The Raid On England East

A small German fleet consisting of three cruisers made a sudden dash into the North Sea on Wed nesday morning last and shellad Hartlepool and Scarborough, two cities on the east coast, a little over 200 miles north of London. Several buildings were damaged and a number of people were killed and wounded. Fifteen schoolboys were killed by a single shell. Ten people were killed by the collapse of a building. The Germans refused to give battle, and hurried away followed by British cruisers. What the object of the raid was and how the Germans got past the British patrols and the mine fields is not exactly known.




