





Crops Hurry Pollings.

The summons to the polling booths undoubtedly came suddenly. It was necessary to have an election before harvest or postpone it until November. In the latter case it would not be possible to have a fall session, or at least to finish the parliamentary programme before Christmas. As harvest is unusually early this year, the polling must be early, too. It is possible that in some quarters barley and early oats will be cut before Aug. 14. but not much wheat will be attacked by that time. The object of the Government in bringing on the elections quickly is to remove all possible obstacles to the garnering of the grain, it being recognized that a successful agricultural season is as important in its way as any legislative institution.




