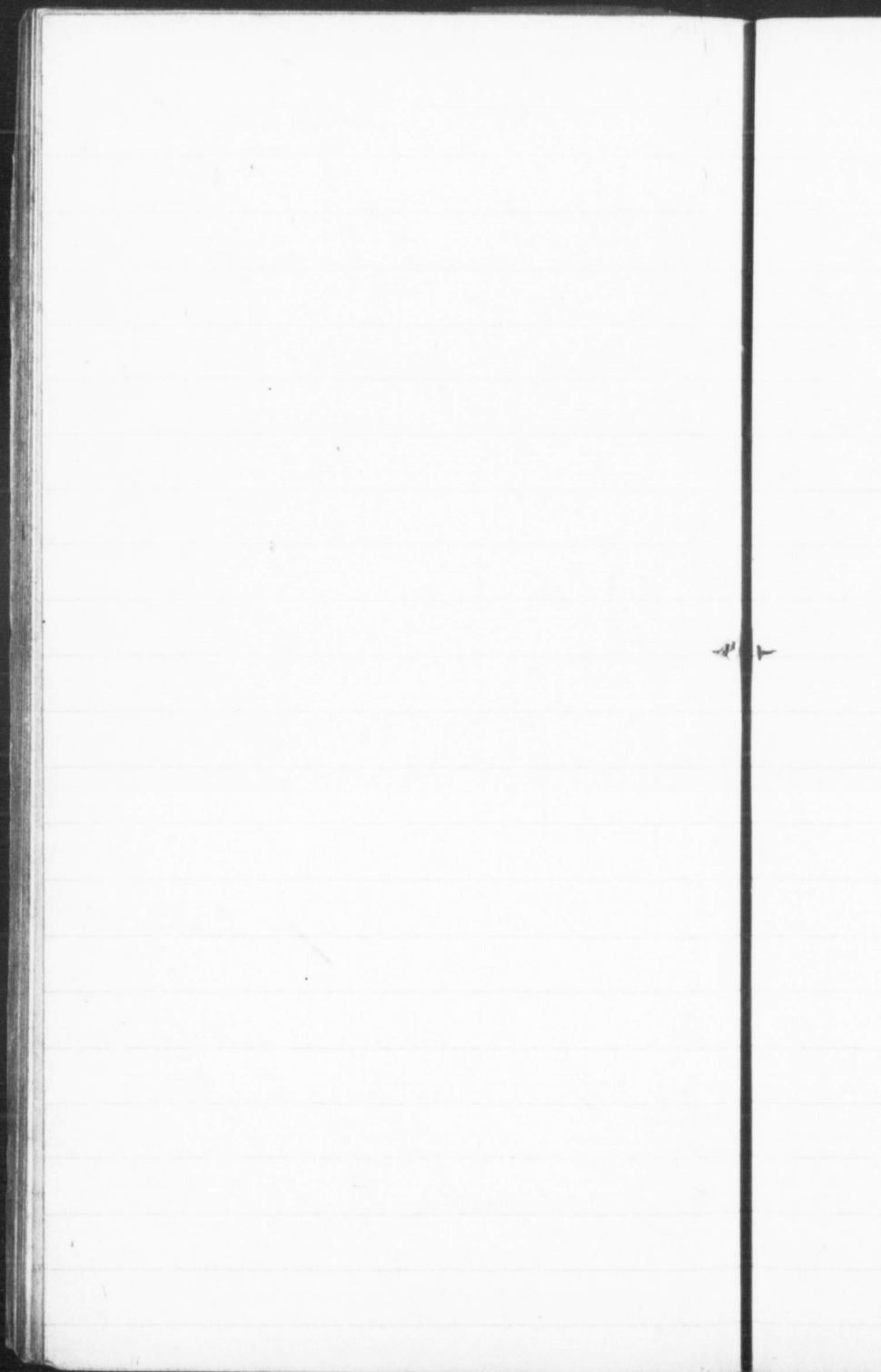

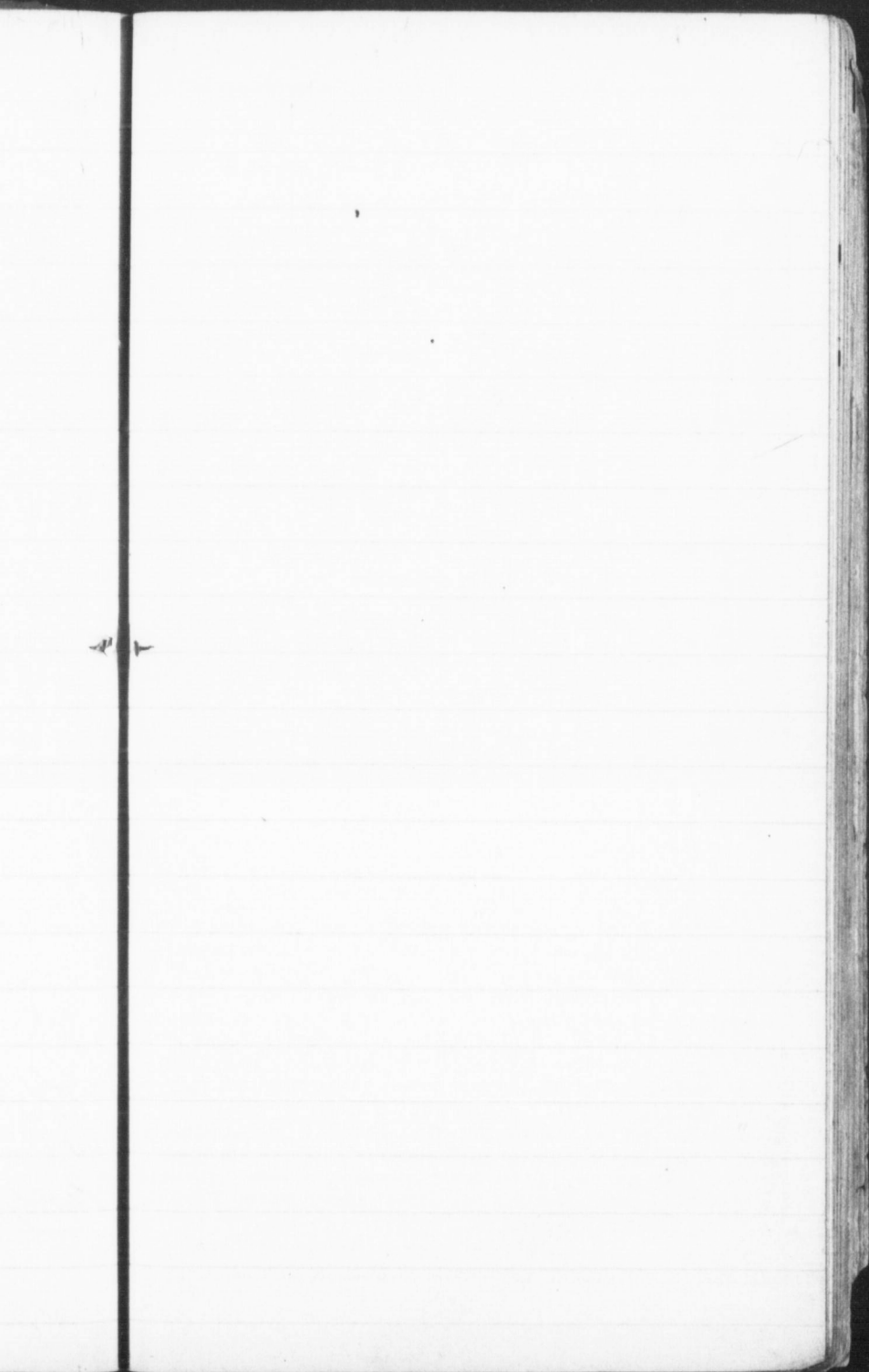

Autumn is a favourable part of the year for making improvements on the farm. After the hay, the wheat, and other small grains have been secured, there is a lapse of time before the latter harvest demands attention, which furnishes a good opportunity for clearing fields of stumps and stones, making fences, improving meadows and pastures, reclaiming swamps and wet lands, digging peat and muck for manure, &c. It is a great defect in our management that there is a too