## RURAL CEMETERY TO BE BEAUTIFIED

Meeting of Lot Holders Tuesday Evening at Which Plans Were Made.

A fairly attended meeting of the lot holders now forming the Campbellton Rural Cemetery Co. was held in the Town Council Chambers Tuesday evening when Mr. Thos. Wran having been appointed Chairman and Mr. D. C. Firth Secretary the report of the Directors for the year ending April 30th, 1919, showing receipts including balance of \$39.94 from the preceding year—of \$263.14, expenditures \$190.64, leaving a balance on hand of \$72.50 was received and adopted.

Messrs. Alex. McLennan, A. D. MacKenzie, Thos. Wran, J. R. Mackenzie, J. T. Reid, J. W. Matheson, L. T. Joudry and Havelock Sansom having been nominated as Directors for the ensuing year it was on motion resolved that nominations close when they were declared duly elected.

On motion it was resolved that the Directors set apart a certain section of the cemetery in which to inter the bodies of strangers who may die in our midst, that the assessment be as last year, \$1.00 for whole, 75c for half and 50c for quarter lots, and that a committee of four be appointed to collect unpaid assessments of 1918 and assessment for 1919 when on nomination the following were appointed said committee, viz: Messrs. J. B. MacKenzie, Alex. McLennan, A. G. Adams and Jas. W. Ferguson, also that the Directors make necessary enquiries as to the cost and select a site suitable for a building in which to leave the bodies of those who may die during the cold season of the year so that there may be no interments during the winter months and report to a meeting of the company, said meeting to be called by the Directors.

Although no action was taken it was the opinion of the meeting that everything which would interfere with the moving of the grass on the lots be removed by the proprietors.

A splendid spirit pervaded the meeting and the purpose seemed to be a tonic in restoring confidence to health again. He spoke of the unavoidable absence of Mr. LeBoutillier but assured the meeting that they would work hand in hand to bring matters to a successful conclusion.

Mr. Priest on arising stated that he was very much in favour of erecting the monument to our fallen hero it was a duty we owed to their memory and he felt sure that Dalhousie whose citizens had always been very willing to assist in any good cause would not be behind in this occasion.

Mr. McLennan was the next speaker and voiced the sentiments of the previous ones, he stated that the meeting of Jacques never intended meeting in a few days for the purpose of forming a branch of the Hospital Aid which had been doing such excellent work in Campbellton. As Mr. McLennan's anxiety as a campaign manager is well known to those who have been acquainted with him he stated that he was elected to carry on a vigorous campaign for Louis throughout the three Counties. The members of this committee are His Honour Judge McLachly, Chairman, Messrs. J. F. Davis and Sam. LeComte, J. F. Gaspé, H. H. Antigonish and Thos. Busted for Bonaventure, W. R. MacLellan and W. H. Priest for Restigouche and P. M. Anderson and D. A. Stewart for Campbellton.

Messrs. W. H. Sauter, Alex. McLennan, H. A. Carr and D. E. Richards were elected a building and Finance Committee with power to aid in their name.

His Honour Judge McLachly and Mr. H. A. Carr were elected a committee to draft by-laws.

The Campaign committee or some of its members will shortly call upon the residents of the three Counties and it is hoped that they will meet with a cordial reception. \$20,000 it is estimated, will be required to complete this building, which will be met class in all its appointments. When completed this institution will obviate the necessity of many of our citizens journeying to Montreal or other distant cities for hospital treatment. We have in Campbellton an eminent staff of Doctors who only require the facilities of a modern Hospital to demonstrate their ability as physicians and surgeons of more than ordinary skill. This institution which serving a useful purpose in the community will at the same time be a most fitting memorial to the memory of our gallant lads who have so nobly fought and died in order that we might continue to live in peace and comfort.

## TRUSTEE BOARD HOLDS MEETING

Work of Soldiers' Memorial Hospital Progressing Favorably—Plans Are Ready.

