Cold storage of perishable meats, poultry, fish, fruits and vegetables has been practiced in primitive ways since the beginning of civilization. But the development of cold storage to such proportions that it has had a vast effect upon the commerce of the world has all been within very recent years.

The storage by the ancients of food in caves and the suspension of butter and meat by our grandfathers in deep wells were both in their way effective, but those methods are a far cry, indeed, from the storage of thousands of tons of perishable things in the great warehouses constructed for the purpose in every city.

There is a difference between cold storage and freezing storage and freezing storage. The latter is for meats and fish and generally the great butchers do their own freezing, and in refrigerator cars send the meats to the consumers or to the steamers with refrigerator storage compartments for shipment abroad. The freezing storage places should have a temperature of something like ten degrees above zero, but it is likely that more frequent ly than not the temperature rises to more than ten degrees higher than this in the refrigerator cars and steamship. By the use of ice alone it is difficult to get and maintain a low temperature. Where it is done successfully the chemical ice machines with powerful engines are employed.

If the secretions of the nose, whether particularly increased or not, are forced backward for any length of time, not only will the posterior canals of the nose be overburdened with mucus, but the mucus will flow backward and down ward, and in the throat will cause the disagreeable and too familiar symptoms attending a case of chronic catarrh.

On the other hand, if we are always careful to instill in the minds of the young the importance of properly clearing out the nose as occasion demands, we shall at once begin a course of schooling which is of the greatest benefit, in asmuch as the increased secretion from the whole canal will follow the general course of the flow, and even the farthest recesses of the nasal cavity will partake of the attempt to remove the secretions from the body instead of allowing them to cacumalate.

Colors from Coal-tar.

Writing about that marvellous color producer, coal tar, a writer in Longman's Magazine reminds us that it is only thirty-six years ago that Perkin "rathered up the fragments" in coal-tar and produced the beautiful mauve dye. Now, from the greasy material which was considered useless is produced madder, which makes coal-tar worth £100 a ton. This coloring matter alone now employs an industry of two millions sterling per annum. One tone of good cannel-coal, when distilled in gas retorts, leaves twelve gallons of coal-tar, from which are produced a pound of benzine, a pound of benzine, a pound of toulene, a pound and half a pound of anthracene for dyeing purposes. According to Roscoe, there are sixteen distinct yellow colors, twelve orange, thirty red, fifteen blue, seven green and nine violet, besides a number of browns and an infinite number of blendings of all shades.—New York World.

Colors from Coal-tar.

Colors, from Coal-tar.

Writing about that marvellous color producer, coultar, a writer in Longman's Magazine reminds us that it is only thirty-six years ago that Perkin "gathered up the fragments" in coal-tar and produced the beautiful mauve dye. Now, from the greasy material which was considered useless is produced madder, which makes coal-tar worth £100 a ton. This coloring matter alone now employs an industry of two millions sterling per annum. One tone of good camel-coal, when distilled in gas retorts, leaves twelve gallons of coal-tar, from which are produced a pound of benzine, a pound of toulene, a pound and half a pound of anthracene for dyeing purposes. According to Roscoe, there are sixteen distinct yellow colors, twelve orange, thirty red, affteen blue, seven green and nine violet, besides a number of browns and an infinite number of blendings of all shades.—New York World.

British, Canadian and American Re presentatives Hold a Conference.






