Lord Robert Cecil Shows How Germans Twisted Meaning of Instructions Given to British Ships to Suit Their Own Purpose.

New York, Feb. 29.—Only a small proportion of the shipping plying between American and European ports—a fleet of armed Italian merchantmen—appears to be menaced by the new Teutonic submarine policy, which soes into effect at midright.

British and French ships that have arrived here and at other Atlantic ports during the past year have carried no guns. Seven Italian ships, with naval guns mounted on their after decks and manned by trained crews from the Italian navy, have been plying between New York and Mediterranean ports since the first of the year, and one, similarly armed,

The steamship Giuseppi Verdi, the first itain liner to arrive here thus prined, is due to leave port tomorrow, this being her second round trip as an armed vessel. Her agents had not ascertained today the number of passengers she will carry, but believed that the number would not be large, the majority being third class.

FORTY UNARMED BRITISH VESSELS SUNK WITHOUT WARNING UP TO END OF 1915

London, Feb. 29-The Admiralty tonight made public a list of "unarmed British vessels torpedged and sunk by enemy submarines, without warning," up to the end of 1915. It comprises thirty-nine steam-

A list also was given of neutral vessels said to have been to doed in the same period without warning, consisting of thirteen steamers and one sailing vessel, of which two, the Guiffight and Nebraskan were American, four Norwegian, four Swedish, one Dutch, one Danish, one Greek, and one Portuguese.



Representative stooks, including rails and U. S. Steel, shaded materially from early maximums, retaining little or none of their advantage at the heavy close. 

Outch Government to Tax War Profits.

London, Feb. 29.—According to a Reuter despatch from The Hague tt is stated there that the Dutch government will shortly introduce a bill proposing a 25 per cent. tax on war profits.

TEMPERANCE MEASURES IN WAR TIME

Those who are at present engaged in an effort to bring the Province of New Brunswick under the Prohibition law, partly under the guise of a war measure, should turn to the great European Nations at war and learn what they are doing in the cause of Temperance, as a contributory factor in the

winning of the War.

ENGLAND

In the munition areas only, there has been a curtailment in the sale of liquor to five and one-half hours per day. This does not apply to the rest of the country. Indeed in several districts the dissatisfaction caused by such penalization has caused the government to withdraw several drastic proposals. The British Government serves out to its soldiers 21/2 ounces of rum twice a week, with an additional half ration on each of

the other days, to the men in the trenches, while during the very bad weather the full ration of 21/2 ounces has been given daily to the men in the trenches. It is worthy of note that in cases where the hours of sale have been reduced the British Government have compensated the license holders affected, thus recognizing in principle the right of the latter to proper compensation.

RUSSIA

Russia's contribution to temperance reform is the abolition of the manufacture and sale of vodka, a cheap and dangerous spirit. Whether the results will be entirely satisfactory is yet in question, owing to the enormous increase in illicit stills, manufacturing vodka, wood alcohol and other noxious preparations. The element of compensation does not enter into the Russian question, as the manufacture of vodka was a government monopoly.

The Minister of Commerce recommends the sale of beer and wines containing not more than 16 per cent. of alcohol. Ten thousand bottles of wine per day were distributed among the troops at Warsaw.

FRANCE

Apart from the abolition of absinthe, a very dangerous spirit, the French Government has not adopted prohibitory measure. In fact, the French soldiers are regularly supplied with wine, and, at times spirits. The entrance of beer and wines into towns and cities of France is facilitated by the removal of the

BELGIUM

The last statistics supplied by Belgium form interesting reading, in view of the outstanding vigor and valor of her people. Apart from wines and spirits, the annual consumption of beer per capita in Belgium was 58 gallons-over a gallon a week -an astonishing figure when one considers the corresponding figure in Canada is less than seven per annum.

If in these countries where the problems of the war are closer home, prohibition is not thought necessary, why should New Brunswick adopt this measure?
