



> OTTAWA, April 10.—The statement of revenue and expenditure of the Dominion for the fiscal year ending March 31st last, representing the receipts and payments which have passed through the books of the finance department up to the last day of the month, shows total revenue of \$94,708,982, and total expenditure on consolidated fund account of \$65,093,374. These figures, of course, do not represent the full returns for the year which will not be available for several weeks yet. When the final balnce for the year is struck it is expected the total revenue will be fully \$96,500,000, and the total consolidated fund expenditure about \$79,000,000, thus leaving a surplus of approximately \$17,500,000, as estimated by Hon. Mr. Fielding in his budget speech. The total revenue for the preceding twelve months was \$86,805,494. The increase for the past fiscal year was therefore, about \$9,700,000. The publis debt of Canada on March 31st last last was \$220,545,7277, as compared with OTTAWA, April 10.-The statemen lis debt of Canada on March 31st last was \$260,545,7277, as compared with \$252,576,841 on corresponding date 1907.



BOSTON, April 10.—News of the arrest in western Macedonia of a band of Mahometan Albanians, including the alleged slayer of Bishop Photias of Goritsa, was received in this city yes-

The despatch stated that the slayer of the bishop, Topoulis Bailo, had just arrived fromo Boston with a band of Albanians, and when arrested by the Macedonian authorities papers were found in their possession showing that they were sent by the anti-Hellenic faction of the Boston Albanians to assassinate the present Greek bishop of Goritsa.

Bailo, the leader of the band, who Ballo, the leader of the band, who has been travelling in America for the past ten months collecting money for his countrymen, arrived at Preveyo about two weeks ago. Hhe stopped with a number of his followers at a hotel and while intoxicated boasted, it is alleged, that he was the slayer of Bishop Photias. The entire party was taken into custody.

year ago by a man who asked for his blessing and the assassin escaped.

While Bailo was here it is said he boasted at a meeting held at 173 Pleasant street that he had killed the bishop. ant street that he had killed the bishop. The local Greeks attempted to have him extradited by the Turkish authorities, but falled. Bailo then went throughout New England collecting funds for an Albanian revolution.

Demosthenes B. Terzakis, editor of the Metanastis, the local Greek paper, said last evening that agents of the sultan were here to create factions among the young Albanians and to arouse the fanaticism of the Mohametan Albanians against Christians in Macedonia, and he believes the men arrested yesterday are in the employ Macedonia, and he believes the men arrested yesterday are in the employ of the Turkish government.

According to a prominent Greek manufacturer of this city, the Macedonian Philhellenic committee of Boston knew of the departure of the band, as the latter made no attempt to keep their affairs secret. 

Holding Lands Under Seignoral System

DALHOUSIE, N. B., April 10.—There is great rejoining in Bonaventure County, P. Q., over the speech delivered on Wednesday in the Quebec legis ed on Wednesday in the Quebec legis-lature by John Hall Kelly, M. P. P., in favor of legislation to give power to the municipalities to assist in the pur-chase of lands which are occupied by, farmers under the seignoral system. Most of these farms, upon which rent is being paid, are located in the town-ship of Shoolbred, which is situated op-posite the parish of Dalhousie, Restiship of Shoolbred, which is situated opposite the parish of Dalhousie, Restiguence County, and the landlords are asking exorbitant figures to sell out. This tenure of farms under the self-noral plan has been a curse in Bonaventure, and it is no wonder that the people are jubilant over the action of their representative.

The town of Dalhousie has succeeded in selling sixty-two thousand dollars.

The town of Dalhousie has succeeded in selling sixty-two thousand dollars worth of bonds, mostly taken up in St. John, at a fair margin considering the condition of the money market. The town council will ask for power at the coming session of the legislature to issue town bonds for thirteen thousand dollars more to complete a most up-to-date water system. This will make the debt of the town \$75,000, a pretty heavy liability for a small town of only twelve hundred souls. Still the people are hopeful, as new industries are starting up and the Dalhousie Lumber Co., which has increased its capital from three hundred thousand to seven hundred thousand dollars, is now erecting a large modern saw and rossing mill which will employ a great many hands besides a large extension to their shingle mill. 


