London, May 23-Both the Armentieres and Somme front have been decidedly active during the past twenty-four hours, the deluges of gas at Bethune and the violent artillery action east of Amiens featuring the reports of the Anglo-French leaders. Scores of reconnaissance raids and patrol encounters are reported along a wide battlefront. Both sides are showing anxiety for a test of the strength of the forces in the various sectors.
