MUNICIPAL COUNCIL-JULY MEETING. The half yearly meeting of the Municipal Council

of this County took place on the 17th, 18th, and 19th last. The minutes are published in the Scatinel of the 28th. The business transacted by the Council was almost all of a routine nature. A legal opinion from L. P. Fisher on the questions "Can Assessments on non-resident property be collected by legal process? Can they be collected from Estates where the heirs are known or not known (as the case may be), or whether the property be divided or undivided;" was laid before the meeting. The Committee on printing the Bye-Laws reported that the work had been let by tender to Mr. Watts for £15, and that, although hindered by the fire, the contract would soon be completed! Tae new County Auditor, Mr. James H. Jacques, reported that he could not understand the Auditor's Book "placed in his hands in January last." The County grounds or a portion of them, having been fenced in, a committee was appointed to let the enclosed portion for a term of years, Various Justices of the Peace who had not properly accounted for Defaulters lists put in their hands for collection were taken k, and severely-threatened. Sanitary Commissioners for the various Parishes were appointed.

ECCLESIASTICAL PRECEDENCE.

A fearful hubbub has been raised by some of the St. John papers, secular and religious, about the question of ecclesiastical precedence in this Province. It seems that the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of New Brunswick, at its recent meeting, instructed its moderator to apply to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor for information upon this matter. In reply to this request Mr. Tilley wrote by command of His Excellency, that "according to Imperial rules, which regulate precedence in this and other colonies, the Bishops of the Church England and of the Poman Catholic Church. take precedence next after the officer in commune of Her Majesty's troops; and that the Bishop of he Church of England takes precedence of the Roman Catholic Bishop."

The Rev. Mr. Ferrie, a minister of the Presby terian Church of New Branswick, communicated with some severe and characteristically anti-Po pish observations on the rule as therein set forth. This was the signal for the commencement of furious clamour, the Presbyterian, Religious In telligencer, and Globe waxing fiercely Protestant and fearfully eloquent over such a stigma upon the Protestant sects as that a dignitary of the Roman Catholic Church should have this prece dence. We have always regarded a number of the papers called "religious" as the most un-Christian, bitter, prejudiced, ungenerous, illiberal and upreasonable section of the press; and this discussion strengthens us in the opinion .- But they find an able and most willing condinter in the Globe. This matter is quite a windfall for it. It had worked the land cry to death, and was evidently sadly in want of fresh fact for the fire of sectarian ranco ur, upon the feeding and farning of which it has recently entered with so much Chris tian fervor. Its issue of the 28th last contains a a mificent specimen of the irritating, venemous hate, breeding lucubration. It is a leading arti cle of the stereotyped Scarlet Lady-Anti Christ-Abomination of Desolation-Where of Babylon style, - the style so much affected by ranting field preachers and newspaper polemics whose only object in dealing with the subject of religious differences appears to be to strengthen the prejudices and aggravate the ill-feelings of their easily moved hearers or readers.

We may say at once that we by no means ap prove of the rule of ecclesiastical precedence which appears to be established. We think that as in our Province there is no state church, and no church or churches entitled to any peculiar privileges above others, the question of percedence should be settled in some way which would recognize the claims of each to be put on a footing of perfect equality with all the others. Some ole arrangement might be made which would do justice to all. But if there is any cause of complaint in this matter, why not set about its removalin a calm and rational manner? Why all And why attack so furiously the Reman Catholic Church for an arrangement made by the Governnen; of Great Britain? Why attack or abus myone or anything until we endeavor to have so right that which we believe to be wrong? When we have asked to have the rule amended, and peen refused, it will be time enough to work our elves into a fory about it. Is it not possible or the people and press of New Branswick t arrange a question of precedence without work ng themselves into a fury resembling that of two ipsy polemics discussing a doctrinal question in tap room !