indiscriminate destruction of forest trees—it is the general practice to sweep off every thing leaving the ground as bare and desolate as the deserts of Arabia this is bad policy, *first*, it destroys the *beauty* of the grounds,

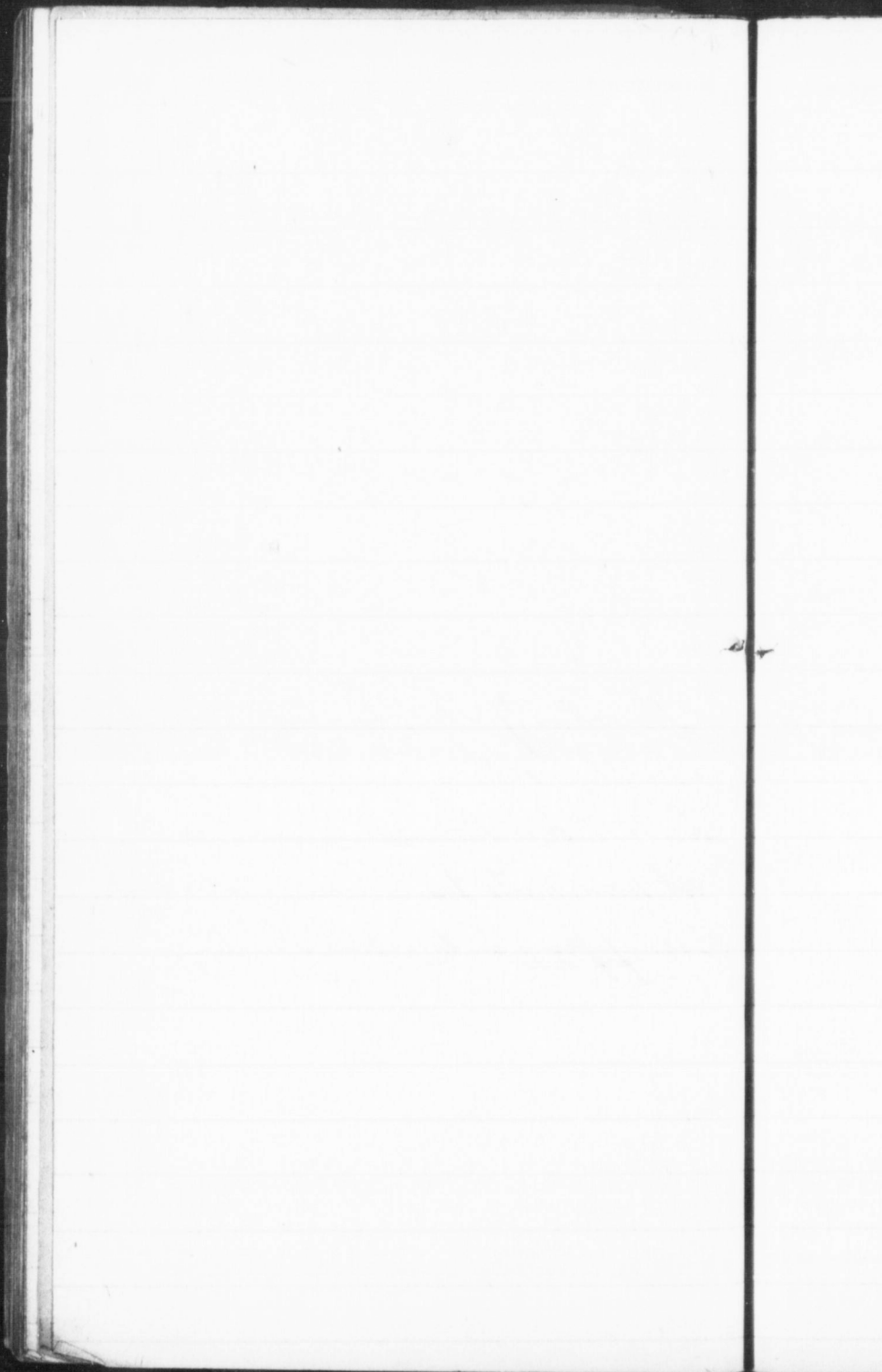

which should never be done unnecessarily ; *second*, in this climate, subject as it is to extreme heat and cold, the preservation and growth of trees, either as shades or shelter, becomes an important object. Pastures and fields should be as much as possible protected against bleak winds, by plantations of trees—suitable trees should also be left in proper places for shade. An animal exposed in an open pasture to the scorching heat of midsummer, suffers great misery, and cannot be made to yield milk or take on flesh. Horses soon become poor and sheep sometimes die from such exposure. A taste for the beautiful properly regulated, should be indulged and cultivated, too many of our people seem to be almost ignorant of this principle, and consequently, one of the chief sources of human happiness, is to them a sealed book.

