FIRST Nfld. REGIMENT
Reserve Force
Men will be enlisted for active service under the following conditions:
1.—After they have passed the medical examination and been finally accepted by the Recruiting Officer at St. John's they will be sworn in and undergo training until such time as it is decided to send the contingent abroad.
2.—Pay will be at the rate of one dollar per day and ten cents per day field allowance and will begin as soon as the men are sworn in. While in St. John's the men will find board and lodging for themselves and an allowance of fifty cents per day will be made to them on this account in addition to the pay above.
3.—Free transportation will be provided from all outposts to St. John's on an order from the Magistrate to recruits who have passed local medical examination. Where recruits are rejected at St. John's transportation will be provided to enable them to return to their homes.
4.—At the present time single men only are required between the ages of nineteen and thirty-six, not less than five feet three inches height, chest average 34 inches, weight 120 lbs.

The German cruiser Dresden, which escaped from the sea battle in the South Atlantic, is reported to have stranded on the Argentine coast. Another report says she is being pursued by H.M.S. Bristol.

Patrick Coady, Chief Steward of the S. S. Sagona, was found burned to death in his bunk on board his ship at St. John's Monday morning last, after a fire was extinguished, which badly damaged the steamer's cabins.

In connection with the question, 'Has Germany designs upon Newfoundland?' some people in this section recall how that a couple of summers ago certain men were located for some time on the hills to the south of Brigus overlooking Conception Bay and Bell Island. They were supposed at the time to be prospecting or surveying, but in reality they may have been German spies.

Judge Knight gave expression to a good suggestion in his Court at St. John's a few days ago when three vagrants were brought before him. It was to the effect that he was considering sending them to the jail at Carbonear, where they would be useful in keeping the road between Carbonear and Old Perlican clear of snow for the mail couriers. It is time the outpost people got some returns for the expense they are put to as taxpayers in keeping a crowd of 'Weary Willies' in the Penitentiary all winter.

Obituary

On Saturday afternoon, Dec. 12th, while on his way home from Back Cove, Mr. John Sheppard, of Spaniard's Bay, suddenly expired on the main road, near the residence of his son, Abram. He was seen to fall by Mr. Geo. Porter, who hastened to his side and assisted him to his home, but before reaching there the spark of life had fled.

For the past few years' he had been troubled with heart disease, but was always able to get about and perform his duties. Mr. Sheppard was Chairman of the Road Board, and was one of the most respected and well-known residents of Spaniard's Bay. He was a hard working and energetic fisherman all his life, and always ready and willing to help any good cause. The whole community has much to regret in the loss of such a man.

The deceased was 76 years of age. He leaves a wife, three sons, Abram and Wm. of Spaniard's Bay, and Egan, of Torbay, and three daughters, Mrs. Richard Sheppard, Mrs. Herbert Greaves and Miss Ethel Sheppard to mourn their loss.

The funeral took place on Monday, and was attended by a large number of the members of the Orange Society, of which he was a member. Rev. J. S. Adams conducted the funeral service, and preached from Hebrews 4, 9, 'There remaineth therefore a rest to the people of God.'—Hr. Grace Standard please copy.

The Raid On England

A small German fleet consisting of three cruisers made a sudden dash into the North Sea on Wednesday morning last and shelled Hartlepool and Scarborough, two cities on the east coast, a little over 200 miles north of London. Several buildings were damaged and a number of people were killed and wounded. Fifteen schoolboys were killed by a single shell. Ten people were killed by the collapse of a building. The Germans refused to give battle, and hurried away followed by British cruisers. What the object of the raid was and how the Germans got past the British patrols and the mine fields is not exactly known.

The Causes and the Progress of the Great War

Being a Lecture delivered by His Excellency Sir Walter Edward Davidson, K. C. M. G., Governor of Newfoundland, etc.

