 HIS DOGS NOT WIDE ENOUGH.  
 TREASURY AGENT SMITH HAS TO KEEP HIS MOOSE HEAD IN HIS OFFICE.  
 Boston, April 25.—Col. Converse J. Smith, special agent of the United States Treasury department, received this week a magnificent mounted moose head, which he has displayed in his office in Federal building.  
 It is believed the moose must have weighed more than 1,000 pounds. He was captured in the province of Quebec, in the vicinity of Riviere-Louis, the famous moose district, and a great fishing resort, and was presented to Colonel Smith by Mr. J. H. Galt, general manager of the Temiscouata railway.  
 The head is one of the finest ever seen in New England, and is attracting much attention. The distance between the antlers, which are 32 inches long, is 3 feet 7 inches. The distance from the tip of the antlers to the forehead measures 2 feet, and the ears are 10 inches long.  
 Col. Smith tried to get the fine specimen into his house, but only the outer double doors were broad enough to admit it.

**DEATH OF MR. GEORGE W. DAY.**  
 ST. JOHN LOSES AN OLD AND HIGHLY RESPECTED CITIZEN.  
 Mr. George W. Day died yesterday morning, after a long illness, at his residence 61 Pitt street, after an illness of only one week of bronchitis. By his death the city loses an active citizen, and one who for over half a century has been most actively engaged in all that pertained to the welfare of St. John. A printer by trade he was a printer through all his life and has seen many changes for the better in the art preservative of arts. Mr. Day was born in this city in 1824, and was therefore in his 74th year. While yet a child, he went to New York with his parents, and later to the "Tobacco" where he remained until the death of his father and mother; then, at the age of 12 years, he removed to Woodstock, where he located as apprentice to Mr. William Gilbert, who published the first paper in that town. The boy's next change was to return to his native city, where he continued in the printing business under Mr. G. E. Fenby for a time, and also with the late Mr. J. McMillan. In 1847 just 20 years ago, he started on business for himself. Since then, up till two years ago, he has been steadily engaged in that business. He has published more papers, probably than any other man in St. John, of whom some he was publisher, and some he also owned at periods in his useful life. He was the first printer of the Daily Telegraph, and continued in that position till the Telegraph set up its own office. This paper was printed by the fire of 1877, and once more, for some months, till it was again established in quarters of its own. Mr. Day was a printer. He for a time owned and published the True Patriotist, and has also published the Messenger and Visitor. Lately he has

**THE FRESHET!**  
**METAPEDIA A FLOATING VILLAGE.**  
 On Monday evening word was received here that the ice had spread in the Upsalquitch river, and backed up by a heavy freshet, carried away the Upsalquitch bridge, near Robinsonville, Tuesday, owing to the jam of ice, the water rose rapidly and at noon the English Church at Dawson's rafting ground was filled with water, and Dawson's barn was also filled.  
 Several families who resided on the east bank of the Upsalquitch, above Robinsonville were compelled to move from their houses and seek higher ground. Late in the day word was received that Moore's mill and cook house at Moore's settlement was completely tarred round.  
 The water kept steadily rising in the river, and things began to look serious for the residents of Metapedia.  
 About five o'clock Tuesday evening, a larger in the direction of the Metapedia river threatened to add to the already serious condition of affairs and as expected, at 6 o'clock p.m. the bridge over the Metapedia—better known as the Blackquitch bridge—was swept away. This was carried for some distance by the ice, and jammed about a mile above Metapedia. The ice which came piling down on top of this had to find way and piled up till it covered the railway track. The blockade of ice thus formed, delayed the trains of Tuesday night for many hours. And not till the working train under the supervision of Supt. Renfell's himself had been sent up and the debris cleared away could the trains proceed, the evening train not getting into Campbellton till an early hour yesterday morning.  
 Word was received here at an early hour yesterday morning that the worst of Metapedia in fact and the inhabitants had to leave their houses in boats, and

Chatham Notes

CHATHAM, April 29.—Hon. J. B. Snowball has had his steam saw mill at this place put in first class order at a cost of about \$10,000. Considerable new machinery was placed in her as well as a new boiler. The mill will probably not start until Monday, the third of May, there being some delay on account of the extensive repairs and setting. Mr. Snowball has contracted with Mr. Swezey and Mr. Russell of Black Brook to take all the deals sawn in their mills during the season, situated at Black Brook.

Mr. Vaughan will start the mill situated at Black Brook, which he bought from the Bank of Montreal last fall within a week.

A million feet of logs belonging to Messrs. Richards, Lynch and Walsh, went adrift on the South West Miramichi on Wednesday last. A boom was stretched off Nelson by the steamers Mascott and St. Nicholas, and all or nearly all the logs were secured.

