#### ANILINE PLANT AT NYACK DESTROYED

Three Are Reported Missing, Twenty in Hospital as Result of Explosion.

Nyack, N. Y., Jan. 31.—Three persons were reported missing and twenty others had been removed to a hospital within a short time after explosions wrecked the plant of the Aniline Pro-ducts Corporation today. The victims were all employed at the plant, which is owned by a corpora-tion in New York City.

There were two explosions. The first was so heavy that many buildings in the neighborhood were shaken and ter- damaged. damaged.

The corporation's plant was doomed by fire, it became evident immediately after the explosions. It was estimated the loss would exceed \$100,000.

Dr. Endicott, secretary of the Missionary Society of the Methodist Church of Canaga, speaking before a body of ministers and laymen in the First Methodist dining hall last evening. We should not spend our time singing pious hymns, but should go out into the world and win souls for Christ, if our religion means anything at all.

"When recruits were wanted for the war, it was not sufficient for them to say, 'Yes, I am loyal,' but they must say,' I will go.' And every recruiting officer was like an old-time Methodist revival preacher, whose chief concern was how many he was able to get. Of course, you ministers don't expect to get somebody converted every Sunday, do you? Well, you won't get them. Oh, we can be awfully pious when we sing, "Take my life and let it be consecrated Lord, to thee,' but 99 per cent of us haven't yet got down to the bed-rock of reality. 



### **WILLIAM HOWIE BE** RELEASED FROM PEN

Long Sentence Is Considered

Too Much For Crime. WIFE NEEDS SUPPORT

Former Employer Willing To Reinstate Him in Old Position.

A petition is being prepared and will be forwarded by S. F. Glass, M. P., to the minister of justice at Ottawa, asking for the release of William Howle, who is a prisoner at Kingston penitentiary, with the greater part of a three-year sentence still to run. The petitioners maintain that the offence for which if the case had been dealt with by the military authorities, as it might have been, since Howie at the time was a soldier, instead of by the magistrate in the city, it is unlikely that a sentence of more than six months would have been given. e forwarded by S. F. Glass, M. P., to

of more than six months would have been given.

Howie, who for fifteen years was a fireman at the London Rolling Mills, enlisted, the petition states, at the beginning of the war, and served for more than three years, although he was not allowed to go to the front, as he was found to be near-sighted. Two children by his first wife are stated to have served in the United States army during the war, and of four or five children of his second wife by her first husband, two are still overseas as soldiers, and one is a returned soldier.

The petition goes on to say that all many control of the same states are successful to the same states. husband, two are still overseas as soldiers, and one is a returned soldier.

The petition goes on to say that all the children are married, and have families of their own, and so are unable to help Mrs. Howie, who is 50 years of age, and who, because of herage and health, is unable to make sutficient by washing, etc., to provide for her wants. The minister is asked, therefore, to arrange for Howie's discharge so that he can again support his wife, and it is pointed out that the manager of the London Rolling Mills is willing to give Howie his old position again.

The petition concludes with the suggestion that: "The ends of justice in the matter of his offence have already been satisfied, and that for the sake of the wife and family of the said William Howie, and because of his former good reputation, and the services of himself and his family in the war, the said William Howie should be released from further service under his said entence, and be allowed to return to support his wife."

Howie was convicted last August of the theft of certain military clothing. He appeared for trial before the local magistrate, who found him guilty, and imposed the sentence of three years.

A letter from C. H. White, manager of the London Rolling Mills, stating that the firm is willing to have Howie back on his old job, will be sent to Ottawa with the petition. In the letter Mr. White states that Howie worked almost continuously at the mills for fifteen years, and that during that time he was always found to be perfectly trustworthy and honorable, and his services were quite satisfactory. If his friends are able to secure a reprieve, the letter continues, the firm will be prepared to reinstate him in his old position. The writer expresses the belief that the act of which Howie was convicted was the result of a temporary misguidance, and that the man is not habitually dishonest.

"At all events," the letter concludes we are quite willing to trust him again."



But, he is always ready to give credit where credit is due, and that licensing 5ystem, combined with the regulations which food conditions rendered imperative, had thrown the confectionery business out of a rut. For that he was duly thankful, even if he was one of the bakery business people whom the public would never suspect of lacking in efficiency in any respect.

"We had been in a rut for the past 40 years," he continued earnestly, whereat the writer person laughed. It was altogether too much like the moving picture seen a few days before, the film in which the boy in his teens, making a speech in the place of the old man who had prepared it, announces he has lived and done business in the community for "forty years."

The confectioner saw the point and taughed also, but, fortunately for the information herewith given, he didn't lose sight of his original point.
