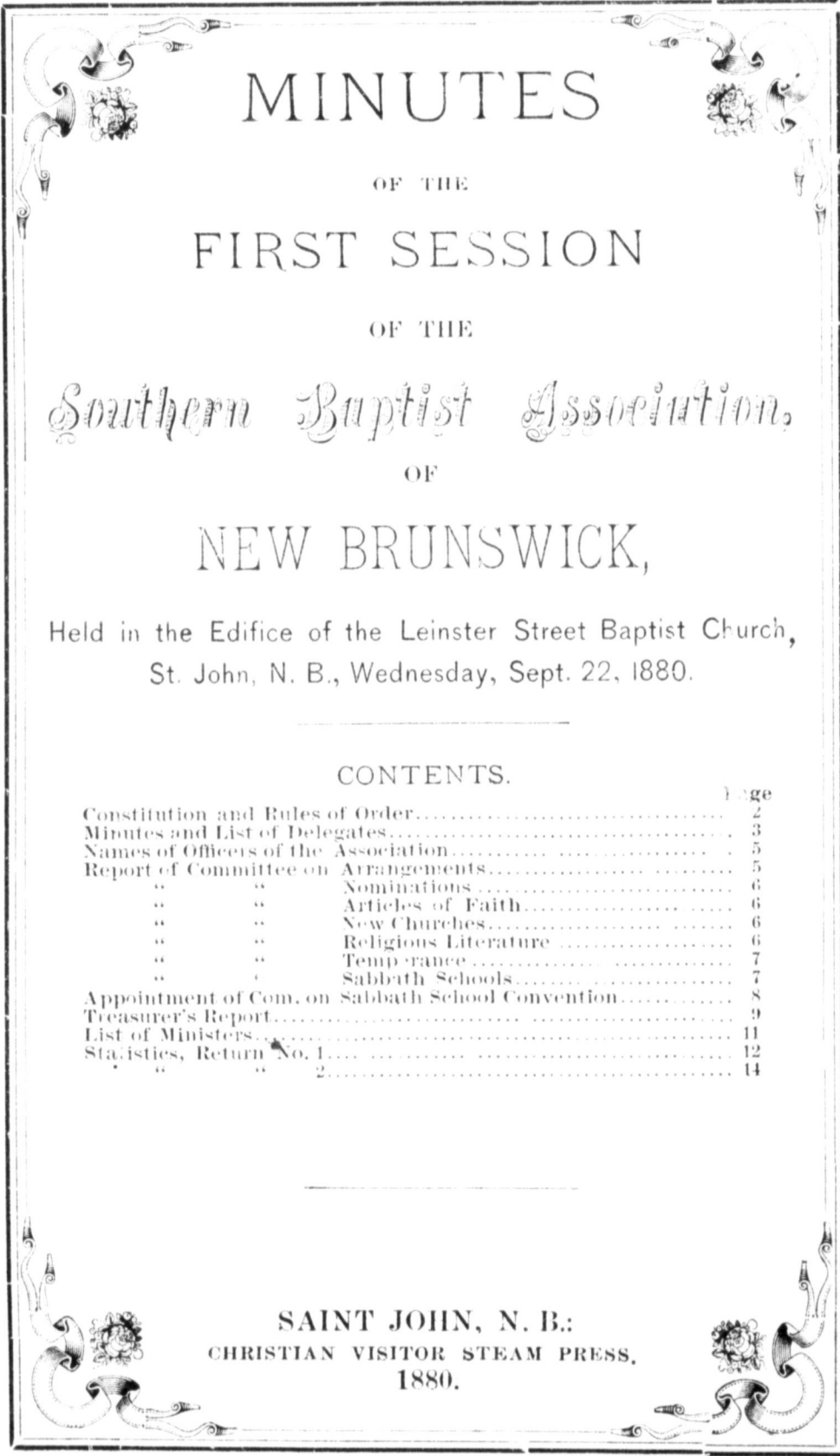

CONSTITUTION AND RULES OF ORDER OF THE  
**Southern N. B. Baptist Association.**

**ARTICLE 1.**—This Association shall consist of Delegates, representing the Churches of which it is composed, each of whom shall be a member of one of those Churches, and shall be styled the "Southern N. B. Baptist Association."

**ARTICLE 2.**—The objects of this Association shall be the collection of statistical and other information from the Churches, the cultivation of mutual acquaintance and fraternal union, the promotion of individual godliness, and the spiritual prosperity of the Churches; and, in the use of scriptural means, the enlargement of the Redeemer's kingdom.

**ARTICLE 3.**—The Association shall meet annually, at 2 o'clock, p. m., on the second Tuesday in June at such place as they shall appoint; notice of which shall be given in the Minutes, and in the denominational paper. The meeting shall be opened with Social Conference; after which the Officers and Committees shall be appointed. Every meeting held by adjournment from time to time during the session of the Association, shall be opened and concluded by prayer.

**ARTICLE 4.**—Each Church shall have the privilege of sending one Delegate or more; but no church, however numerous, shall be entitled to a greater number than five, in addition to their Pastor.

