The rising and setting of the Moon are given with sufficient exactness for all practical purposes. The weather prognostications are again calculated according to the table of the celebrated Dr. Herschel; and for extraordinary accuracy, Miller's Almanac retains its wonderful popularity.

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#### ECLIPSES DURING THE YEAR 1865.

I. On the 10th of April there will be a partial eclipse of the Moon.

At Quebec it begins at eleven in the evening and ends at 46 minutes past midnight. At Toronto it begins at 28 minutes past ten, and ends 14 minutes past midnight.

II. On the 25th of April there will be a total eclipse of the Sun, visible in South America and Africa, but not visible in any part of

North America.

III. On the 4th of October, there will be a partial eclipse of the Moon, in the evening, visible. The beginning occurs before the Moon rises. At Quebec the middle of the eclipse occurs at 5.55, and

ends there at 6.56. At Toronto it ends 6.24.

IV. On the 19th of October, there will be an eclipse of the Sun, visible as a partial eclipse, but also as annular in some parts of North America. At Montreal it begins at 8.57 morning, and ends at seven minutes past noon. At Toronto it begins at 8.29, and ends 14.36 in the morning. The ring-like appearance not seen in Ganada.

# APPEARANCES OF THE PLANETS, 1865.

Until March the 18th Jupiter will be morning star, then evening star until December 31st. Jupiter forms no conjunctions this year with Venus, Mars, or Saturn. Mars will be an evening star until November 11, then morning star the rest of the year. Until January 19th, Saturn will be a morning star, then evening star until October 26th, then morning star the remainder of the year. Venus, as an evening star, will be brillian 1st April, and as a morning star 13th of June.

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JANUARY.—As a general thing it may be said that Canadian farmers work too hard. Our seasons are so short, help so scarce, and so much to do, that it is almost impossible to find time for mental improvement, and the cultivation of social feelings. Work without recreation produces dullness. We all need relaxation, and we all take it one way or another. Would it not be well to find it by visiting a little more mong our brother farmers? Not visits of mere formality, but of coriality and exchange of thought.

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2nd Month. FEBRUARY, 28 Days. Begins on Wednesday.

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February.—As the spring approaches you had best consider whether there are not portions of the farm that require underdraining, and get to work in this most important work. At the proper season, say Augustyour muck swamps—if you have such—may be reclaimed, and brought under cultivation. The muck, for manure, should be thrown out and formed into large well-shaped heaps, and they will become dry in the course of a few months. Cover the heaps to keep out rain, for obvious reasons. Dry muck will absorb about nine-tenths its own weight in liquid manure, thereby greatly increasing its value.

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MARCH.—The "Canada Farmer," speaking of "Clean Seed," says, "The maxim, 'Whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap,' is practically disbelieved by multitudes, both as it respects agriculture and morals. Few farmers properly appreciate the necessity of care to have their seed grain unmixed with seeds of various grasses, chess, and pernicious plants in general. Chess may be completely eradicated from a farm, and the crops of weeds annually raised, made 'small by degrees and beautifully less,' until they disappear altogether, by a little attention to cleaning the seed before sowing it."

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April. To destroy Ganada thistles is a most important work, especially in some localities. They can be destroyed. A man of experience says,—"I plough them about six times during the summer—five times might do if a dry summer. I plough them the first time about the beginning of May, and so on near the first of every month till October. I always harrow them the next day after ploughing, which drags many to the surface. These must die. My rule is never to let them up Keep the air from the main root one summer, and they will die. I assite you I have proved it." Root out the thistles, and be assured it will pay better than to let them grow.

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May .- Caterpillars have been always a great source of annoyance and cause of loss. That coal oil will cause instant death to these pests has been proved beyond all doubt. A correspondent of the "Leader" says he experimented with the oil, and was perfectly satisfied. He applied the oil with a brush made of f-athers, placing a small quantity on the nests. He says, "instant death ensued." The proprietor of the Leader made the experiment at Glengrove Farm, Yonge Street, and says, "In a couple of hours one quart of oil had cleared the orchard com-pletely of caterpillars." Certainly a cheap remedy. Try it,

# 1865] MEMORANDUM FOR MAY.

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JUNE .- On saving Timothy Seed, "Tucker's Annual Register" says, "The great point is to have a good clean crop. The best portion of the meadow should be selected, and all foul weeds previously removed by head. It is usually cut too late, or when the seed shells. The best time is when most of the heads have become brown. It is unimportant how it is cut, provided it is taken in before the seed wastes, and is not allowed to heat or mold. It may be cradled at some height, or it may be cut with a hand-scythe, taking care to throw the heads all\*one way, It will be usually dry enough to bind in a day or two." 1865]

JULY.—The "Country Gentleman" says, "It will be found far better to keep coarse manure in a heap and under cover till autumn, than to use it as a top dressing for grass land in the spring. Coarse, unfermented barnyard manure, if spread upon grass land in the spring, will be found of little value. The true reason of this is, manure needs to ferment, more or less, before it will be prepared to maintain the growth of plants..... The fine scraping of yards, and even common earth, spread thinly on meadows in the spring, will often be the means of doubling the crop of hay." Unfermented manure will not do this.

