In this regard it will be noted that this company is one of the very few public utilities in Canada which has not increased its charges anywhere from ten to fifty per cent. during the past few years. We have now reached the point where, in order to keep our revenue sufficiently above our expenses, it will be necessary for us to apply for permission to increase our charges.

NEW BRUNSWICKERS WITH N. S. BATT.

Lt.-Col. Mersereau, O. C. of the 25th — Capt. Barbour and Lt. Lounsbury of Frederickton With Them.

Fredericton, May 18.—The 25th Nova Scotia Battalion, which returned from overseas to Halifax on the Olympic, Messereau, D. S. O., a New Brunswick officer.
Lieut.-Col. Mersereau, who is only recently returned from overseas himself, was one of the first New Brunswick officers to volunteer for active service at the outbreak of war. He has been in the corps of guides and was a brigade major with the Canadian corps when he was so seriously wounded in 1915 that his recovery did not seem possible.
However, in 1917, Col. Mersereau was able to return overseas again and for some time held a brigade post with the 2nd military division last summer when he became the commanding officer of the 25th Battalion, afterwards having his appointment confirmed. During the period of his convalescence in Canada Col. Mersereau, who had at one time been attached to the R. C. R., held a position on the staff of No. 6 military district with headquarters at Halifax.
Another son of Lieut.-Col. G. W. Mersereau returned with the 25th Battalion in the person of Capt. Harry Mersereau, who has been medical officer of the unit. He took an ambulance unit overseas from Montreal, Quebec, and later transferred to the 25th Battalion. Mrs. H. F. McLeod, Mrs. W. J.