The first meeting of the Trustees Board of the Restigouche and Bay Chaleur Soldiers' Memorial Hospital was held in the Town Council Chamber on Tuesday evening the 13th inst. His Honour Judge McLachly in the chair.

In addition to the local trustees there were present Messrs. F. Davis, of Gaspé, W. H. Priest of Dalhousie and W. R. McMillan of Durham Centre.

Mr. A. A. Andrew was elected Secretary-Treasurer.

His Honour read a letter from Mr. Sutton LeBoutillier expressing his inability to be present and assuring the Board that he would heartily endorse any action taken by his co-trustee Mr. Davis.

Mr. Andrew as Chairman of the original committee reported that a site 200 x 325 feet had been procured from Mr. F. F. Matheson, \$43,690 had been subscribed and plans and specifications had been drawn up which were the work of a competent Architect and should meet with the approval of the Board. These plans were on exhibition at the meeting and were highly commended upon by those present.

Mr. Davis on arising to speak said that he considered it a very great privilege to have the honour of being one of the original trustees of the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital and would do all in his power to bring about the successful completion of such a splendid memorial. He had never in all his travels seen anything to surpass it, the view to be had would satisfy the most ardent lover of nature's beauty, commanding as it did the valley of the Walker Brook, the western portion of the Town, the Restigouche River and the picture-que mountains of Bonaventure County; to gaze upon such a picture would be a powerful tonic in restoring convalescents to health again. He spoke of the unavoidable absence of Mr. LeBoutillier but assured the meeting that they would work hand in hand to bring matters to a successful conclusion.

## PERMANENT ROADS OUTLOOK GOOD

Hon. P. J. Veniot Home From Ottawa With Encouraging News.

Fredericton, May 13.—Hon. P. J. Veniot, minister of public works, has returned from Ottawa and is at his home in Bathurst. He will be in Fredericton Thursday visiting St. John friends. Hon. Mr. Veniot spent some days at Ottawa interviewing Hon. Dr. Reid, minister of railways, and Commissioner Campbell, in respect to federal aid for the construction of permanent highways in this province, and the outcome of his mission has been awaited with much interest. He said by telephone tonight that the classification of permanent roads as adopted for this province had been approved and plans, and other data had been submitted at Ottawa, together with a report as to how the roads already built in this province had come through the past winter.

Another important matter which was taken up was that of more favorable rates for gravel to be used in the construction of roads. Hon. Mr. Veniot took this matter up with Chairman Hanna and other members of the C. N. R. board and declared today that while the present rates were prohibitive, he believed the outcome of the interview would be the granting of such rates as to make it possible to take gravel into districts that at present were without any gravel on the roads. "The most I can say respecting the matter of permanent roads is that the interviews I had were of a very encouraging nature," said Mr. Veniot. "The time is not yet opportune to make any further statement or to enter into details, but you may say that work will be commenced in New Brunswick as expected."

Permanent road work in New Brunswick will be continued, work starting as soon as possible.

Any contributions may be sent to the Secretary-Treasurer, Mr. A. A. Andrew, and will be most gratefully received and acknowledged.

This building will be four stories including the basement, size 85 x 40 feet, with elevator service to each floor; the basement contains the following rooms: Boiler, Laundry, Kitchen, Dining, Doctor's Coat Room and large Entrance Hall. On the other floors there are two wards of four beds each, two of these beds, in a private room of two beds each and sixteen of one each making thirty four in all. The operating suite consists of the operating room, sterilizer room, anaesthetic room, delivery room and nurse's work room.

The Solarium is on the west end of the building and is sufficiently large to accommodate the convalescent patients on each floor.

When completed the building will present a most pleasing appearance and will be a credit to the people of the Bay Chaleur Counties.

## FIGHTING 26TH SOON HOME NOW

Waiting on the Fast Steam Ship Olympic From Southampton.

