ROMAN CATHOLIC CLERGY

TO GUARD ART TREASURES

ROME, Jan. 27—Cardinal Merry Del Val, pontifical secretary of state, has addressed a circular in the name of the Pope to the ecclesiastical authorities, recalling the serious and honorable task of the clergy with regard to the custody of historic and art treasures. The circular contains pontifical instructions that each diocosee name a special committee to take charge of all documents and other valuables entrusted to the clergy, for the purpose of ensuring their inviolability. A compilation of a catalogue of such articles in the custody of the clergy is also ordered, in which no change will be permitted without authorization.

The fire origin has not been developed, and as there were ne known causes it is regarded as suspicious. The building in which it started, that of the Milliken Company is heated by steam from an outside plant, and the electric power is turned off each night.




