News of the Sea
—London, Jan. 23.—Lloyd's reports
the sinking of the Swedish steamship
Kamma, 1,516 tons gross.

—London, Jan. 25.—The Danish
steamer Doi, of 1,869 tons gross, has been
sunk, Lloyd's shipping agency announces.

—London, Jan. 26.—The Swedish
steamship O. A. Bradin, 1,832 tons gross,
is reported to have been sunk, Lloyd's an-
nounces.

—London, Jan. 26.—The following of-
ficial announcement was given out to-
day:
A small, unidentified German vessel
approached the Suffolk coast last night
and fired a number of shells, only a por-
tion of which reached the land. There
were 20 casualties and only insignificant
damage.

—New York, Jan. 26.—Rumors that
the French steamship Socos, last reported
as leaving Cardiff on Aug. 16, for a United
States port, had been lost, were confirmed
today by Capt. Y. Beridam, master
of the French liner steamer Ohio, from
Cardiff, who said the Socos was torpedoed
by a German submarine in the Mediter-
ranean on August 25, 1916. Captain
Beridam was master of the Socos when
she was sunk.

—London, Jan. 27.—A report of the
sinking of the British steamship Malina
was erroneous, according to a Lloyd's an-
nouncement. Her owners say she has
reached port.

—London, Jan. 27.—The sinking of
the British steamship Fakora, 2,357 tons
gross, and of the Norwegian steamer
Surma, 589 tons, is reported by Lloyd's.
The Norwegian steamer Jotunfelli,
previously reported sunk, has been towed
in a damaged condition.

—London, Jan. 28.—Lloyd's announces
that the Norwegian steamer Myrdal, 2,621
tons, previously reported as "believed
to have been sunk," has been sent to the
bottom by a submarine. Her crew was
landed.

The shipping agency also announces
that the Norwegian steamer Diox is re-
ported to have been sunk.

—London, Jan. 28.—The crew of thirty
four of a German submarine, which found-
ered off the Norwegian coast, was landed
yesterday near Hammerfest, Norway, by
a Norwegian motor boat, according to the
announcement of the Norwegian shipping
agency, which was transmitted by the
Revere correspondent at Christiania. As
the Germans were transported on a neutral
boat they will be liberated.

—London, Jan. 28.—The British
auxiliary cruiser Laurentic, of 14,892 tons
gross, has been sunk by a mine, according
to an official statement issued to-night by
the British admiralty. Twelve officers
and 109 men were saved.

The annual statement adds that the
vessel was down off the Irish coast last
Thursday.

The commander of the Laurentic,
Captain Reginald Norton, is among the
survivors. He was appointed to command
the ship six months ago to the command of
this steamer, which was commissioned for
patrol service in November 1914.

—London, Jan. 28.—The Danish O. B.
Swier, 4,482 tons gross, has been sunk,
according to reports received by Lloyd's
Shipping Agency.

—London, Jan. 29.—Lloyd's announces
that the British steamer Irvington, 2,747
tons, has been sunk.

—Paris, Jan. 29.—A Havre dispatch
from Madrid to-day reports the crews of
of the British steamers Jernington and
the Norwegian steamers Donndal and Fulon,
1,030 tons gross, have been landed.

All three steamers, according to the
message, were torpedoed by a German
submarine.

—London, Jan. 29.—Lloyd's shipping
agency to-day announced the sinking of
the British steamship Matheson, of 7,654
tons gross.

The captain and crew of the ves-
sel were landed. The Matheson was 470 feet
long, built in Belfast in 1906, and was
owned by T. & J. Brocklebank, Limited,
of Liverpool.

Lloyd's also announced that the Nor-
wegian steamer Domat, of 699 tons
gross, and the Russian steamer Egra, of
699 tons, were reported as "believed
sunk."

—London, Jan. 29.—The crew of the
Norwegian steamer Thorvald, 1,762 tons
gross, was reported as having been
landed at Las Palmas, says a Revere dis-
patch from that Canary island port to-
day. The captain was held a prisoner on
board the submarine.

PROGRESS OF THE WAR [January 25 to January 31]

IN spite of the very severe winter weather prevailing on all the European fronts, the week witnessed intensely active hostilities at many points, with varying results.

In the Western campaign the week was one of almost uninterrupted hostilities from the border of Spain and the sea to the frontiers of the North Sea.

Heavy snowstorms were reported in the Caucasian campaign, and hostilities were suspended in consequence.

The Mesopotamian campaign provided satisfactory news during the week of the steady progress of the British troops on the Tigris, where they took their annual banquet on Friday night at their headquarters at Miramichi.

The Egyptian campaign furnished no news of hostilities, but this is not to say that hostilities were not in progress there. It is always "something doing" in Egypt.

Reports from the East African campaign indicated further successes for the British, and the probable result of the campaign in the very near future.

The Balkan campaign had no progress during the week, the inactivity being consequent on the unfavorable weather.

On the sea the week witnessed more than the usual amount of tragedies and disasters, which are referred to separately in the "News of the Sea."

From Tuesday to Friday of last week a special appeal was made in Toronto to raise \$250,000 for the Patriotic Fund.

On Thursday, February 1, a conference of High representatives of the Entente Allies was held in Petrograd, and it may be safely conjectured that the consultations would be harmonious and the outcome far-reaching.

THE absence of the editor for a day or two last week was responsible for the omission from our last issue of any reference to the Parliament at Ottawa, which was formally opened by H. E. E. the Governor-General, the Duke of Devonshire, on January 19.