The steamer Nelson left her propeller on Tuesday last while on her way to Newcastle. It seems that while leaving the Douglastown wharf her propeller struck the top of the wharf, knocking two of the blades. The wharf is now being put in better shape and guards are being placed along the front.

Lady Aberdeen's Celebration of The Queen's Jubilee.

The Merchant's Bank of Halifax has been requested by Her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen, to open a subscription list for the Canadian Fund for the Commemoration of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee by founding the Victorian Order of Nurses in Canada. Any one desiring to contribute to this fund can do so through their Agent here who will remit their subscriptions to Ottawa free of charge.

**Kent County.**

A petition is being circulated for signature with a view of getting the South Act in Kent County. New copies of the petition are in the hands of prominent men in the different parishes. Any man already about forty names. The signatures of one-fourth of the electors for the House of Commons will be necessary to procure an election. A majority of voters are required to carry the Act. Up to a year ago the House fees were a source of revenue for the County, but now the amounts paid go to the provincial treasury. Since the death of the goose that laid the golden egg for the County there ought to be no objection to the South Act here.

**CYCLING NOTES.**

Cyclists who ride for health's sake should never ride until two hours after a meal.

The injury imposed by the German government on American made bicycles, is \$1.

Small hand muffs, fixed on the handlebars, are the very greatest thing in London for women riders.

Cycling dinners followed by night excursions on the wheel are becoming fashionable in some parts of London.

Bicycle makers say that the demand for exceedingly high gears has been more pronounced this year than ever before.

The bicyclists are again agitating for the carriage of their wheels on baggage on railway trains. They are meeting with success in several States of the Union.

Bicycle racing is profitable in Australia. Last year a cycle track was built at an expense of \$2,300, while the receipts of the first day's meet amounted to \$25,000. Bicycles are now a regular equipment of all important post offices, and they have been found to be of great service in the prompt delivery of telegraphic messages.

This is going to be a great cycling year, and the manufacturers, who rate their beliefs according to the efflux of wheels from their factories, predict that this season will be the greatest in the history of bicycling.

**NEWS NOTES.**

HALIFAX, N. S. May 1.—A big find of gold has been made at Gay's river here, three miles south of Milford. Five hundred acres were taken up there this morning by Captain Oakes, John McGuire, David Annand, George Flawn, Austen Brothers and others. The assayer says it is the biggest find ever made in Nova Scotia. The lead is over 100 feet wide and consists of formations nicely sprinkled with gold and galena which yields \$24 to the ton.

HAVANA, April 29.—Gen. Nicholas del Rey has been recalled to Havana from Santiago de Cuba by the order of Gen. Weyler. The cause was the great victory obtained over General Rey by Gen. Calixto Garcia, near Granma. The details of the battle have created a sensation here.

They show that the Spanish column of 3000 men was utterly put to rout by the dynamite bombs that exploded, and instead of two soldiers being killed as in the official report, 200 were blown up by bombs, and 250 slain by the insurgents during the confusion and excitement of the panic-stricken Spanish column. The bombs have been placed in a road, on which the Spaniards were marching.

The convicts tobacco in the Dominion penitentiaries is to be cut off in all cases after this, which will effect a saving to the country of \$1,370.

The drink traffic in West Africa is fast becoming a tremendous problem. In the Delta of the Niger, gin is practically the currency, so that, if a person wishes to buy food, instead of taking a purse of money he must be armed with a case or two of gin, and unless he will do this he may even be deprived of some of the necessities of life.

Milk, fresh or sour, buttermilk, skimmed milk, mixed with meal, makes a good feed for poultry.

The best and most natural food for the poultry house is dry earth, kept clean and dry.

ONE BREED. While the breeder who is raising and selling fowls for breeders may find it an advantage to keep two or three breeds, it will be an exception when the farmer will find it best to keep more than one.

The breeder is compelled to keep his breeding fowls confined, but generally, on the farm, they ought to have a free range as a matter of economy, so that they will pick up loose grain which would otherwise go to waste, and also destroy insect pests that injure the fruits and grains, and this cannot be done if more than one breed is kept.

Get a breed you like and one adapted to the purpose for which they are kept, and stick to it. Constant change prevents any improvement, and this must be the order of the day with every poultry keeper.

If you want fine fat coots, calves, lambs and pigs, sow clover this spring. No kind of feed causes greater growth than clover, either in pasture or hay. If the pasture and meadow land of our stock farms is in clover it is no mistake. Whoever is responsible for the statement that clover is injurious to feed to horses should be excommunicated at once. It is not only the best, but the cheapest hay grown, because it is richest in food elements. The trouble comes from feeding in the poorer varieties. If clover hay be cut early and properly cured it is the best of all hay food, for any animal. Moreover its growth indicates a good standard of fertility and it is wanted everywhere. Grow more clover and sell the poorer hay.
