More Than Half of the Grand Total Has Been Subscribed by People of This Province-Montreal Comes Next With More Than \$47,000,000—Brisk Campaign Is Being Waged.

Toronto, Nov. 5 .- The grand total of subscriptions to the Victory Loan, covering the Dominion, as officially announced by W. S. Hodgins, chairman of the dominion business committee, at noon today, was \$212,985,677. Toronto, Nov. 5.—Ontario's Victory Loan campaign during the first eight days has brought forth no less than 40 of the honor flags of the Prince of Wales. The royal guest is delighted with the manner in which the cities and districts are taking hold and unfurling his banner. Ten new names were added to the list yesterday. These were: Capreoi Township, Grey County, Palmerston and Canonto Townships, Frontenac; Port Elgin, Bruce County, Ndagara-on-the-Lake, Linceln; Watt Township, Muskoka; Haileybury, Temiskaming; Eyton, Grey County; Dundalk, Grey County; Flesherton, Grey County.


TO HECKLERS MAKING HER MORE POPULAR

Victory Loan Officials Say Assistant Attorney-General Ames Declares That Strike Is a Direct Violation of the Nation's Laws and As Long As It Continues Court Action Will Be Resorted To To Protect the Public.

> Washington, D. C., Nov. 5.—The Government cannot accept the proposal of organized labor to end the coal strike by vacating the injunction against the officials of the United Mine Workers of America. Assistant Attorney-General Ames, in the absence of Attorney-General Palmer, announced today that the Government could not abandon its position because the strike was in violation

Mr. Ames issued the following statement:

"The strike is a violation of law. As long as it continues we are going to proceed in the courts. The dispute between the mine owners and workers is an entirely different question, that they can settle in their own way. The Government cannot tolerate continued violation of the law, such as this strike constitutes."

Refusal of the Government to vacate the injunction means a long fight in the coal fields, while its withdrawal would have opened the way for settlement of the strike within 48 hours, ac-

Ottawa, Nov. 5.—Debate on the second reading of the Grand Trunk bill. which was given the third reading in the Commons at 2:30 this morning, was proceeded with in the Senate this morning. Sir Robert, in his letter, dated November 1, described this rumor as being utterly "unfounded." Had this been the case, the letter went on to say, the bill would not have been introduced in Parliament.

Sir Robert pointed out that he had Sir Robert pointed out that he had himself commenced the negotiations in London two years ago. He did so because the Government realized that the national system of railways is so complete as to jeopardize successful operation. The negotiations had also been entered into because the only other alternative was to allow the Creat Toronto. ternative was to allow the Grand T

to pass into the hands of a private com-pany, thereby putting all the railways under one company, a situation so dan-gerous as to constitute a menace. Sir Rerous as to constitute a menace. Sir Robert urged the Senate to support the bill, and expressed regret that the condition of his health had been such as to render it impossible for him to remain at his post and take part in the debate on the bills in the Commons. Senator Dandurand rose to observe that it had been suggested that Signames was supporting the bill "with a faint heart."

VETS.' APPLICATIONS MUST BE IN BEFORE FIRST OF FEBRUARY

Otherwise Not Entitled To Vocational Retraining Benefits.

OTTAWA. Nov. 4.—Former members of the Canadian forces who desire to take advantage of the vocational retraining courses conducted by the department of soldiers civil re-establishment and who have not yet made application must do so before February 1 next. 

TEACHERS GIVEN BONUS OF \$100 BY BOARD OF ED.

Much Wrangling Over Five Teachers Being Left Out.

OBJECTION TO ACTION

Will Not Include Teachers Who Have Reached Maximums.

A bonus of \$100 for public school, collegiate and technical school teachers was authorized by the board of edu-

cation Tuesday afternoon.

The recommendation of the various committees dealing with the matter were all duly cut and dried when brought before the board, but some were so dry that it was only with difficulty that the board as a whole swallowed them. In fact, it was only by a vote of five to four that the recommendation regerding public school salaries. tion regarding public school salaries
was adopted.
No. 1 committee, which handles public

No. 1 committee, which handles public school matters, recommended: "That all teachers who have not reached the present maximum be given an increase of \$200 or a portion of that amount not to exceed the present maximum. That all women teachers, now in the employ of the board, who have not reached the present maximum be given an increase of \$150 or a portion thereof so that the maximum salary is not exceeded."

