THE DRAGO DOCTRINE
The Pan-American Congress in session at Rio Janeiro will have, it is said, as one of the leading topics of discussion what is known as the Drago Doctrine. The United States has sent a strong delegation to this congress, and Secretary Root is in attendance.

The Drago Doctrine was set forth in 1902, by Dr. Drago, the Argentine minister of foreign relations, after a demonstration by the allied fleets of European nations which sought to compel Argentina to pay her

sought to compel Argentina to pay her debts. Dr. Drago argued for a practical enlargement of the Monroe doctrine, to decree that no European power should be permitted to make an armed demonstration or occupy territory when any American republic might find it inconvenient or inexpedient to meet financial obligations. When this proposition was submitted to the government of the United States, Secretary Hay avoided any expression of opinion, other than to declare sympathy with the idea of the impartial arbitration of matters in dispute between states. Of course, the South American republics are sought to compel Argentina to pay her course, the South American republics are B. Dakine, Windsor. a unit in favor of the doctrine, which, if endorsed by the United States, would shield them behind the power of that what the Congress will do with this proposition. The United States delegates will handly fail to remember that not so very long ago President Roosevelt plainly intimated to the people of the southern republics that they must not regard the Monroe doctrine as a means of escape from the payment of their honest debts. This being so, the Drago doctrine will probably fail to secure the endorsement of the United States representatives.