**ARTICLE 5.**—At each meeting of the Association, the Delegates shall deliver to the Clerk of the preceding year, immediately on their arrival, the Letters from the Churches; a list of the Delegates having been prepared by the Clerk, their names shall be called, and they shall take their places. The Moderator of the preceding year shall call the vote for a Moderator by ballot, without nomination, and the person who shall be chosen by a majority of the members present, shall, upon his acceptance lead the meeting to the choice of a Clerk. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside in all the transactions of the meeting, and maintain due order among the members. The Association shall appoint two Committees—one on Arrangements, and one to nominate all other Committees. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a fair and impartial record of all the doings of the Association during the session and furnish a correct copy for the press.

**ARTICLE 6.**—It shall be the duty of each church to send by its Messengers a letter to the Association, giving an account of its state, particularly of the addition and diminution within the last year; and generally, of whatever relates to its peace and prosperity, together with the whole number of members in communion. It shall also forward money for the printing of the Minutes.

**ARTICLE 7.**—When any Church shall desire admittance into this body, application must be made by letter, and satisfactory evidence furnished of their faith and order; this being done, and a vote of acceptance taken, the Moderator shall, on behalf of the Association, give to one of their Messengers (if any be present) the right hand of fellowship.

**ARTICLE 8.**—When a Church shall neglect to make any communication to the Association for three years successively, it shall be considered as having withdrawn from us, and shall be dropped from the Minutes, unless two or more members request its continuance, and shall engage to enquire into its standing, and report at the next meeting of the Association.

**ARTICLE 9.**—Although as an Association we disclaim all power over the Churches, so far as respects any interference with their independence and discipline, yet we deem it our privilege to judge for ourselves of the propriety of continuing any Church or Minister in our connection, who to us shall appear to be unscriptural in principle, or irregular in practice. In order, however, that we may not withdraw our fellowship, without sufficient reason, from any Church or Minister against whom a complaint is made by two members of this body, it shall be the duty of the Association to appoint a committee to investigate the points of complaint, and report the result of their enquiries to the Association, that they may decide as duty shall appear.

**ARTICLE 10.**—Alterations and amendments may be made in this Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any regular session.

**Rules of Order.**

2. That each meeting be opened by prayer.
2. That motions be made and seconded according to parliamentary usage.
3. That no delegate speak more than twice to the same motion.
4. That every resolution be written out and handed to the Clerk.
5. That motions which are lost be not recorded.
6. That invited members enjoy the privilege of Delegates except voting.
7. That these resolutions be read at each session.

## MORNING SESSION.

WEDNESDAY, SEPT. 22ND, 1880.

At 10 o'clock, A. M., Rev. W. P. Everett called the meeting to order, and on motion Rev. W. A. Corey was chosen as Chairman, and Rev. W. P. Everett as Secretary *pro tem*.

After a brief interval, the said Committee presented their report which on motion was adopted.

On motion, the Association then proceeded to the election of officers with the following results :

REV. I. E. BILL, Moderator.

“ W. P. EVERETT, Clerk.

MR. T. D. DENHAM, Assistant Clerk.

C. F. CLINCH, Esq., Treasurer.

The rules of order were then read by the Moderator.

On motion, the Report of the Provisional Committee was adopted as the action of this body, and thanks were returned to that Committee for their labors.

On motion, visiting brethren were invited to seats and accepted by Rev. J. Coombes, and Brethren J. E. Masters, C. D. Everett and D. J. Gillies.

On motion, Rev'ds. T. Todd, H. Foshay, E. W. Kelly, W. A. Corey and S. W. Kierstead, were appointed the Committee of Arrangements.

On motion, Rev'ds. J. E. Hopper, W. J. Stewart, and Brethren Jacob Titus, C. F. Clinch and O. Hanson were appointed the Committee on Nominations.

Moved, That the Committee on Nominations be instructed to nominate a Missionary Committee whose duty it shall be to look after the destitute fields in the bounds of the Association, and to present the claims of these fields to the Home Mission Board of the Convention.

The Committee on Arrangements reported in part as follows :

1. That the morning session close at 12.30 o'clock, and that the afternoon session open at 2.30 o'clock, and close at 5 o'clock, and that the evening session open at 7.30 o'clock, and that the evening session be devoted to Missions, and that addresses be delivered by Rev'ds. I. E. Bill, J. E. Hopper, T. Todd, W. J. Stewart, H. Foshay, and others, and that Rev. E. W. Kelly preside.

*Resolved*, That we adopt the form of letters to the Association now used by the Eastern and Western Associations.

On motion, Rev'ds. J. E. Hopper, T. Todd, and Bro. J. A. Estey, were appointed a Committee to report on the propriety of the Association, adopting the New Hampshire Confession of Faith, so-called, as our Articles of Faith.

The Committee on Nomination reported in part the following Committees :

*On Sabbath Schools.*—Brethren C. G. Berryman, J. A. Estey, H. March, G. R. White, M. Spragg, A. W. Masters, and Rev'ds. W. E. Vickery and J. Coombes.

