To the Farm Boys and Girls of Ontario:

In presenting this outline of a School Course in Elementary Agriculture and Domestic Science to the youth of the rural districts of our Province, your Provincial Department of Agriculture does so fully realizing that you are entitled to all the benefits that might come to you by tapping the accumulated knowledge of the sciences and practices that make for success in farm life.

A period of three months is but a short period in a life-time, it is also a short period in which to attain a knowledge of the sciences underlying the practices that make successful farms, successful homes, successful farm men and farm women. This school is therefore of necessity planned to fill the immediate need and to reach those of you who have not had an opportunity of attending the established educational institutions of our Province and to give you within this short period a beginning in the sciences that mean so much to those living on the land. It is the hope of the officials of your Provincial Department of Agriculture that all of you who may elect to become students in this school will be aided in your progress toward successful rural citizenship.

The village council meet Monday evening, the Reeve and all members present. The minutes of previous meeting were read and adopted.

A communication was read from Mrs. Agnes Evans re grading and laying a cement walk on George St. south of Dundas street.

Also a communication from Provincial Secretary re an extension of the franchise.

On motion of councillors Crocker and Dale, the Waterdown Poultry Association was granted \$25 for their winter show.

On motion of councillors Atkins and Dougherty the Public Library was granted \$25 for 1921.

On motion the council adjourned.

At the call of the Reeve the council met in special session at 10.30 p. m. re considering tenders and other work in conjunction with the proposed Memorial Hall.

Moved by councillors Atkins and Dougherty that this council accept the offer of Contractor Henry Slater to build a Memorial Hall in the village of Waterdown for the contract price of \$21,000, work to be commenced 30 days after the 14th of December 1921 and to be completed by the 1st of August 1922.

On motion the council adjourned to Dec. 15th at 8 p. m.

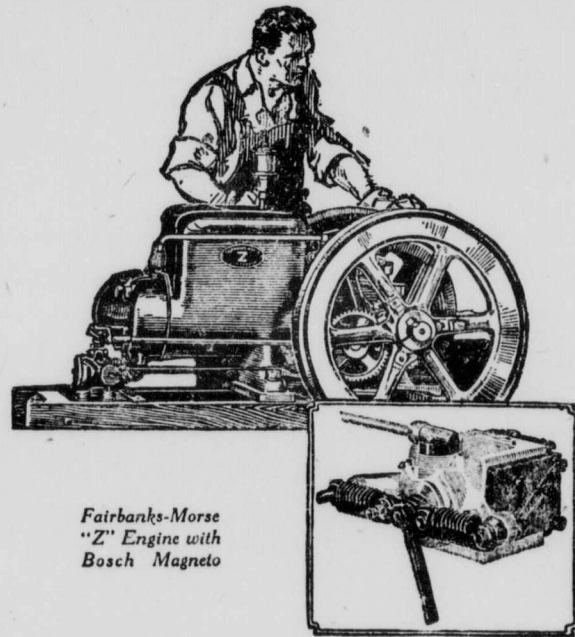

Literature, study of Canadian literature, also some of the standard authors. Correspondence, letter forms, business and personal letters, formal or social letters, telegrams and advertisements. English reference library, use of dictionary, encyclopedia and reference work. Public Speaking, practice debates, reading in public, speaking on familiar topics. Mathematics—Simple arithmetic and farm bookkeeping.

### FARM FORESTRY

The farm wood lot, planting roadside trees, windbreaks, ornamentation of farm buildings area. Re-forestation of waste land.

### ECONOMIC ENTOMOLOGY

Study of common insects affecting field, orchard and garden crops, sprays and spraying for insect control.

### AGRICULTURAL BOTANY

Study of farm weeds. Study of common diseases of field, orchard and garden crops, life history and control.

### CIVICS, RURAL ORGANIZATION AND CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING

Elementary lectures on Civics and Rural organization.

### VETERINARY SCIENCE

Care of animals during gestation and parturition. Care of horses' feet. Animal parasites. Common ailments of farm animals. Simple remedies and their application.

### BACTERIOLOGY

The study of bacteria in relation to Agriculture, plant and animal disease sanitation, bacteria in the soil, in milk, in silage, etc.

### BIRDS

Birds in relation to agriculture.

### OUTLINE OF COURSE IN Domestic Science

Girls will take lectures in English, Literature, Mathematics, Penmanship and any of the Farm Subjects in which they are interested.

### FOODS AND COOKERY

Study of food-stuffs generally available in the farm home. Planning, preparing, cooking and serving family meals. Study of food, preparing equipment, ranges, ovens, gas, electric, oil, wood or coal heated. Various kitchen labor saving implements and devices.

Study of methods in preserving foods, drying, pickling, canning, jelly and juice making. Dietetics, preparing food for infants, children and the sick. Storage of food, economic buying, etc.

### SEWING AND MILLINERY

Sewing, instructions in stitches, seams, hems, buttonhole making, decoration, etc. Use of patterns, forms, measuring. Textiles, study of fabrics to determine quality. Millinery, instruction in making of shapes, trimming of hats, re-ovation, etc.

### HOME NURSING

Anatomy and Physiology. The sick room, preparation of, bed making, care of patient, etc. Taking of temperature, pulse and respiration. Poultries. Medicines, rules, methods, care of, measuring, etc. Emergencies, first aid. Obstetrics. Care of infants. Bandages and bandaging. Contagious and infectious diseases. Disinfection.

### LAUNDRYING

Instruction in laundrying woollens, cottons, silks, linen and lace materials. Instructions in dry cleaning, removing of stains. Laundry equipment, starch, blue, dye and dye process, etc.

### HOUSEHOLD ADMINISTRATION

Location of the house, house plans, house equipment, house furnishing, interior and exterior decoration. Remodeling, additions, minor changes, etc. Household Accounts, simple business forms, buying of house supplies.

### NOTE

Waterdown is an ideal country village for the holding of the course as outlined in the curriculum, as it is on the C. P. R., which goes through the centre of East Flamboro, so that the pupils from all the Township may come to the school each morning.

Waterdown is also close to the City, thus enabling pupils from all parts of the County to reach the school by Radial and the C. P. R. The Good Road System will also be an advantage, as the Provincial Highways, Suburban Area and County roads all lead through Waterdown.

The two large hotels of Waterdown will allow pupils from a distance to secure board at reasonable rates for the week. Private board may be secured by applying to the local Committee.

A Literary Society will be formed during the Course, which should prove of real value.

Suitable prizes will be awarded for proficiency in the different classes. Announcement will be made in regard to this matter during the first week of the Course. Certificates will be awarded to those who reach a certain standing at the close of the Course.

The Waterdown Bus will meet all Radial cars reaching Hamilton before 9 a. m. each morning, and proceed direct to Waterdown in time for the first lectures, returning from Waterdown at 4.30 p. m. A very reasonable charge will be made by the Bus line for this service.
