

DOCTOR TALKS TO MISS LENEVE

Druggist Tells of the Accused Physician Buying Quantity of Deadly Poison.

[By Associated Press.] London, Sept. 8.—At the resump-on today of the trial of Dr. Hawley, H. Crippen and Ethel Clare Leneve, for the murder of the former's wife, Public Prosecutor Humphreys introduced evidence to establish the claim of the crown that the parts of the mutilated body found in the Crippen home once formed a part of the person of Belle Elmore, the missing wife,

of circumstantial evidence against the accused. Was Belle's Hair. The first witness called was Mrs. Adeline Harrison, whose acquaintance with Belle Elmore had extended over a period of twelve years. Mrs. Harrison was asked to examine strands of hair found when the dismembered body was uncovered, and having done so, she swore that she recognized the exhibit as similar to that worn by Belle Elmore.

Recognized Scars. A torn bit of feminine underwear, also discovered by the searchers in the cellar, was next introduced, and the witness declared that she had seen Belle Elmore clothed in undergarments of a like texture. The witness testified that the doctor purchased five grains of the drug on Jan. 19. explaining that he required the poison for use in homeopathy preparations. As is required of purchasers of poisons, he signed the registry book of the store, making this inscription:

"Munyons, per H. H. Crippen." The Defence. Arthur Newton, representing Cripen, detracted somewhat from the strength of the evidence, and incidentally indicated what is believed to be the line of defence in his crossexamination of Mrs. Harrison. In reply the witness assented to the suggestion that the hair, portions of woman's vest, and the curling iron found in the Crippen cellar were not only similar to those worn or used by the missing woman, but also "resembled thousands of others."

Specialist Advises a Rest, But Noth ing Serious Is Anticipated, Cobb Stays Home.

The man who plays out in right field for Detroit, and who is feared more than any other batter is handicapped in the matter of sight. Cobb's left eye is just normal, but short-sighted vertically, and that is where the trouble lies.

And as a result of his continued work, the eye has become sore, the optic nerve strained, and as a result inflammation has set in that requires complete rest. There is no danger of Cobb's going blind, but there is cause to think that he may impair his sight, so he is "laying low" temporarily.



#### PERSIANS AT ODDS OVER FOREIGN ADVICE



# **UP-TO-DATE WORK** OF THE BURGLAR

London, Sept. 7 .- A story of up-todate burglary, scientific in its way but not very successful, comes from Birm-irgham. The attempt was made on the establishment of a large firm of jewellers, and it was lucky for them that the thieves' supply of oxy-hydrogen gas failed them; otherwise there might have been a very different tale

When a policeman on the beat found the place had been broken into, an investigation revealed an attempt at burglary of a character which was quite new to the English police at Having located the strong room in

the shop, the thieves cut a large hole in the brick and cement wall eighteen inches thick. How they removed the debris, which amounted to about two cart loads, is a mystery. Then they made their way to the door of the strong room, which is of heavy steel, and using gas cylinders got to work with an oxy-hydrogen blowpipe. By this means they burned out of the steel door a circular hole a couple of inches deep. Behind this two inches of steel, however, was a packing of asbestos and another inch of solid

steel. Apparently at this stage the supply of gas failed, and the thieves had to leave their work unfinished. Whether the men were disturbed or not is not known, but they left behind them their gas apparatus, a complete set of bur-glar's tools of up-to-date pattern and a portable electric plant, by which communication was made with an upper room, in which a man could be placed to give an alarm on the ap-