London, May 12.—The steamship Olympic sailed from Southampton on Saturday with 5,600 Canadian soldiers on board. The circumstances combined to give her quite a dramatic departure, for, in addition to the civic farewell, led by the Lord Mayor and a great crowd of cheering people, in the gathering twilight, the huge steamer had to clear without the aid of tugs on account of a strike of their crews, which had led to the expectation that the liner might not sail. The captain declared boldly that no question of tugs was going to prevent his getting the Canadian boys home, and at eight o'clock the Olympic cleared under her own steam and started on her voyage amid a scene of the greatest enthusiasm.

General Bustall, commander of the departing second division, arrived early and was long busy bidding everyone a cheery goodbye. "Bridgetown" Terminal was in command of the troops on the ship. Among them was the famous 226th (French Canadian), 24th, 25th, 26th, 29th, 30th, 31st, 32nd, 33rd, 34th, 35th, 36th, 37th, 38th, 39th, 40th, 41st, 42nd, 43rd, 44th, 45th, 46th, 47th, 48th, 49th, 50th, 51st, 52nd, 53rd, 54th, 55th, 56th, 57th, 58th, 59th, 60th, 61st, 62nd, 63rd, 64th, 65th, 66th, 67th, 68th, 69th, 70th, 71st, 72nd, 73rd, 74th, 75th, 76th, 77th, 78th, 79th, 80th, 81st, 82nd, 83rd, 84th, 85th, 86th, 87th, 88th, 89th, 90th, 91st, 92nd, 93rd, 94th, 95th, 96th, 97th, 98th, 99th, 100th.

## DEFAULTERS TO BE DISFRANCHISED

Hon. Arthur Meighen presented in the House Friday his bill to disfranchise defaulters under the M. S. A. The classes covered by the bill comprise all those who failed in their obligations under the following respects for a period of 15 years:

- 1.—From holding office under the Crown.
- 2.—From being a member of parliament or a member of the Senate.
- 3.—From voting in any Dominion election.

## BRUSSELS MOVING

The bill provides that any a father who have satisfied any conviction has fully obtained and the punishment imposed, shall not be included. Not included in the bill are those who have actually served in the military service. Further, any who are sentenced to imprisonment for a term of less than 12 months, shall not be included in the bill.

Mr. Meighen stated that the bill will be introduced in the House on Monday.



### GERMAN GUNS ARE BROUGHT TO CANADA AS WAR SOUVENIRS

Montreal, May 15.—The steamer Vindelia brings an interesting and historic cargo into port, a score of captured guns which were wrested from the Germans by Canadian soldiers. Among the heavy artillery is a big gun which is labeled: "2nd Canadian Division, 24th Battalion, No. 930," and this is consigned to the Victoria Rifles, Montreal. No. 935 is the property of the 25th Battalion of Nova Scotia. There were others, but in many cases they were illegible.

It seems peculiarly fitting that the Vindelia should bring over this cargo, for its captain—Captain Saunders—had the duty of taking over the Ivernia of the Cunard line, in the great Canadian armada that reached Plymouth in October, 1914, with the first division aboard.

### BORDEN AND SIFTON LEFT PARIS TODAY ON THE WAY HOME

Paris, May 14.—In view of the fact that the principles have been settled up in which peace is to be established Sir Robert Borden and the Hon. Arthur Sifton left Paris this morning for London and will proceed to Canada by the first available boat.

### CANADA'S BOYS WILL SOON BE HOME

By Middle of July, Says General Currie.

London, May 14.—General Sir Arthur Currie, speaking to the Canadian Associated Press, expressed his confidence that not many Canadian soldiers would remain on this side after the middle of July.

"We hope to break all records this month by at least ten thousand," he said. "If we get 55,000 away in May and 50,000 in June there will not be many more left here. Of course we have always the bugbear of strikes to contend with. I should like to see how generally excellent discipline among Canadians has remained. Since the armistice our men have been a long way from home and a long time from their families. They came simply to do a job. They have done it. They have also accepted themselves the provisions made for deliberation in a very good spirit. I think many people in Canada will take a different view of what has been done in the way of rapid demobilization when the full facts are ascertained."




