Toronto, March 12.-Mr. Gamey, the member for Manitoulin, held the center of the stage at yesterday's session of the Legislature. He took all the limelight and his performance was highly melodramatic. After giving the details of his election in May, 1902, and the subsequent protest, he declared he had been approached by agents of the Government, who, masquerading as friends, advised him to resign, as the evidence against him was too strong. He said that in Toronto he met Mr. Frank J. Sullivan, who informed him that if he would resign and avoid the trial he could make \$5,000 in cash and later have many opportunities of making more. Continuing, he said: About Aug. 26 I arrived in Toronto and saw both the captain and his son Frank at the Walker House, and had different interviews in the captain's room. Mr. Stratton's Defense.

Toronto, March 12.-Hon J. R. Stratton in an interview says: "Mr. Gamey came to my office in the Parliament Buildings on three or four occasions. On one occasion Mr. Gamey spoke to me in reference to the appointment of a justice of the peace in Manitoulin, and I suggested that if he (Mr. Gamey) had any recommendations to make, he should forward it in writing to the Attorney-General, who had charge of such appointments, but who was at that time out of the city.

"On the occasion of another of Mr. Gamey's visits, he came to see about some road grants which he desired for certain roads in Manitoulin. I told him he had better send his application in writing in the usual way to the department of public works, which has charge of colonization road matters.

On another occasion Mr. Gamey came to me complaining of the bad enforcement of the license law in Manitoulin. He asserted that hotelkeepers were not observing the law, and that the inspector was absent from his official duty a great deal, attending to his private affairs. Mr. Gamey asked for the appointment of an inspector, but his request was not acted upon, and he also asked to be allowed to name one of the license commissioners, who were to be appointed for the new license district, resulting from the sub-division of the district into constituencies.

"Mr. Gamey also spoke of his intention of supporting the Government-that he had no use for Mr. Whitney-his mining policy was bad, and he was not in favor of giving any encouragement to the development of New Ontario. He believed the Liberal policy would be best for the improvement of the northern country, and that he felt that the interests of his constituents would be best served by his supporting the Government. I told him that if that was the case, he had better declare his intention. The Government would in that event consider his recommendations, as they would do in the case of their other supporters.

"I never saw Mr. Gamey in any capacity outside of my office in the Parliament Buildings, and only when he came in to see me on the business mentioned.

"No consideration for support, or money, was ever mentioned directly or indirectly between us in any shape or form. During his visits Mr. Gamey was very energetic and severe in denouncing Mr. Whitney. He said he was an impossibility as a leader on account of his undecided policy, his domineering disposition, his temper, and his habits. Mr. Gamey's expressed dissatisfaction with Mr. Whitney as a leader, and of his policy, was exceedingly pronounced, and might have been considered extravagant coming from the most bitter op-

Extract From "Liqueurs et Tabacs," July, 1902.

A recent number of the English medical journal, the Lancet, contains a long article on the cigarette. After stating that of all the methods of smoking, the cigarette owed its great spread to its convenience, our confrere

One fact which militates favor of the cigarette is that it gives a much lighter smoke than a pipe. It is also objected against the cigarette that the combustion takes place near the nose, stantly inhaled, and that through the lips objectionable matter may penetrate, a reproach attaching, but in a less degree, to the cigar. The em-ployment of a cigarette holder obviates these two inconveniences, the inhalation of the smoke and the flow of tobacco juice into the mouth. A long pipe kept constantly clean effectively protects the smoker against these two dangers. Nevertheless, smoked rationally, it is certain that the cigarette is the most inoffensive way of using tobacco. Thanks to its convenience and its cheapness it is easy to understand the immense favor it enjoys throughout the world."

It shows that the capital stock has earned, since the company commenced business, more than 50 per cent after payment of all expenses and death claims, and although as yet no dividend has been paid it stands to the shareholders' credit as an inseparable part of the capital stock of the company, and it is necessary to be so held as a reserve for the security of the policyholders according to law.

The cash income during the year amounted to the sum of \$110,022 55, being composed of first premiums received \$34,646 59, renewal premiums \$64,843 82, and interest \$10,532 14, the increase over last year being \$25,266 63. During the year investments have been made perfectly safe and which increased the amount of interest earned. The claims paid for deaths occurring up to the present time are well

within the expectation of loss. The same cautious energy which characterized the management of the company from its commencement was continued during the past year, and the directors believe the right course is being pursued in the management of the company's affairs.

The books of the company have been regularly audited and a synepsis of the assets with the previous years' pany is given below as well as some comparisons with the previous years' accomplishments. The managing director and stoff both at the head office and in the field have loyally and diligently labored to secure the best results they could for the company, and it will be to them as well as to the directors

and shareholders a source of gratification that they have met with so good a share of success. All of which is respectfully submitted.



STRIKE TROUBLES

The Country Awaits the Result of Anti-Strike Bill.

WOMEN TAKE AN ACTIVE PART

Bill Will Provide for Fine and Imprisonment in Cases of Intimidation.

The Hague, March 12.-All classes of society are awaiting with anxiety tomorrow's meeting of the Second Chamber. What the workingmen may do is by no means certain, but many of the leading spirits predict a general strike, and consequent high tension between the people and the soldiery. The Government reserves its opinion regarding the situation, while steadily augmenting its resources against disorder. The three bills which the Government intends to attempt to pass are attracting general attention throughout Europe.

Important changes of the penal code are provided for in the first of these measures. Individual and collective ntimidation in connection with strikes will be punished by fine and imprisonment. An individual guilty of intimidation will be subject to a fine of 100 florins (\$40) and three months' imprisonment. Two or more persons similary offending may be fined 200 florins (\$80) each and imprisoned for six nonths. Any person in Government employment or under contract to the Government who strikes will be subject to six months' imprisonment and a fine of 300 florins (\$120). Two or more persons committing this offense in concert may be imprisoned for four years. All offenders under the clauses ndicated may be disfranchised in ad-

dition to the other punishments.

In the second bill it is provided that fund be formed for the maintenance of a corps to perform the duties of railway servants in time of war or in time of strike. The third bill provides for inquiry into the conditions and complaints of railway servants. Only Government employes are affected by the anti-strike provisions of the first bill. Ordinary workmen may quit their employment at their pleasure. The Government, which is in control of the railways, seeks to prevent labor ipheavals, which paralyze commerce and interfere with the transit of travelers and the conveyance of mail. The acive participation of women in the impending strike of the state railways s causing the Government much anxiety. The women attend the meetings and are inciting the railway employes, whose cause they have warmly espoused, to go on strike.