Appliable to All. Appliable to All.

In the regular course of events the men would receive \$100 increase, and the women \$50 increase in January. So this recommendation merely means that they will receive \$100, no distinction being made between men and women teachers.

women teachers.

This is fairly satisfactory, except the clause which provides that the present maximum be not exceeded. This means that at least five teachers will receive no benefit whatever from the bonus, as their regular yearly increase will bring them to their maximum.

It was on this point that the unanimity of the board broke up. Trustee Coleridge wanted the report referred back to the committee to consider this point. Trustee Smith seconded him, and Trustees Udy and Gray supported them. They were defeated by one wote.

wote.

"This motion is unfair to at least five teachers," said Trustee Coleridge. "We should go over the whole schedule from top to bottom."

Echoes of the private meeting held last Friday now began to be heard.

"We were led to believe at that meeting that all the teachers would profit by this recommendation," said Trustee Gray.

"No, they do not," said Trustee Thomas Rowe, who was presenting the report. "The committee making this motion included the mover and seconder of the amendment, but they have changed their minds. We all could do that if we listened to everything that was told us over the telephone. It is impossible to arrange a salary to suit all."

Should All Get Increase. Should All Get Increase.

"I believe that all the teachers should get this increase, it is intended to help them meet the high cost of living. A principal who has reached his maximum is faced by the high cost of living as much as anyone else," Said Trustee Coleridge.

"The 1920 board will have a full twelve months to consider readjust-

twelve months to consider readjust-ments," replied Trustee Rowe.
"It was said at the special meeting "It was said at the special meeting that one or two teachers would receive little benefit. I voted for the recommendation with that understanding. I didn't think that there were five of the teachers who would get no benefit whatever," said Trustee Udy.
"I thought only one teacher would not receive an increase," said Trustee Gray. "That was the bone of contention at the special meeting."

Could Easily Adjust Salaries.

"Five salaries can be adjusted as easily as one, and it seems to me we should adopt this as agreed at the special meeting," sa idTrustee Manning.

"The whole schedule should be revised," said Trustee Smith.

Granted \$40,000 increase.

"We must take into consideration that we gave the teachers an increase of \$40,000 this year," said Mr. Rowe, "and this will mean an additional \$32,000. No member is more anxious to pay generous salaries than I am, but if we break the schedule for these five teachers the others would have an equal right to ask us to break it for them. We must use judgment. We cannot stampede ourselves into the city treasury."

stampede ourselves into the city treasury."

"All we ask is to refer it back to the committee." said Trustee Smith. "That is no crime."

"I'll vote for this recommendation if No. 1 committee will take up the case of these five teachers," said Trustee Gray. "I want them all to get this \$100. It is not for teaching, but to meet the high cost of living."

The original recommendation went through, and it was then discovered that no date had been fixed. A clause was added to make the increase effective January 1.

Schedule Can Be Broken.

The argument that the schedule couldn't be broken received a jolt when No. 3 committee brought in its report on high school teachers' salaries. This committee, at a private meeting, found that some of the high school teachers were at their maximum, and would therefore receive no benefit from the bonus. They therefore boosted the maximum of department heads from \$2.200 to \$2,700 so that all high school teachers will benefit by the bonus. By raising the maximum teachers at the partment will receive more than a public school principal, who is responsible for a school of twelve or more rooms.

No. 2 committee submitted two names.

The rest of the board wanted it to bring in a definite recommendation so the members retired for a few moments and then recommended Mr. Carrothers. The appointment was unanimously confirmed.

