But, although their numbers were few—although they had been weakened by sickness and by battle—although they presented themselves ragged and exhausted from the privations and commences amongs their own regiments—although a great portion of them came to the field after twenty-four hours work in the trenches, and after hard labour and privation, and although they had not time to take even a scanty meal before they met this powerful enemy, they retained the mouseshed and unquenchable spirit of the British soldier, and that spirit was triumphant. That was any right hou friend, the Secretary at-War truly said the other night—this battle of the soldier. That hand of heroes, exposed as they were to artillery, against which nothing for a very long time could have stood might at last—not have been defeated—but might at last have left their lives upon those height
