In giving judgment this morning, his honor said, that he found that the oplum had been sold by a clerk in the employ of the druggists, and not for medicinal purposes. He found that the proprietors of the store were not liable for the act of their clerk in selling, unless it was shown that the actual sale was made with their express knowledge, and this was not shown in the present case. He found further, however, that opium was unlawfully kept for sale, and convicted both the proprietors on that head. After being warned of the seriousness of the offence, both were allowed to go on suspended sentence

London, Jan. 5.—There were 4,000 meetings last night, the majority being held by Unionists. Seven cabinet ministers, including the Premier, the Chancellor, and several members of the front Opposition bench, besides Mr, Balfour and twenty-three peers, were among the orators.

PEERS HELP LIBERALS.

Never since the days of Simon de Montfort, said Mr. Asquith at Brighton, had so many peers addressed the people. He was not complaining. If they continued to speak with the same volume, the Liberals might hold their tongues. New duties were not levied on property as such, but on the values created by the community, which had hitherto escaped. ### THE PUBLIC DEBT.

Journals which profess to "view with alarm" the total of the public debt of tions. It is true that since the Liberal party took office, the debt has been increased by \$65,432,846, but the intervening years have witnessed unexampled growth and development. To keep pace with the march of progress and the necessities of the people, the Government has had to borrow money to construct public works and increase the country's transportation facilities.

Of the total increase in the debt since 1896, \$58,391,263 has been expended on the national transcontinent-\$7,041,000, being accounted for by the falling off of \$11,000,000 in revenue in 1907-8, due to the world-wide depres-

The total capital and special expenditure during the thirteen years of Liberal rule amounts to \$212,602,818, of which \$147,000,000 was provided for out of revenue-that is to say, the present Government has provided for ordinary expenditure out of current revenue, and in addition, 69 per cent of capital and special charges, without resorting to borrowing.

From 1878 to 1896 the amount spent on capital and special expenditure was \$167,162.252, but at the same time \$118,-000,000 was added to the debt, only 29 per cent of the expenditures being provided out of revenue. Thus, while 70 per cent of the special expenditures were added to the debt in that period, greater part of which is invested in

### **VALUE OF THE CROPS** OF THE DOMINION

Statistics of the Various Grain Producing Areas of the Dominion.

Ottawa, Jan. 5 .- The final estimates of production and value of the field crops and the per cent number on hand and condition of live stock in Canada are given out today by the census and statistics office.

These estimates are based on the reports of a large staff of correspondents in every province of the Dominion. From the northwest provinces, in addition to the regular correspondents, the office received reports from over one thousand postmasters.

An area of 30,065.556 acres of field crops has yielded a harvest which computed at local market prices has value of \$532,992,100 as compared with \$432,534,000 from 27,505,663 acres last year.





Cleveland Lady's Address Last Night in the Normal School

Miss Louise Klein Miller, curator of school gardens in Cleveland, gave a very interesting lecture at the Normal School last night under the auspices of the London Horticultural Association. Dr. A. O. Jeffery, the chairman of the evening, in introducing the speaker, spoke of the object of the society, the beautifying of the city.

School gardens, in Miss Miller's opinion, were of inestimable value to the rupils, but she considered that this work might be given a considerably wider scope, by introducing it into the high schools as well as the public

In a number of places in the United States, continued Miss Miller, this scheme had been tried with marked success. In Oklahoma the state board of education requires that horticulture be taught in connection with the publie schools, and the state agricultural college trains teachers for this work. Thus pupils are taught that the success of a city depends on the state of the agricultural district surrounding

In 1904 school gardens were started in the Cleveland schools, and now practically every school has its garden, and many of the children have been inspired to start gardens at their own homes.

The work is done out of school hours and is not compulsory, and it has, in Miss Miller's opinion, a very beneficial effect on the Physical, mental and moral life of the child.