A SISTER NATION. Speaking before a great audience yesterday at Toronto, the Prince of Wales said: "The dominions are no longer colonies; they are sister nations of the British nation." This is an admirable answer to a certain element at London, of which Lord Milner appears to be spokesman, who are agitating for a closer confederation of the Empire, with more rigid control centred at London. Lord Milner is greatly perturbed over the rapid advance of the dominions from the status of colonies to their present independence. He considers this progress to be too rapid. It is understood that Milner strenuously objected to Canada holding a vote in the League of Nations. It is time Lord Milner and his friends should know definitely and finally that Canada is not going to have her thinking in matters vital to her affairs done by a colonial minister of the British Government. Lord Milner is a man of great mental capacity, and has a distinguished record in public life, but he is of the old imperialistic school, and if he could would have the Empire, colonies, dominions and all ruled and run from London. As he cannot have this, he is out for some sort of an imperial parliament. Lord Milner should not worry or fret. The greater the self-government, the greater has been the happiness, contentment and loyalty of the dominions. Our present association with the motherland is the healthiest, cleanest, and safest possible. We have common purposes with England, which is really the only bond that is necessary. AN ESTIMATE OF MACKENZIE KING.

prince expresses it, fits the case exactly.

The Canadian Magazine for November contains an illuminating and sympathetic sketch of the new Liberal leader, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, from the pen of the editor, Mr. Newton MacTavish. There are few young men in Canada who have been more lauded and more criticized than King in the period that he has been in political life, a very clear indication that he is no mere figure-head nor ever has been. Mr. MacTavish thinks that youth has always seemed to be King's greatest foe. "The boy minister" they called him when he entered the Laurier cabinet, but the title would not be applicable today, for the Liberal leader is now 45. Moreover, "by reason of his studies, by reason of his opportunities, by reason of his great endowments, by reason of his unusual experiences," he is well prepared for the work that may lie ahead of him.

Mackenzie King's career has been no ordinary one. He showed an interest in social problems before he was out of college, and that natural bent led him into newspaper work on the Globe, and then on to the University of Chicago and Harvard, where he secured his doctor's degree, and might have remained to become a professor. Instead, he returned to Canada, and undertook for the Government important investigations of industrial conditions that paved the way for his entry into public life as deputy minister and later minister of labor. In 1911 he was withdrawn from this work by the defeat of the Laurier Government, and thereupon entered upon an investigation of industrial conditions the world over for the Rockefeller Foundation. He had been there about a year when the war broke out. Of this period Mr. MacTavish writes:

"Almost immediately he entered upon the most poignantly distressful period of his life. He easily could have joined the militia and obtained a comfortable post, for at his age he scarcely would have been permitted to go to the front. Quite apart from that, however, we find a remarkable coincidence. Mackenzie King at this time was engaged, besides his other duties, in obtaining material for his book, which is a study of the ills that affect industrial life, and which was undertaken in the same spirit in which the British Government thought well of having a special department established to study the problem of industrial reconstruction. At the same time, Dr. MacDougall King was engaged in writing his book on 'The Battle With Tuberculosis, and How to Win It," a work that has been taken by both the Canadian and American Governments for use in all their military hospitals. Here, then, were two brothers devoting their splendid energies to the task of ameliorating man's condition in life."

Mr. MacTavish states further that at this time Dr. MacDougall King was a victim of tuberculosis, and had been on his back for two years, during which time and afterwards he and his family were supported in large measure by the brother, Mackenzie King, who, quite apart from his personal affairs, was aiding several of the largest war industries on the continent to adjust their industrial relationships so as to secure continuous and maximum output of essential war materials. To give one instance of the result of a plan drafted by him, each man's output for the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company was greater during the time the United States was at war than of any other coal company in America. During this time there were other demands of a personal character upon him, as Mr. MacTavish points out. His father. who lived in Toronto, had become blind, and the care of him, as well as of the aged mother and a sister also fell upon Mackenzie King. The sister died a year after the war began, increasing the immediate and personal responsibility of Mr. King for his aged parents. A year later the father died, and the mother moved to Ottawa to live with her son. For one year she was ill in bed with a trained nurse in constant attendance, and at the end of that time she, too, died. Thus during the whole of the war period there was this succession of family responsibilities of a distressing character thrown upon Mr. King's shoulders, but all serving perhaps to direct his mind more and more to the throttle of Ontario today.