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August .- Now that land in the older settled townships has been so often picked over, that none but what is called inferior is to be had, the swales and swamps attract attention. People look at the deep black soil and wet ground and long to attack it, but are afraid. The general run of farmers little know what may be done with such property; but those who have once ditched swales, prefer the deep, rich fatness of such places to inferior dry ground. There is scarcely any land which has not some run to it-it slopes one way or the other-and therefore can be thoroughly drained.

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September.—In order to keep up the highest quality, or to improve the seed of wheat, select the very best portions of the field, and exclude the seeds of every weed, and especially of that notorious intruder, chess. Many careful farmers, by continued attention for years, have succeeded in entirely eradicating chess from their farms. To improve the quality, the largest and finest heads may be selected by hand. The process repeated, year after year, will give very encouraging results. A half-day spent in thus selecting the best heads will furnish a considerable amount. The best winnowing machines may be used to advantage.

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OCTOBER .- Farmers who have ample barn room, with their grain safe from rats, and who are not compelled to hurry it early to market, will do best to leave their thrashing till winter. A small machine, driven by a two-horse, endless chain power, will enable them to go through the work at that time with little help from attendance. The straw will be fresh, and therefore preferred by animals. It should be well stacked and protected from the weather, and it will then very materially aid in wintering the stock. You may place the straw where it will be accessible at all times, and thus save good hay.

NOVEMBER.—It is the practice of many farmers to top-dress their grass lands with composted manure, as soon as they conveniently can after getting off the hay crop. It is a good practice. The manure protects the roots a little from the rays of the sun, and the first shower washes some of its nutritious properties into the soil and about the roots of the grass, so that they are stimulated to throw out new sets of leaves, which afford a still further protection both to plants and the manure. The surface of land in summer is hard enough to allow teams to pass over it without injury, either from the horses' hoofs or from cutting ruts.

Heir and Devisee Court.—Commissioners, the Judges of the Superior Courts, and such other person as may be appointed by commission under the Great Seal. Their duties are to determine claims to lands, in Upper Canada, for which no patent has issued from the Crown in favor of the proper claimants, whether as heirs, devisees or assignees. Sittings at Toronto, first Monday in January and July in each year. Clerk of Commissions—W. B. Heward.

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County Courts.—Presided over by a resident Judge in each County. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions where the debt or damages claimed do not exceed £50; and to all saits relating to debt, covenant or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties, or signature of the defendant, to £100. An appeal lies to either of the Superior Courts of law. These Courts also possess equity powers to the amount of £50, subject to an appeal to the Court of Chancery.

SURROGATE COURTS.—The jurisdiction of these Courts relates to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of probate of wills, and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effects in Upper Canada. The County Judges are also Judges of the Surrogate Courts.

RECORDER'S COURT.—In the cities of Toronto, Hamilton, London, Kingston, and Ottawa, the Recorder's Court takes the place of the County Sessions, the Justices for Counties having no jurisdiction in the Cities—the care of which is commend to the Recorder, Mayor, Aldermen, Police Magistrate of each. Sessions held 2nd Monday in January, 1st Monday in April and July, and 3rd Monday in November. Recorders—George Duggan, Toronto; Kingston; John E. Start, Hamilton; William Horton, London; J. B. Lewis, Ottawa.

INSOLVENT DEBTOR'S COURTS.—The County Judge in each County presides.

Division Courts.—For the summary disposal of cases by a Judge; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contracts amounting to £25; injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to £10. Courts are held once in two months in each division, or oftener, at the discretion of the Judge.

#### TERMS OF THE COURTS.

APPEAL TERMS—Commence on the second Thursday next after Hilary, Easter and Michaelmas Terms.

LAW TERMS.—Hilary begins first Monday in February, and ends Saturaday of the ensuing week; Easter begins 3rd Monday in May, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week; Trinity begins Monday next after 2 the August, and ends on Saturday of the ensuing week. Michaelmas begins 3rd Monday in November, and ends Saturday of the ensuing week. Long vacation from 1st July to 21st August.

COUNTY COURT TERMS commence on the first Monday in January, April, July, and October, and end the following Saturday.

#### CIRCUITS OF THE COURTS.

Law Circuits.—The Circuits are held twice a year in each county, between Hilary and Easter Terms, and between Trinity and Michaelmas Terms, except in the county of York, where there are three in each

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ach county, nd Michaelhree in each year, commencing on the Thursday next after municipal elections in January, the second Monday in April, and the second Monday in October, in each year.

#### THE STAMP ACT.

This Act imposes a duty on every promissory note, draft, or bill of exchange, for not less than \$100, if executed singly, 3 cents per \$100 or fraction thereof; if executed in duplicate, 2 cents per \$100 or fraction thereof on each part; if executed in more than two parts, 1 cent per \$100 or fraction thereof on each part.

Any interest payable with the note at maturity must be counted as part thereof.

The duty is to be paid by bill stamp, on which part of the signature of the maker, drawer, or acceptor, or his initials, or part of the document, is to be written.

Bank notes, checks, and money orders, are exempt.

The Act imposes heavy penalties for its violation.
