### NURSING THE INFANT

If mothers follow the plan of carefully using a regular schedule for nursing periods, much better results, both in infant growth and contentment as well as the condition of the mother in well, nutritional breasts and normal milk supply, will follow. In many hospitals and community homes, where regular time period feedings have been carefully carried out, the following plan has been found most satisfactory:

In infants of eight pounds and above, five to six nursings in 24 hours.

In infants between seven and eight poungs, six nursings in 24 hours.

In infants between five and seven pounds, seven or eight nursings in 24 hours.

In infants below five pounds, seven or eight nursings in 24 hours.

A well-developed, healthy, thriving nursing baby should, under ordinary condition, go through the night (from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m.) without being fed.

Nursing mothers will do well to try

and put this programme in use at the earliest possible time. Don't delay, as the longer you put it off the more difficult it will be to induce baby to think well of it. Of course, undeveloped, period in fellow in pursing a verages through a period of three years, I find that the average infant usually takes, while nursing in the first two or three weeks, from six to ten ounces a day. After this time, there is a marked increase. The rule seems fairly constant that the baby should receive of breast milk, in each 24 hours, two times as many ounces as his weight in pounds.
