The Easter offertory exceeded that of last year by only \$1.33. This was rather disappointing, as we hoped for a considerably larger sum. It will be seen that it leaves us with a deficit of \$92.66, besides which we owe a balance of coal account, and some unexpected bills for repairs to plumbing and repairs to organ amounting altogether to nearly \$150. But we carried forward quite as much, or perhaps more, at Easter of last year, so that if we have not cleared all off, we at any rate have not fallen behind.

The number of Communicants on Easter Day was 477.

At the Mid-day Service the congregation was estimated at 470, being probably the largest number ever present in the Cathedral except on the occasion of the visit of the Archbishop of Canterbury. A change made in the seating of the North Aisle helped materially to accommodate this unusual number.

The Easter offertory was just \$300, besides which there was placed on the Altar a bag of gold sent in by the Women's League \$560. There is more to come in, to be added to this. The amount would have been much greater had it not been that a number of women of the League are discouraged by the delay on the part of the men in doing something. As to this we may observe that there has been some rumour of the fourth crossing pier being taken up whenever its character and probable cost is more definitely ascertained.

The children's offering on Easter Day for Indian Missions was \$44. Their gifts for the pier will not come in at present, as that fund has been delayed this year in order to allow first place to the Indian Missions.

The total amounts given through the offertory on Easter Day was therefore over \$900.

Amongst the Easter gifts to the Cathedral is a beautiful Solid Silver gold-lined box for Communion breads from the members of the Drew family, Brunswick Avenue, in memory of Mrs. Drew who died about two years ago. The box was made by Roden Brothers, Silversmiths, from designs furnished by Canon Macnab. On the lid of the box is a deeply engraved Latin Cross. On the sides and ends are engraved the following inscriptions:

"In loving memory of our Mother, Phyllis M. Drew, June 6th 1905" "Her Children arise up and call her Blessed." Proverbs xxxi, 28.

ANNUAL REPORT.

Although we have had 12 new members during the year we are numerically only one stronger than last year, having 62 on the roll instead of 61. Of these 62, 24 have this year been Honorary Members i. e. not able to come to the meetings but have paid their fees; 9 members have left, 1 transferred to another Branch and one has been called to a Higher Service.

There have been 31 meetings with an average attendance of 15.3, not quite as good an average as last year's which was 16.

The members seem to enjoy the monthly addresses given at the devotional meetings, for the attendance has rlsen from being the lowest on that day to the highest, reaching as high as 26 at one meeting.

Missionary addresses have been given during the year by Miss Tilley, Miss Osler, Mrs. Macqueen Baldwin of Japan, Miss Halson on the North West, Miss McKim of Persia and Mrs. S. G. Wood and Mrs. Grindlay. Besides these addresses notes of the Epip any lectures on Melanesia and New Zealand have been read to the Branch as well as extracts from the New Era and books from the library.

Six books have been taken out of the W.A. Library, often changing hands twice or three times before being returned.

Following out the suggestion in a recent number of the *New Era*, Canon Macnab was invited to read the prayers at one of our meetings and kindly did so.

Two bales of clothing have been sent during the year valued at \$80.79, one to Young's Point and one to White Fish Like. Alberta.

, A box of Christmas groceries was also sent to a Clergyman in our own diocese. And a surplice for a Catechist was sent to Lloydminster, Saskatchewan.

In 1881 the Parochial Missionary Collections was formed by our Bishop, a branch to be in every parish, and regular house to house collections to be taken up, to which every Church of England man, woman, and child should be invited to contribute; from the monthly cent of the little child, to the offering of the wealthy.

In that year, out of seventy-nine parishes, but twenty-nine took up the scheme. In our diocese of one hundred and twenty-one parishes or missions, only fiftyseven give through the P.M.C. Those who still work it are among the most liberal givers to the mission cause.

In 1894 the Synod appointed the Woman's Auxiliary their executive, feeling the need of a central board, so that the P.M.C., is under the care of the W.A.

We in S. Alban's devote our offerings entirely to Diocesan missions. Besides those who give to the collectors, who call upon them monthly, we have fifty-two subscribers through the envelopes, which system has been successfully carried out here.

We are urgently requested to take our share, according to our ability, in spreading Christ's kingdom, remembering that every Christian should help missions.

The W.A. gave last year to Canadian and Foreign work \$13,279.21, whilst to Diocesan, including P.M.C., only \$4,169.52.

We therefore ask for new subscribers from the members of our congregation, as we are desirous of increasing our subscriptions before the Annual Board Meeting, May 1st. 2nd and 3rd. "Freely ye have received, freely give."

THE SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOY'S AUXILIARY.

The membership of the Boys'Auxiliary has increased from twenty-two to thirty-three, with an average attendance of nine, an improvement on last year. Many of the older boys have caused a great deal of discouragement by dropping out when they have learnt to carve well, and are able to work by themselves, so that new boys have to work up to the same place before they can work at an order, which makes it a long time before the work ordered is finished; but there are still some doing what they can to make the society a success, and are of the greatest help.

The work done during the year is—Six Carved Frames, One Carved Box, Fourteen Key-racks, Two Leather Frames, Six Oak Book Stands, One Pipe-rack, Three Teapot Stands, and a Corner Bracket. There are also some Scrap Books which will soon be finished.

Once a month the minutes for the past month and the Treasurer's report have been read, and at these meeetings the following have addressed both boys and girls; the Rev. Canon Macnab, who talked about Mision work in Japan, and at two meetings The Rev. Cyril Brown who told of work done in Cannibal Islands, and of the lives of individual native children, and Mrs. Montgomery who spoke of the three different places to which the boys have pledged themselves to send the

following amount yearly:—\$2.00 to the Kindergarten School, Japan, \$2.00 to untainted children of lepers, and for the new pledge, the hospital at Lytton, \$1.50, making a total of \$5.50 sent for missionary work.

The expenses for the year amount to \$7.86.

Our branch has a Library of twenty-five books, to which each subscriber pays two cents.