(Continued) Finally, how does this mighty struggle come home to us? And in answering this question, I prefer to quote largely from a speech made by Lord Rosebery, one of our greatest men, who puts the case better than I can myself. He says every man valid and capable of bearing arms is bound at the call of his country to do so. 'It is a war of nations, and our nation, if it is to uphold itself, will not be able to remain aloof. We are fighting on the Continent it is true, but we are fighting in defense of Great Britain. There is one thing that is perfectly clear in all this matter, it is that those who go to fight will go to fight in a righteous cause. We are fighting for the independence of Belgium against a Power which guaranteed it, and has destroyed it. We are fighting for the freedom of France, a friendly Power who is allied with ourselves. But we are also fighting for the sanctity of the public law, which, if our enemies shall be the conquerors, is torn up and destroyed for ever. When the German Foreign Secretary was asked if he were really going to infringe the neutrality of Belgium, he said: 'You are not going to war for that going to war for a scrap of paper? A great Power that treats scraps of paper like that is not unlikely to be scrapped herself. The German Chancellor, when he vindicated this policy in Parliament said: 'We knew we were doing wrong in invading the neutrality of Belgium, but we were compelled to do wrong. A nation that begins a great war by declaring that its foundation is wrong, and that it is obliged to do wrong, is likely to fare badly if there be a God in Heaven. 'Then we are not merely fighting for Belgium, France and the sanctity of public law, but we are also fighting for ourselves. We do not fight to gain an acre of territory. We only fight to secure our liberties against an oppression which would be intolerable. 'I know that we have seen wars in our time in which the loss of a province or two ended the war. That will not be so. You may lose territory and you may lose money, but what is certain is this, that if you are beaten to your knees, if you are compelled to submit, you will lose infinitely more than province or money. Make no mistake this is a fight to a finish. If we go under now we go under for ever. I do not ask you to suggest to yourselves that you will go under for a moment. But if you are not going under every man who is capable of defending his country is bound to step into the breach. 'Just think, try and imagine what it would be if we were beaten. I do not suppose we should be annexed as a province. That is unthinkable. To see foreign uniforms, foreign police, foreign laws, foreign tax-gatherers in our country—that I discard as absolutely impossible. But there is another very improbable contingency which might happen, which would happen if we were defeated which is that we would be reduced at once to an inferior power, living at the good-will of our superior Lord, living on sufferance, our Army limited, our Navy limited, our Empire cut up and divided among the plunderers—a position so abject that we cannot realize it. If we were to sink to be a third-rate power in the position that I have described, I, for one, would from my heart and soul rather that all our people as they now exist were to pass into exile and into death and leave our island vacant for some superior race. 'I can see, at any rate, in a mere cheerful vein. Make no mistake about it, we shall win. We are fighting with our back to the wall to prevent a shame and defeat such as England has never sustained and is not now prepared to endure. We are going to win because a Nation and an Empire like ours cannot be extinguished by any such warfare as this. We are going to win because we have our people united as they never have been before. We are going to win because our Dominions and Empires outside these

Islands vie with each other in generous emulation as to which shall give us most support in supplies and money and men. Above all, we are going to win because we have a high, a pure, and a just cause, and we can appeal with humble but, I think, earnest confidence to Him who in the words of the beautiful old paraphrase we recognize as the 'God of Bethel by Whose hand Our people still are led.'

Bombs in French Dummy Airship

Paris, Nov.—In Upper Alsace, where the trenches of both sides are separated only 50 metres, a French ruse caused terrible havoc in the German lines. Last week a dummy airship appeared over the German trenches. Three Taubes immediately attacked it, exploding the airship with bombs. As it fell, however, hundreds of bombs also were dropped amid the Germans, annihilating an entire regiment. Three dummy aeronautes were also hurled from the airship.

The Pope's Offer Not Accepted

Rome, Dec. 14.—The Observatore Romano, the Vatican Organ, referring to the efforts of Pope Benedict to bring about a truce during the Christmas season among the warring Powers, says: 'His Holiness the Pontiff, in homage faith and devotion to Christ, the Redeemer, who is the Prince of Peace, and also believing the sentiments of humanity toward the warring Powers, confidentially addressed a peaceful note, confidentially, to the belligerent Governments, to ascertain how they would receive the proposal of a truce during such a solemn festival as Christmas. All the Powers declared they highly appreciated the loftiness of the Pontiff's initiative, and a majority gave their sympathetic adherence to the truce, but some did not feel able to agree to it. Thus lacking the necessary unanimity, the Pope has been unable to reach the benevolent result which the paternal heart of His Holiness promised himself.'

Some of Our Boys in Blue

A statement of the number of Naval Reservists who left by the S. S. Franconia and the S. S. Carthaginian has been issued by Lieutenant-Commander A. MacDermott of H. M. S. Calypso. By districts the 464 men are divided thus: St. John's District 60, Trinity Bay 60, Bonavista Bay 60, Port de Grave District 56, Fogo District 20, Placentia & St. Mary's Dist. 20, Twillingate District 18, Harbor Main District 16, Burin District 14, St. Barbe District 10, St. George's District 10, Ferryland District 4, Burgeo & La Pêche District 1, Fortune District 1, From other countries 3.

