minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but new Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—six months residence in each or three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Presumption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon an emitivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within ainmiles of his homesteader on a farm of suleast 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except when residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter ection alongside his homestead. Price \$5.9 per acre.