Adjourned after prayer by Rev. T. Todd.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The session was opened with prayer by Bro. G. R. White.

The Minutes of the morning session were read and confirmed, and the Rules of Order were also read.

The Committee on Articles of Faith presented their Report, recommending the adoption of the New Hampshire Confession of Faith so-called.

On motion, and after free and full discussion, the report was adopted.

The Committee on New Churches reported as follows :

We recommend that the application of the Marsh Bridge Church through their delegate for admission to this Association be granted, and that we cordially welcome them as co-laborers in the great work in which we are engaged.

On motion, the report was adopted, and the Moderator extended the hand of welcome and fellowship to Rev. Jas. Spencer, pastor of the Marsh Bridge Church.

The Committee on Religious Literature submitted the following Report.

That in our opinion a wider and more extensive circulation of Baptist literature among the people is desirable, and especially do we urge upon the officers of the Sabbath Schools the importance of selecting pure and strictly denominational books for the use of the schools. Also that since our denominational paper, the CHRISTIAN VISITOR, is faithful in the discharge of its duties, it is worthy of the confidence and continued support of all our people. We also heartily commend the efforts of Bro. Hopper in preparing Bible Lessons, and Sabbath School papers; and recommend their

After a full discussion, the above report was adopted.

*Resolved*, That the Treasurer be authorized to pay John March, Esq., Sec'y of the Provisional Committee on Arrangements, the sum of \$4.37 expended by him for printing and postage.

The Committee on Temperance reported as follows :

Your Committee on Temperance do not feel prepared to submit such a report as this grave subject demands on account of the short notice at which we have been called upon to prepare it. But a few thoughts may serve to indicate the deep interest felt by this Association in a question so important, and now receiving the undivided attention of the Christian world. We cannot but record our gratitude to Almighty God for the passing of the "Canada Temperance Act," and for the beneficial results which have followed the enforcement of it in many places. We are of opinion that the secret of removing this obstacle from the way of the gospel consists in moral as well as *legal suasion*. Intemperance is a moral evil. "Moral suasion," together with the constant example of all who love our Lord Jesus Christ, has done much and can do more yet to work a moral reform in the hearts of men with respect to the deplorable habit of using strong drink. It is cause of thankfulness that among our churches there is unanimity on this question, leaving little or no work to be done in the direction of establishing a belief in the principles of prohibition among ourselves. Every Baptist Church is now supposed to be a total abstinence society. Our work chiefly lies outside of ourselves. How shall we accomplish anything in this great work ?

*First*, Let every member of our churches be faithful to the cause, both by precept and example. Let them look to Him who is able to take off the affections of men from this as well as any other appetite of the flesh for the help they need in this work.

*Second*, Let the pastors be faithful to the condemnation of this evil, and without fear proclaim the evils of this terrible vice from their respective pulpits.

On motion, it was ordered that 500 copies of the Minutes be printed and distributed under the superintendence of the Clerk and Rev. E. W. Kelly.

The Committee on Sabbath Schools submitted the following report which on motion was adopted.

Your Committee on Sabbath Schools in connection with the Southern Baptist Association, beg leave to report that on examination of the letters sent in by the different churches we find that they all report schools in fine condition, with the following exceptions, viz., *one* church without any school; *two* with schools temporarily suspended, and *one* with a Union School. To meet a want

apparent to your Committee we would urge upon the parents and friends of scholars the need of active co-operation in attending the sessions of the schools on the Sabbath, and they would also suggest that each church hold a Quarterly Prayer and Praise Meeting supplemented by a sermon on Sabbath School work on the following Sabbath. Your Committee take pleasure in noticing the deep interest taken in the late Raikes Centennial Celebration, as it evinces a widespread interest in Sabbath Schools, and shows the great importance that all denominations attach to Sabbath School work. It is also the opinion of your Committee that it is desirable to form a Convention of the Sabbath Schools in connection with the Association, where subjects in connection with Sabbath School work may be discussed more fully than can be done by your Committee, and would request (if such a Convention be desirable) that this Association would appoint a time and place for the first session of such Convention.

Sunday School Convention, to hold two sessions in connection with the next session of the Association, said sessions to be held on Wednesday afternoon and evening.

Brethren A. W. Masters, T. S. Simms, J. A. Estey, T. H. Hall, C. G. Berryman, M. E. Cowan, Wm. Vaughan, G. K. Hanson, A. H. Gilmour, J. S. Trites, J. Titus, Geo. White, Gilbert White, and E. W. Clinch were appointed such committee.

On motion, voted that this Association learns with much pleasure that Rev. I. E. Bill is preparing a book, entitled "Fifty Years in the Ministry," which is to contain a history of revivals and a short sketch of the lives of many of our ministers in the Provinces. We commend this work to our people generally, and hope it will secure an extensive circulation.

Music was interspersed during the meeting by the Choir. A collection of \$12.00 was taken.

On motion, it was ordered that the Treasurer hold the Association funds, subject to the call of the Committee on publishing Minutes.
