The Military Tattoo held in Agricultural Park last night under the auspices of the 38th Dufferin Rifles Band was a pronounced success in every way and Bandmaster Frank C. Johnson is to be heartily congratulated for the high class programme which was given last night.

the line. "Here they come," shouted the crowd. Sure enough they did. The two Ambitious City bands followed by the Woodstock Band and the Dufferin Rifles Brass and Bugle Bands swung into line and playing regimental and other popular marches, marched over to the Agricultural Park. All along the line the bands were greeted with rounds of applause.

At The Grounds. Arriving at the grounds, no time was lost in seating the numerous musicians. Bandmaster Johnson, with baton in hand, then stepped forward and the musical part of the program was commenced. As he stepped up to conduct the massed bands he was given a rousing and prolonged reception from the vast audience in the stands, which by this time every inch of space was occupied. The bugle sounded "First Post," and then the concert commenced. The patriotic march, "In Old Quebec," was the opening number and was well received. The overture, "Semiramis," was played in capital style.

The selection, "Albion," and the overture, "William Tell" proved to be the most popular with the audience and Conductor Johnson, and his musicians were forced to respond to hearty echoes.

The playing of the massed bands was really excellent. Especially well done were the last two numbers. The Boy Scouts. During the rendering of the program by the bands, the different patrols of Boy Scouts entered into competition in front of the stands, and the young lads acquitted themselves nobly. The Scouts went through their different manoeuvres like trained regulars and were given rounds of applause from the vast throng in the stands. A huge search light was operated from the

top of the eastern stand which enabled the audience to witness the Boy Scouts' work splendidly. After careful judging and due consideration the judges, Capt. M. C. I. Johnson and Capt. W. H. Newman gave their decision as follows: Competition by Boy Scouts, embracing First Aid, Life Saving, etc., open to all City Patrols, 1 Wesley Patrol, 97 points; 2, Trinity Patrol 95 points; 3, Grace Church Patrol, 85 points; 4, Wellington Church Patrol 60 points. Possible 100 points.

The Headquarters Patrol under 'Commissioner Macfarlane gave an exhibition display in an almost perfect manner, but did not enter the competition. The March Past of the following bands each playing their own regimental march was next in order. 13th Royal Regiment Band, "Mountain Rose." 22nd Regimental Band, "Regimental March." 91st Canadian Highlander Band, "The Cliffs." 38th Dufferin Rifles Band, "Red, White and Blue."

As each band marched past the stands they were given a round after round of applause, especially the 91st. When the Scots passed by in their kilts, the "Scotts" in the crowd commenced to "b b" and the applause was deafening. They seemed to be all there—the Ushers, Mitchells, Buchanans—and the Highlanders were certainly awarded the "Four Crowns."

The playing of the Red, White and Blue by the Dufferin brought the crowd to their feet and the gallant 38th received their share of the applause. The bugle Band under Bugle Sergt James Mellor never played better and they too were given a right royal reception. The massed bands under the direction of Bandmaster Robinson of the 13th rendered the British Grenadiers and The Evening Hymn. These two selections were well received.

The fireworks display was capital and altogether the evening was in every way deserving of the large crowd which attended.

The grand military spectacle "Battle of Spionkop," by members of the 38th band and members of the regiment, concluded the programme, and the bugle sounded "The Last Post."

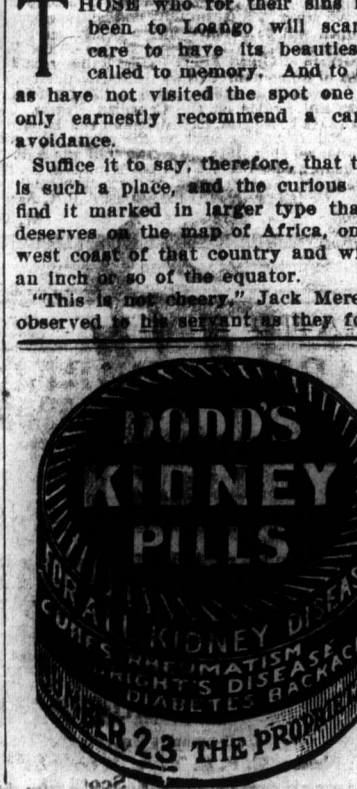
