# WORLD'S BEST RIDERS START

New York, Dec. 7—Seventeen teams composed of the best bicycle riders in the world, with the exception of Walter Rutt, of Germany, a three times winner, who is incapacitated through an injury, and Frank Kramer, the world's champion sprinter, are competitors in the annual six day race beginning a few seconds after midnight tonight in Madison Square Garden, This is the twenty-first race of the kind to be held in the big garden, and the fifteenth since, to conform to a local ordinance, the contest was arranged for teams.

While many of the entrants for this year's grind have taken part in previous races here there are several new names on the list and never before has the make-up of the teams been som markedly international in character. Last year new records were established during the first four days, and part of the fifth, but after that stage the pace dwindled and Rutt and Fogler, the winning team, had covered only 2,661 miles and five laps, far behind the record of 2,737 miles, one lap, made by McFarland and Moran in 1908.

Expected He Will Agree to Be come Premier of France -Forms Provisional Cabinet.

Paris, Dec. 7.—Although Senator Gaston Doumergue has deferred until tomorrow notitying President Poincare that he will take the responsibility of forming a ministry; it is believed that he will accept the task imposed upon him. He arranged a provisional cabinet this afterhoon, which included for minister of foreign atfairs either Alexandre Felix Ribot, Jean Dupuy, or Theophile Delcasse. This proved a stumbling block, as neither M. Ribot for M. Dupuy would accept the office, and it is generally thought that M. Delcasse, who is now in St. Petersburg, as ambassador to Russia, will also refuse in view of the effect his nomination would have on opinion abroad, notably in Germany. It is therefore considered probable that M. Doumergue will eventually take the foreign office himself, following the example of M. Polncare when he was premier.

Other members of M. Doumergue's provisional cabinet, including General Dubbail as minister of war, with General Sarria as chief of staff, are: Navy, M. Noulens, now undersecretary of war; Instruction, M. Niviani; Finance, Joseph Calllaux; Commerce, Fernand David; Agriculture, Louis Malvy or Maurice Rainaud; Colonies, M. Lebrun; Public Works, M. L'Hopiteau; Labor, Rene Renault.

Moderate opinion, while it would have preferred M. Ribot, M. Dupuy, or some other statesman less committed to advanced views, considers M. Doumergue reasonably safe as premier. There is apprehension among the Conservatives that M. Doumergue, when in doubt, will accept the counsel of M. Caillaux, the radical leader, or ex-Premier Clemenceau. 



If one cares to figure how much Lemle lifted all he has to do is to compute to total weight of the two dumb-bells, or sixty-eight pounds, and multiply it by 2,222. The aggregate figures will be staggering. When Lemle finished he still had plenty of power, speed and endurance in reserve, but having surpassed all previous marks he stopped. Had it been necessary he could have continued for another hour, he believes.

That Lemle is a wrestler in the fullest sense of the term has been proven by his matches in this country. Though green a year ago at catch-as-catch-can he made Zbyszko, the "Mighty Pole,' travel faster than the Pole has been forced to go in a long time and their match at Boston is still regarded as the classlest thing of its kind that the Hub has yet seen.

Against the greatest Greco-Roman wrestler now living, Alex Aberg, he showed wonderfully and this, too, will be looked upon as one of the most thrilling contests that has ever been decided in this country. Lemle listraining hard and those who see him perform are due for a treat.

Lemle has a fine personality, with a boyish appearance, but those who known wrestling figure that before long he must be reckoned with when the possession of the world's championship is considered.