These 464 good men and true hail from 131 different towns or settlements. These places which were numbered with 5 or more representatives on the Franconia and Carthaginian, are: St. John's 39, Bay Roberts 18, Fogo 15, Port de Grave 14, Flat Islands, B.E. 14, Portugal Cove 11, Brigus 10, Greenspond 10, Shearstown 4, Trinity 4, Hedge's Cove 4, Catalina 3, Caley's Point 3, Upper Island Cove 7, Harbor Grace 7, Gooseberry Island 7, Spaniard's Bay 5, Long Beach, T.B. 5, Alexander Bay 5, Twillingate 5, St. Lawrence 5. The information contained in the statement will materially aid in the compilation of Who's Who in the Naval Reserve.—Daily News.

Test Actions

Two interesting actions at law were initiated yesterday by Mr. Morine, K. C., for the purpose of getting a definition from the Supreme Court for trade expressions in common use in this country. Lorenzo Noseworthy, of Spaniard's Bay, sued W. A. Minn, of this city, for certain fish sold and delivered in Labrador and for which receipts were obtained in which the price was expressed to be at 'current price.'

Both the claimants allege that as much as \$4.50 per quintal had been paid for Labrador fish, and they claim this highest amount. The Court will be asked to define the exact meaning of the expressions referred to, and it is for this reason really that the actions are being brought. It is understood that a large number of planters and fishermen connected with the Labrador trade are awaiting the results of these actions this year. The F. P. C., in, of course, behind the plaintiffs in their proceedings in the interests of the fishermen generally.—Mail and Advocate.

Where the Russians Are

In East Prussia the Russian army is near the River Angerapp, 340 miles from Berlin. In Poland the Russians are engaged in battle with the Germans on a line extending from Ikon, on the Vistula, 40 miles west of Warsaw and 275 miles from Berlin, to Petrokov, south of Lodz and 280 miles from Berlin. In Galicia they are before Cracow, 330 miles from Berlin.

'It's everywhere the same story. In peace it's 'Confound your stupid, unreasonable, fat-headed, doomed, arrogant soul!' In time of need it's 'Count on us to the limit!' Which is why we say that the British Empire is a queer, queer institution!

Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Canso, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraph Service in existence. A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00. A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50. To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word. Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round by Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radii of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray. Telegram messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. 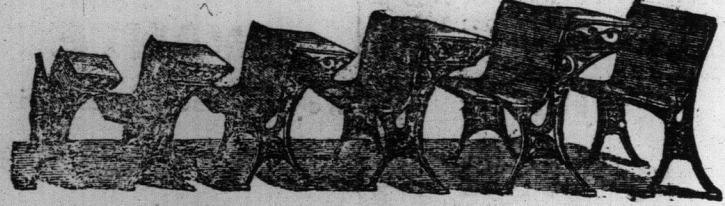

Shrapnel vs. Maxim

What is the most deadly form of fire in modern war? The 'rafale,' or shrapnel shower! The 'rafale,' given a fair chance, would kill more men in less time than any other known device for mass-murder, not excluding even the maxim. A signal brigade of the British artillery, containing 16 guns, is able to spray a given area up to 6,000 yards with 4,284 bullets in two seconds. The same number of maxim guns would deliver only 800 bullets in the same time, and their greatest range is some 2,900 yards. The shrapnel shell is a hollow steel case containing a nest of bullets and a bursting charge of an ounce and a quarter of fine powder.

Greece to Come to Serbia's Aid

Rome, Dec. 7.—In the tangled skein in Balkan State politics certain threads are beginning to show clearly. One may lead very soon to a friendly understanding between Bulgaria and Serbia, another toward an alliance between Serbia and Greece. In Ministerial circles here it is known that conferences are now being held between the Serbian Minister and the Bulgarian Government in Sofia, between the Bulgarian envoy and the Serbian Government at Niš, and between the Ministers of Great Britain, Russia and France and the Greek Government in Athens. Unquestionably there is a better outlook for such a rapprochement between embittered Balkan States as will bring Bulgaria and Greece into the war as allies of Serbia and powerful supporters of the Triple Entente.

German Money Being Sent to Ireland

London— Astonishing revelations were made at a meeting of the Dublin Corporation, over which Lord Mayor Nugent presided, when it was alleged that money is being circulated in Ireland by German agents. Ald. Kelly denied, on behalf of himself and his friends that they were getting German money. Lord Mayor Nugent—'I repeat, German money is being circulated.' The Lord Mayor said circulars from America were going through the post containing some of the vilest things ever uttered in the name of Ireland. Some had reached him that morning. German money had been sent to Ireland, but the gentlemen sending it found they were not getting good value and were cautious about sending more. Regarding the war, the Lord Mayor said: 'If Britain had not interfered she would have been denounced by the very gentlemen now criticizing. Is it because Britain has not been cowardly and has not re-enacted the Treaty of Limerick that we in Ireland should pocket all our views and become pro-German?' The Corporation defeated by forty-one votes to seven a proposal to postpone the resolution expressing satisfaction over the passing of the Home Rule Bill. Mr. Devlin hoped to have the Irish Parliament on College Green within twelve months.

