Berlin, March 13.—A building in the Sprudel Strasse, Carlsbad, collapsed to-day while twenty men were repairing it.

On a motion to adjourn Mr. Foster explained the French treaty under which Canada is allowed to send a paltry list of plained the French treaty under which and is allowed to send a paltry list of articles into France on the minimum tariff, and in return agrees to admit French wines, perfumes, soap, nuts and fruits at a great reduction of duty. The effect of Mr. Foster's statement was to show that he thought very little of the treaty; in tact, he announced that he would not ask Parliament to ratify it. He gave several instances where the treaty failed to carry out the intention of the Canadian Government in regard to it. It looked as if Mr. Foster and Sir Charles Tupper had been over-reached. Under the treaty, he said, Canada was bound to extend the benefit of any future treaty we might negotiate to France and her colonies. If so, he said the treaty would be of little advantage to Canada. Under the treaty the loss of revenue to Canada would be \$82,000 and to France \$30,000.

Mr. Laurier severely criticised the treaty, characterizing it as a comedy. Canada would derive little if any benefit from it, would derive little if any benefit from it, and in return made important concessions to France. It included no agricultural products, Canada's chief resources. It did not include cheese, which would have been an advantage. The treaty would have to be terminated if, for instance, we negotiated a treaty with the United States, as hoped we shortly would. The difference in our favor in lumber was insignificant.

Mr. Foster said that in a letter received France had agreed to include cheese if Canada reduced her duties on paintings and Canada reduced her duties on paintings and drawings. Mr. McLean (Conservative, of York) protested against the treaty because it would sacrifice the native wine industry of Ontario. However, as Mr. Foster himself thought the Government's treaty not worth ratifying, it was like whipping a dead horse to criticise it. The House adjourned after agreeing to debate Mr. McCarthy's fiscal resolution to-morrow and from day to day until disposed of.

OTTAWA, March 14 .- The Senate divorce committee took evidence this morning in support of the application of Annette Marion Goff, of Montreal, for a divorce from her husband, Edward Robert Tache Rowand, of Winnipeg. SAFE-BLOWERS AT WORK.

Joseph Hamilton's Brewery Office Entered by Burglars.

The Safe Blown Open and \$40 and Note Taken-The Marauders Seen -A Cool Piece of Business.

Safe blowers got in their work this morning in this city. About 3:45 o'clock an explosion was heard in Joseph Hamilton's brewery on Ann street. A few minutes afterwards Mr. Hamilton looked out of his bedroom window and saw two men pass. One was tall and wore a cape on his overcoat. The other was short. This was all the description he could give of the burglars who had blown open his safe in the brewery office. It was a very cool piece of business. Thos. Greenbrook, who lives just east of the building, heard the racket and getting up saw the marauders standing outside. They were in no hurry, but nobody seemed willing to molest them. It was not hard to gain entrance to the office, and the burglars evidently experienced no difficulty in opening the safe. A neat hole about a quarter of an inch in diameter was bored through the door and gunpowder inserted. The force of the explosion was very great. The heavy sale was moved almost a foot out of its place. When the door flew open and struck the wall both the windows were smashed to atoms. Two legs were knocked offa table standing near by. Three pieces of cement and one of iron, weighing several pounds, were thrown through the wall farthest from the safe. The big cash box being nicely opened, the contents were ransacked and \$40 in cash and a note were taken. The latter, however, would be of no use to anybody but the rightful owner. The men then walked quietly west on Ann street and were seen no more.

"FLORENCE THE BEAUTIFUL."

Rev. Joseph Philp's Fourth Letter to His Congregation.

Visits the Largest Churches of the World -The Art Galleries and Tombs-The Statue of David.

The fourth of Rev. Joseph Philp's letters was read to the congregation of the Centennial Church on Sunday. It was dated at Florence, Italy, and the following is a summary of it:

I promised you a letter from Florence, the "Queen of Fair Cities." I have spent some days in sunny Italy. I have looked upon and ridden among her mountains and valleys, her vineyards and olive groves. I have stodden her cities of the dead and her palaces of the living, and have gone into and admired some of the largest churches of the world—one large enough for 24,000 people—and I have strolled through miles on miles of art galleries containing many of the best statues and best paintings of the world. I have had my impressions, of which the following are a few:

1. This country impresses me withits

1. This country impresses me withit 1. This country impresses me withite age, nearly everything appearing old. It has lost some, indeed much, of the vigor of other days, and seems as though it had been impoverished and yet may recover its strength and even more than old-time

strength and even more than old-time glory.

2. Many of the tembs are triumphs of art, many of the meanest and worst of mea having the finest tembs in this sunny Italy.

3. I see more than ever that the best things in art are from the Book of God. Take from these galleries of art what the Bible has put there, and we have little of value left. The Madonnas have delighted me—at least some of them have. Raphael, and Angelo, and Titian and Fra Angelico were able to paint faces that expressed wonderful Christian sweetness and purity. Here in Florence I have come across Michael Angelo's statue of David, which I will never forget. There is also a story connected with it. Angelo and the other sculptors of his day were offered a block of marble of peculiar shape. Angelo took it, studied it carefully, and then hewed from it the ruddy, modest, youthful David, with right hand full of pebbles, and on his left hand his sling, poising himself to slay Goliath. LAWSUIT OVER A PRINTER'S ERROR

Father Barzynski Roused to Pay for Medals, But the Plaintiffs
Won the Case.
Chicago, March 13.—The suit of Joseph
A. Stolba & Co. against Vincent Barzynski to recover \$310 for making 1,000 brass medals was tried in Judge Hutchison's court and a verdict rendered for the Plaintiff. The defendant is paster of the Polish Catholic Church at Noble and Ingraham streets.

