





### AUSTRALIA FEARS TRADE VESSELS THAT MAY BECOME WARSHIPS

Melbourne, Oct. 25—Grave concern is felt throughout the states comprising the commonwealth over the asertion that all overseas vessels subsidized by foreign countries are easily convertible into commerce destroyers upon the outbreak of war. Private advices are received in this country which state that the liners flying the German flag are especially equipped for this contingency.







The proposed line will traverse the richet portion of the Peace River district, entering British Columbia via Pine River pass, north of Yellowhead Pass, and opening a vast region in the northern portion of this province. It will be more than 1,000 miles long and will take the shape of two sides of a triangle, whose apex will be at Pine River Pass, which has a low altitude. An exploration survey party is now going over the route to secure data preliminary to undertaking the location work It is expected that the line will be completed and in operation within four years, as it is understood arrangements for financing the proposition have already been completed. 





The committee on paper is confident that the section providing for free Canadian paper will not be repealed. A majority of each House of Congress favors free paper. The committee believes that the duties on pulps and paper from favored nations, like Germany, Sweden and Norway, will be abolished soon. Should Canadian manufacturers ask that the purchaser agree to pay additional duty in the event that any may be imposed on news print paper, the committee on paper advises users of news print paper to promptly assent to that proposition. This suggestion to users of news print paper is made upon the assumption that the duty will not be increased. Their show of confidence in that matter will tend to promate healthy competition. It will check the efforts of American paper makers to restrict that new production to which publishers must turn for relief.