If we all—men, women and children—resolve to work harder and better than before, we shall very soon overtake the losses of war. If the spirit survives.' Nations fight, not with armies and navies alone, but with resources. The allies are vastly superior to Germany in natural resources, but in order to be available sources of strength, these resources must be developed. As the 'Spectator' says, men, women and children must resolve to work harder and better than before. 'Business as Usual.' Let that be our motto in Canada as well as in England and all over the British Empire. Yet not quite as usual. Let us feel that we are doing business with a purpose—not to accumulate money, but to add to the stock of useful things-useful in war as well as in peace.—Toronto Star, Sept. 1, 1914.

German Submarines Attack Dover

London, Dec. 10.—A half dozen German submarines made an attempt at 6.30 this morning to enter the Admiralty Harbor, according to a Dover despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company, and for half an hour the batteries kept up a furious fusillade, firing at least two hundred shots. It is reported that two or three of the submarines were sunk, but this is not confirmed.

Proclamation

By His Excellency Sir WALTER EDWARD DAVIDSON, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

Whereas it is provided by Chapter 23, of 2 Edward VII, entitled 'An Act to amend the Post Office Act, 1891,' that upon the recommendation of the Board appointed under the provisions of the said Act, the Governor in Council shall, by Proclamation, give notice of any alteration of name, naming or re-naming of places within this Colony, provided that Public Notice of such proposed alteration of name, naming, or re-naming of places shall have been given for three months previous;

And whereas by Public Notice of date the 16th day of June, 1914, certain alterations of name and re-naming of places within this Colony were notified, as required by the above mentioned Act; I do, therefore, by this my Proclamation, order and direct that the alterations of name and re-naming of places within this Colony, as contained in the said Public Notice of the 16th day of June, 1914, shall come into effect from the date of these Presents, that is to say:—
1. Sibley's Cove, Placentia Bay, to be renamed "Prowseton."
2. Chance Harbor, near Moreton's Harbor, Notre Dame Bay, to be renamed "Bridgeport."
3. Chance Harbor, Friday's Bay, Notre Dame Bay, to be re-named "Chanceport."
4. Farmer's Arm, Dildo Run, Notre Dame Bay, to be renamed "Summerford."
5. The Western section of Mortier Bay, extending from West's Point to Glendon, (including Butler's Cove), to be renamed "Creston."
6. Piper's Hole, Placentia Bay, to be renamed "Swift Current."

On and after the 26th inst., Telegraph Addresses registered prior to 1st July, 1914, may be used as the Address, but not as the signature in telegrams (a) between any two places in British territory including Egypt, (b) between each and any of the following:—British territory including Egypt, territory of allied countries, United States of America, provided in all cases that either Sender or Addressee of both are resident outside Europe. In the case of telegrams emanating from British territory and destined for the territory of an allied power or for the United States of America, the full name and address of the addressee will be given by the sender, but not telegraphed. When the Censor is located at the office of destination he may at his discretion require the office to give the full name and address at which a telegram is to be delivered.

Admiralty Message to Tokio

'Invaluable Help.'

The following telegrams have passed between the First Lord of the Admiralty and Vice-Admiral Yashiro, Minister of Marine at Tokio:

From the First Lord to Vice-Admiral Yashiro, Minister of Marine at Tokio:—

I desire, on behalf of the British Admiralty and the whole Navy, to express at this crucial stage of the war our deep sense of the efforts and energy with which the Japanese navy is sustaining the cause of the Allies. Apart from the great object of the extermination of the main German base in the Pacific, Japanese ships and squadrons are everywhere giving us help of an invaluable character in the protection of trade, the search for enemy ships, and the convey of troops to the decisive theatre of the conflict.

From Vice-Admiral Yashiro, Minister of Marine at Tokio, to the First Lord of the Admiralty:—

On behalf of the Imperial Japanese navy I tender my warmest thanks for your sincere and cordial message, and assure you that it is a matter of the utmost satisfaction to us both that perfect harmony and understanding exist everywhere between the two allied Navies, which strikes the true note of the main object of the compact, and which will certainly tend to hasten the attainment of the ultimate goal. I earnestly hope that it will not be long before this end is successfully achieved.
