THE C. AND I. EXHIBITION. THE QUEEN'S VISIT TO THE CANADIAN SECTION.

(Special to the Sun.) Toronto, May 5.—A special cable to the Globe regarding the opening of the Nearly 500 in S. Andrew's School House, Colonial Exhibition, says: Nearly 500 guests, specially invited by the Commiswitnessed the royal procession, which began to arrive at the Canadian court shortly after ten. Excellent ar-rangements had been made for their accommodation, and by eleven o'clock every seat was occupied. At two minutes to twelve the National Anthem, heard at a distance, announced the arrival of the distance, announced the arrival of the Queen at the chief entrances, but not till 12.30 did the procession reach the Canadian court. Proceeding by the appointed route, kept by the Chenadiers and police, Her Majesty reached the Canadian court by the entrance in 'the centre, passing under the trophy of British Columbia's woods, where seats had been specially reserved for Lady Tupper and the wives of the Canadian executive. Thence the Queen proceeded along the full length of the Canadian court, the visitors occupy-Admission Free. A Silver collection will be taken at the close in the interest of the Baptist Sunday School. Queen proceeded along the full length of the Canadian court, the visitors occupy-ing specially erected seats on either sides up to the exit to the gardens. An appeal for three good Canadian cheers for the Queen obtained hearty responses. Her Majesty was received with great enthusiasm throughout the court. Sir Charles Tupper and Mons. Fabre officially repre-sented Canada in the royal procession. Canada deserves special credit for having a catalogue of the section ready by the opening day. Copies were sent last night to members of the royal commission and press, and was on sale to-day. It extends over nearly three hundred pages, and gives a full list of Canadian exhibits, map of Canada, special plan of exhibition, showing Canadian courts, and brief de-

scription of the chief features of the Dominion. Two handsomely bound copies were presented to the Queen and Prince of Wales. Among the guests in the Canadian court were Mr. and Mrs. Jas. I and Miss Fellows of St. John, and Mr. Ketchum of Fredericton, and Ira Cornwall, jr., the agent general of New Brunswick. An extra of the Canada Gazette contains a telegram received by the Gover-nor-General from the Prince of Wales relating to the opening of the Exhibition.

It is addressed to the Queen from the Prince as President of the exhibition,

Prince as President of the exhibition, reciting the Queen's interest in the exhibition and the interest taken in it by India and the Colonies, thanking the Viceroy and the several governments for their assistance, referring to the first exhibition in London, alluding to the exhibition in London, alluding to the ibits sent to this one and expressing the hope that the commercial interests of the Empire may be benefitted by the exhibi-tion and tend to maintain loyalty to the

tion and tend to maintain loyalty to the Throne. The Queen, in reply said:—
"I receive with the greatest satisfaction the address which you have presented to me on the opening of this Exhibition.—
I have observed with a warm and increasing interest the progress of your proceedings in the execution of the duties entrusted to you by the Royal Commission, and it affords me sincere gratification to witness the successful result of your indicious and unremitting exertions in judicious and unremitting exertions in the magnificent exhibition which has been gathered together here to-day. I am deeply moved by your reference to the circumstances in which the ceremony of 1851 took place, and I heartily concur in the belief you have expressed, that the Prince Consort, my beloved husband, had been spared, would have witnessed with intense interest the development of his ideas, and would, I may add, have seen with pleasure our son taking the lead in the movement of which he was the originator. I cordially concur with you in the prayer that this undertaking may be the means of imparting a stimulus to the commercial interest and intercourse of all parts of my dominions by encourage ing the arts of peace and industry which now exist between every part of my em-