RESEMBLES THE MACKEREL.

Prof. Langley Thinks He Has Made a Successful Flying Machine.

Prof. Largley Thinks He Has Made a Successiul Flying Machine.

Washinoton, March 13.—It is stated that Prof. Samuel Pierrepoint Langley, in the control of the Smithsonian Institute, of this city, one of the recognized leading scientific institutes in the world, and under control of the Government, has developed a flying machine which he believes is practicable. The machine is a working model, and is not intended to carry passengers. In configuration the body closely resembles the mackerel. The backbone is a light but very rigid tube of what is technically knewn as "title metal," one of the many alloys of aluminium and steel. It is fifteen feet in length and five centimetres, or practically two inches in diameter. To give the rigidity to the skeleton longitudinal ribs of stilf steel/are provided, interacted at intervals by ribs of pure aluminium, the result being a lattice framework of great strength.

The engines, which are located in the portion of frame work corresponding to the head of the fish, are of double oscillating type. They weigh 60 cances and develope one horse power, the lightest of that power ever made. There are boilers of thinly hammered copper, weighing a little more than 7 pounds each, and they occupy the middle portion of the fish. Instead of water, a very volatile fluid is used. The fuel is refined gasoline, and the extreme end of the tail of the fish is fitted for a strong tank with a capacity of one quart. Before passing on to the boiler the gasoline is volatized by going through a heated coil. There are twin sorew propellers which would be made adjustable to different angles in practice to provide for steering. The wings or aeroplens are sector-shaped and consist of light frames of tubular aluminium steel covered with china silk. The front one is 42 inches wide in the widest part and has an extreme length of 40 feet from tip to tip. The rear one is somewhat smaller. A tubular mast extends upwardly and downwardly through about the middle of the craft and from its extermities run stays of a

HOW THE FARMERS CAN BE PRO-TECTED.

Mr. Dawson, M. P. for Addington, in ar address in Parliament, the other day, pointed out that the millionaires who control the cotton, wire fencing, sugar and other combines can raise the price of what they have to sell to the full limit permitted by the tariff. The farmer has no such power, as Mr. Dawson proved. There is no method by which he can avail himself of combinations to raise his prices. The only way in which he can be protected is by letting him buy his supplies in the cheapest market, and find markets into which it will be most profitable for him to sell. Continuing this stalwart representative of the may have somewhat impaired."

They were not able to come to any conclusion, and finally the firm acted on its own responsibility.

The short hour system will be given a fair trial, as it has been agreed by the union on this or other firms in the district during the year's trial, and that, if the firm cannot at the end of the year recommend the change for general adoption, it may return to the present system, or make such modifications as shall seem satisfactory to all concerned.

The meeting of the voters of South Middlesex at Mount Brydges last night was very largely attended and very enthusiastic. Quite a number of the fair sex graced the hall with their presence. Mr. Malcolm McGugan was moved into the chair, and after a few brief remarks he called on the Liberal candidate,

Mr. Boston was received with applause on rising. It was the first time, he said, that he had stood upon a Caradoc platform. He had not sought the position, but having received the nomination at Delaware he was there as the Liberal candidate for election, and he asked his friends to organize and bring in their votes. "I will tell you right here," said Mr. Boston, "that I will go to work, if elected, and I have no doubt that I will be to legislate for the best interests of the farmers. The people of this country are taxed to make a few men rich. I believe that we should be taxed for revenue purposes only. The present high tariff does not go to enrich the treasury, but to protect a few monopolists. The speaker said that he wished to reply to Mr. Gray later on, as the latter claimed that he was an independent candidate, or the Patron's candidate, and he wanted to hear what he said.

"This is a most important time in the history of the country," said Mr. Hyman, "and every effort should be made to show the country at large that the old Liberal constituency of South Middlesex has not gone back on its colors. As both the candidates are well known in the community, after all the question that you have to give your decision on is the political feature of the day. I understand that Mr. Gray, in his few remarks the other evening, showed himself to be uncertain as to which was his party. He did not know whether he would favor free corn or not, but said he would be in favor of removing the duty on binder twine; but I can tell you that if Mr. Gray was elected and sent to Ottawa, the very first time a vote was taken on the question of binder twine he would be whipped into line by Sir John Thompson and made to vote whichever way the party did." (Applause). "Mr. Gray," the speaker want on to say, "was not in favor of doing away with the duty on coal oil. His reason was that by doing so a town called Petrolea would be financially ruined. I can tell you," said Mr. Hyman, "that if the duty on oil was removed this country could afford to pension off every man and woman in Petrolea with \$500 a year each, to sit down and do nothing, and even then the country be \$500,000 ahead. There never was a time in the history of the country when platforms of the two parties were so far apart. I will lay down the Liberal platform and show you just where the difference is. The main difference is that of protection and tariff reform. The Liberal party believe in, and have given out to the country as their policy, a duty for revenue purposes only, with the greatest degree of free trade that can be got. The Liberal party says that the country should not be taxed to benefit the few manufacturers and to the detriment of all producers. This is th


