MORGAN AND HARRIMAN

Both Encouraging the Rise in the Market—Mr. Harriman's Plans.

(New York Sunday World.)

The fact that the Harriman and Morgan interests are both supposed to be encouraging the rise in the market has caused a good deal of interesting comment because of their well-known antagonism in railroad and financial matters. Wall street is speculating as to which faction will get out of its stocks first at the expense of the other. The impression gained ground several years ago that a truce had been declared between the two factions and that they would thereafter work in harmony. Unity of interest, however, is of short duration in Wall street. The two interests are said to be as antagonistic as they were on the day of the Northern Pacific corner. At the present time their interests place them on the same side of the market, although their campaigns are devoted to the exploitation of different securities. Mr. Morgan and his friends are said to be supporting United States Steel common in which a strong pool was formed about a year ago. The pool acquired a large amount of the stock, but has never been able to find a market for it. When the supply of money becomes short the clash between the two interests will come to the surface for funds, and Wall street is expecting a very interesting encounter.

The great life insurance companies under the old order of things were frequently called upon to supply ammunition for these battles royal. Under the new condition of affairs their strong boxes are not so easy of access.

MR. HARRIMAN'S PLANS.

On all sides he is heard to be divided plans of Mr. Harriman in connection with the Southern Pacific and Union Pacific. Those who disseminate the gossip of Wall street assume authority to say that Mr. Harriman's name for the statement that Southern Pacific will be placed on a 4 per cent basis, and that the Union Pacific dividend will be increased by one per cent. Tips to buy the market are frequently circulated by interested parties who are identified with Mr. Harriman and his friends. The return of Mr. Morgan from Europe and the bullish utterances which have been attributed to him give additional courage to the bull forces. It is figured that call money will remain easy until about the middle of August, and that in the intervening period the bulls will be given an opportunity to make a market for their holdings. All of the important factors in the situation have been ignored during the latter part of the week, although they continue to make a deep impression upon the conservative element of the street, who continue to argue that dividend-paying stocks, considering the rate for long time money, are selling too high, that the ease in the money market is only temporary, and that corporations are constantly applying for loans, which they are having difficulty

in securing at fair rates of interest. In some quarters it is believed that St. Paul had been making private loans to provide the funds for the construction expenses. Efforts have been made to extend and has refrained from attempting to float any securities because of the unsatisfactory state of the money market.

ENORMOUS DROP IN RUSSIAN BONDS

If There is to be Civil War in Russia the World's Markets Will Undoubtedly Have Trouble.

(Montreal Star, Saturday.)

The drop in Russian 4 per cent bonds from 86 1/4 last February, and 92 when the new loan was allotted in April, to 60 now, brings to the front the question how far the decline in an actual reflection of the European market's opinion on the Russian government's outlook. The series of defeats in the Japanese war only looks down the price of four per cent, 12 1/2 points. The popular uprising in the closing months of 1905 caused a fall of eight points.

But this week's price was 17 points under the already low price of five months ago, and showed more than one-third of the quoted value of January, 1904, marked off.

CONSOLS AWAY DOWN.

To interpret this as a collapse in Russian credit, however, would be a little venturesome. The decline in British consols since the outbreak of the Transvaal war in 1900 has been larger than the decline in Russian bonds since February, 1904. Consols this week, falling below 87, stood 20 points below their price of 1905; yet no question has been raised of the credit of the British government. The simple explanation, aside from the slight pre-arranged reduction in the interest rate on consols, was that Great Britain had sold \$25,000,000 new consols in 1900, 1901 and 1902. The market broke under the weight of these new issues.

RUSSIA'S POSITION.

When Russia placed its \$440,000,000 loan last April, it was freely predicted that the market would be swamped with 19 new securities. None of the subscribing markets was eager to buy Russian bonds, which took \$240,000,000, was all ready overvalued with prior issues. UNDER SOUTHERN SKIES

(New York World.)

A certain class of professional operators with their following have become unwholesome bulls and have taken on a heavy line of stocks. There have been some responses from the commission houses, whose case in some instances shows an increase of from \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000, which is additional evidence that those who dominate Wall street movements are beginning to get a market which they can distribute the stock which they were compelled to buy earlier in the week. The impression seems to be that they will make a higher and broader market will be continued for the time being at least, for the purpose of further distribution.

BOSTON, July 29—Her trail and deck of schooner S. S. Hudson was towed to the yard, Chelsea, by the tugboat Mercury, which towed her from Portsmouth. She was on a passage from St. John to Boston, with a cargo of laths when she encountered severe weather off Cape Ann. Times Classified Ads Pay

With the departure of "The Harvard Girl" on Wednesday last the St. John Opera House closed its doors for a brief space and the local theatrical season of 1906-07 may be said to have ended.

The Opera House will reopen on August 20 with a production of the Volante Organist, which will be followed by Letitia Hain Parker's successful comedy drama Under Southern Skies.

The season just closed was probably a better one than the average, certainly it was a longer one. We had as many poor shows as usual, but we appeared to have a greater proportion of offerings which could be classed as "light plays" as far as St. John is concerned.

Most of our old friends were back and we made some new ones. Some familiar faces were missed, but the theatre goes on generally of a short memory and when we were last year's idol from its pedestal we soon had a successor installed in its place.

To review all the various attractions which have been offered to St. John the theatre goes on since September last would bring down upon my devoted head the censure of the editor, who looks to conserve his space, but it may not be amiss to take a brief retrospective glance over the season just closed and see if we can resurrect some pleasant memories of enjoyable evenings spent in one or the other of the local theatres or concert halls.

Probably the most important dramatic event of the season was the visit the first week in June of Miss Roselle Knott, supported by Ernest Hastings, the Canadian company in a first class production of When Knighthood was in Flower. 

SAFETY BOARD

Announced That the St. John Street Railway Company Will Take Over North End Plant on Aug. 10th.

At the regular meeting of the safety board last evening the director announced that the street railway would take over the north end lighting on Aug. 10.

A committee, consisting of Ald. Christie, Fickett and Lantalam with the director and Chief Barry, were appointed to look into the matter of having an inspector of electric wires. The sub-committee on increasing accommodation at city hall reported that they had inspected the upper floors of the building and could not recommend any change, as there was not sufficient room to accommodate the staffs of the water and sewerage department and the board of works.

The report was sent back. It was recommended that Wesley Stevens be granted the lease of a lot on Prospect street, Fairville, at 50 cents a foot.

The removal of a lease to James O'Leary on property in Guys ward was recommended at a rental of 88.

An order was passed giving S. T. Golding an additional \$5 a month for one of the ambulances, making \$45 a month. The amount was increased for in the estimates.

It was recommended that a light be placed on the Marsh road, near a quantity of water pipe.

Ald. Rowan and Holder and the director were appointed to settle the location of two new electric lights to be placed in Douglas avenue.

Policeman J. H. Ross was granted full pay for nine days' absence from duty owing to illness.

An application from George A. Earle, janitor of the police building that his pay be increased to \$1.75 a day, was referred to the salaries committee.

Ald. Christie, Sprout, Lantalam and the chairman were appointed a committee to arrange about the rental of rooms in the market building.

A recommendation was passed for the treasury board to pay the policemen and ferry employes fortnightly instead of monthly.

Joseph Fournier, Arrested in Maine, Says he Belongs to St. John.

Joseph Fournier, alias Swin, caught in an attempt to rob the post-office at Alma, Me., July 19, has made a confession to the post-office Inspector Robinson.
