### LABOR SUCCESS AT HAND.

ITH eleven Labor representatives elected, a gain of ten, the workers' party of the Province of Ontario is entitled to elation, denying that these positions are gained for any sectional advantage, but for the good of the whole province. It is really the first occasion that a serious attempt was made to have direct representation. True, isolated seats have been contested with the result that the lone "Grand Old Man," the late Allan Studholme, of Hamilton, was the only one to gain and retain a place in the Provincial Parliament. His splendid isolation was only conceded after vigorous attempts had been made to wrest the seat from him. In this particular it can be recalled that at the last general election he contested, the "big guns" were taken to Hamilton, including the late Sir James Whitney, to show his constituents how unnecessary was his presence in the Provincial House. As is well known these efforts were fruitless and to his memory Hamilton now dedicates the full Labor representation of two.

By many the peculiar and unexpected situation in the elections is ascribed to the general unrest. Labor may also join in this concession but will more readily agree the real cause is to the political parties themselves who have regularly presented appetizing programmes, but lacking the finishing touch of execution.

This success of Labor is but the beginning of the worker's awakening in the hanner province. True the direct representatives form but a small percentage of

Pleas on behalf of munition work-ers who went overseas from Canada to work in British munitions factor-ies during the war period were made

or any new schemes accepted for the re-establishment of returned men.

Both witnesses told the committee that Hon. Dr. Barnes, who headed the British labor mission, which came to Canada in 1915, had assured Canadian worken that they would earn from four to ten pounds per week in British factories.

Many proceeded overseas, and when they arrived they received less than three pounds, and even in 1919 they had not been increased to four pounds. There was a separation allowance for men who left their wives in Canada only. Owing to the small pay, the sums workers were able to send home were insufficient, with the result that when they returned home they found their families in distress.

BACK PAY FOR EX-SOLDIERS.

resolutions will be considered at a conference at Caxton Hall, London:

"This conference of ex-Service men calls upon the nation to fulfill its financial obligations towards those who served in the Forces during the war. The country cannot be permitted to take advantage of their having deferred their claims until the war was over.

"This Conference demands now that every man who served during the war shall receive as back pay'the difference between what he actually, received and the rate of 6s. a day (the rate paid to the Australian troops).

"Further, no refusal of this claim can be tolerated so long as the people of Britain remain dispossessed of the land which is their natural inheritance, and which, if restored to them, would enable the entire cost of its defence to be met in full."—The Daily Herald.