There are a few things in which farmers in general exhibit such gross waste and want of forethought, as in their treatment of their woodlands. Dependent as the great majority must always be for fuel; diminishing rapidly as they must be in our climate annually; a large proportion timbered with trees that do not grow again without some protection; we still see the noble trees of our original forests as carelessly and uselessly felled as though they were not the growth of centuries. Have you not some vacant spot in your orchard, some nook in your garden, some unplanted road side, some unoccupied place in your yard where some trees might be planted to advantage? Look around and see if there is not room for some or perhaps many, of the

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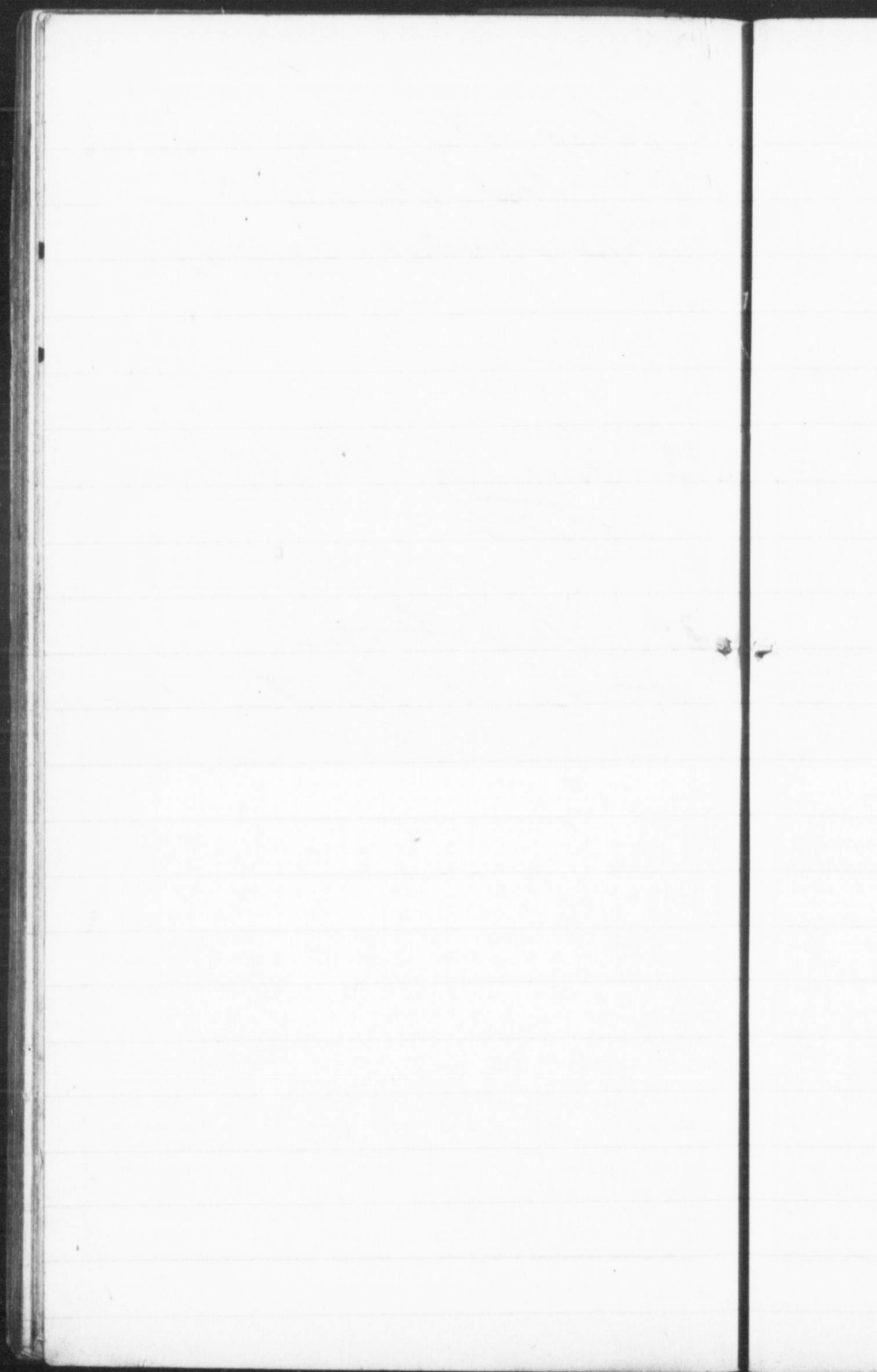

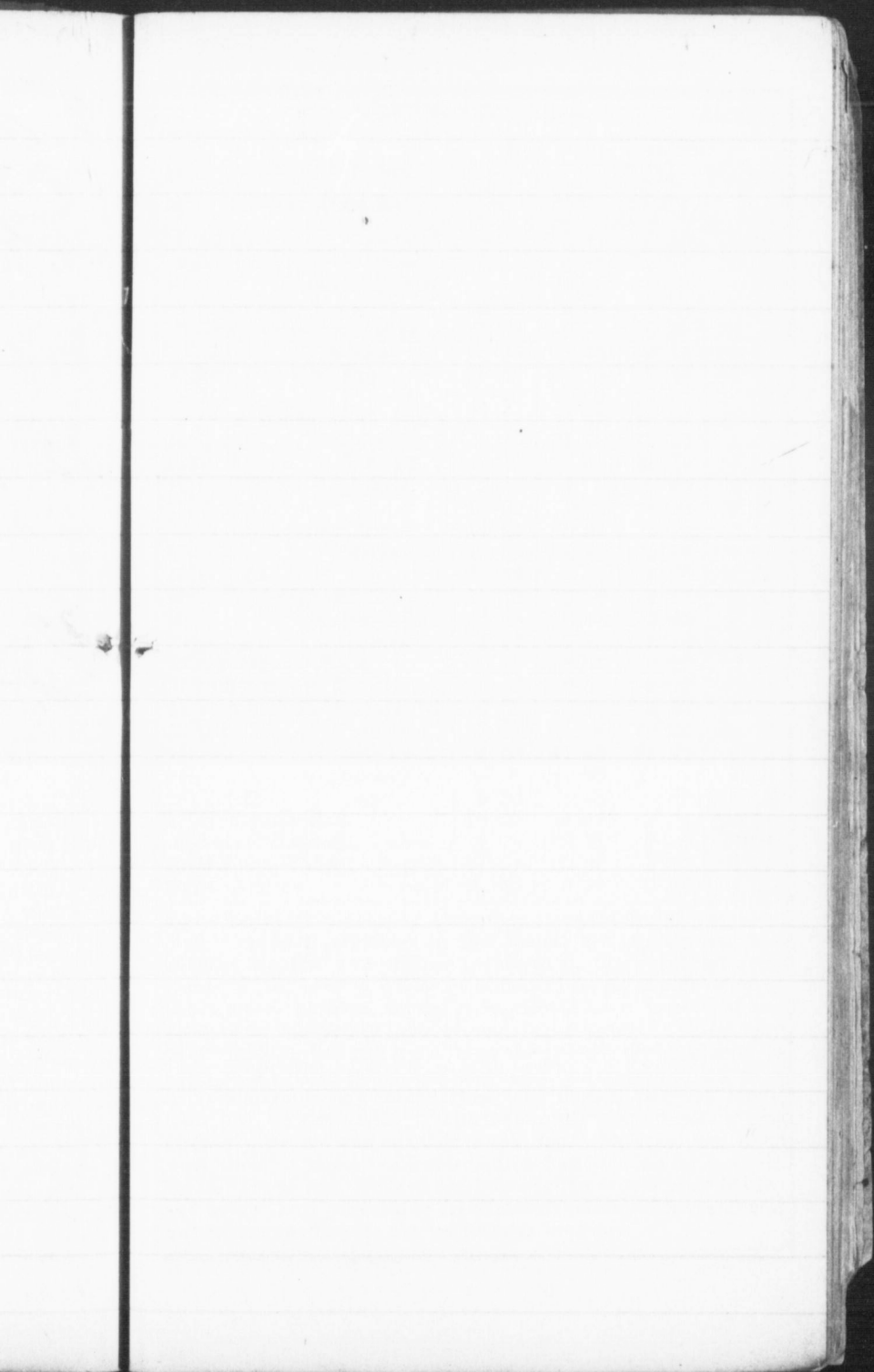

kinds useful for timber, or their fruit, or ornamental purposes. You may have attended to this matter last spring, but the chances are, that you will on examination, find room for more trees. If so, now is a very good time to supply the deficiency; not so good, perhaps, as the spring would have been, but too good to be allowed to pass without improvement. Trees may be transplanted at any time after the growth of the season is over, with perfect safety, and they may be removed at any time if the fine roots are undisturbed, and during removal retain their hold on the earth. Finish harvesting ruta bagas, if not already done, as well as other crops; finish all other out door work timely. Secure cellars from frost; all the farm implements carefully repaired, cleaned and housed; the school attended to, and every thing provided to facilitate education, with useful and instructive reading for the long winter evenings.
