

N. S. & T. R. Commence at Once Expenditure Of \$500,000 in Extensions and Improvements

Germany Will Be Compelled to Pay For Attacking Allied Countries

France is Willing to Act Magnanimously With Foe, But Will Not Be a Dupe—Must Stick to Conditions of the Treaty—Moral and Material Reparation to Be Exact.

PARIS, March 27.—Premier Millerand, replying in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday to the interpellation of former Premier Barthou on Monday said:

"A crisis of alliances does not exist. There is only the natural give and take of conversations."

With regard to the Russian Soviet Government the Premier declared:

"The allies can only recognize the Russian Government when the Government recognizes national sovereignty in acts as well as in words."

The French Government was prepared to act like the United States entering upon commercial and industrial relations with Russia without having relations with the Soviet Government the Premier said.

M. Millerand read a report on attacks against English, French and Belgian officers in Berlin and Bremen, saying that Marshal Foch had presented a scheme for moral and material reparations and punishments with fresh guarantees.

Will Not Be Dupe

Dr. Kapp and later the regular Government of Germany, had asked permission to introduce troops into the neutral Ruhr zone, the Premier declared adding: "If the allies permitted such derogation of the treaty what assurance could they have that the troops would quit the zone when the order was restored?"

M. Millerand concluded with the following words addressed to Germany: "You say you want to work I do not repel the idea of economic collaboration. I already see certain methods, but there is one condition dominating everything—that you give proof of your good faith by executing the treaty you have signed. France is magnanimous, but does not intend to be a dupe."

Dublin Magistrate Dragged From Tram And Shot By Gang

Nearly Everyday Furnishes New Victims of Underground Warfare in Ireland—Big Rewards Offered—Thirty-five Arrested

DUBLIN, March 27.—Thirty-five prominent Sinn Feiners were arrested today. Five unknown men with passports for America were arrested on the point of embarkation for the United States this afternoon.

LONDON, March 27.—Almost every day furnishes a new victim for the underground warfare in Ireland. This morning Alan Bell, resident magistrate 70 years old and for many years an official of the royal constabulary was dragged by a gang, some of whom were masked, from a crowded tram car in Dublin and shot four times before the eyes of the passengers. Some of the passengers were women who fainted at the sight. The assassins escaped and no arrests have been made.

There has been three attacks on policemen in different parts of Ireland during the last three days, two of them being dangerously wounded. One of them was a young man returning home after enlisting in the constabulary.

An inquest at Dublin today on the unknown man killed on Wednesday evening revealed that he was a clerk at army headquarters. Dublin gossip says he was engaged in secret service work.

Viscount French, lord lieutenant of Ireland, has written to the widow of Magistrate Pell: "Your gallant and distinguished husband has crowned a life of devoted and valuable services to Ireland by his noble death in fighting the cause of his country."

Despite placards all over Ireland offering £10,000 sterling reward and government protection for information as to one it has been convicted for any of the assassinations.

Feeling still runs high in Cork over the murder of Lord Mayor McCurtain. Several witnesses at the inquest attempted to connect the police with the murder and the Sinn Feiners profess to believe the killing was in revenge for the slaying of a policeman in Cork a few hours before the Lord mayor was murdered.

The house of commons today discussed the case of Alderman William O'Brien, leader of the transport workers, who is in jail. He is said to be conducting a hunger strike and in danger of death. T. P. O'Connor the Nationalist leader called attention to the fact that O'Brien was serving on the government's coal commission when arrested, and asked: "Has the government considered the effect on Irish opinion of the possible death of Alderman O'Brien, resulting from his incarceration without trial?"

Andrew Bonar Law, the government spokesman, replied: "It is obvious this is a great responsibility. The government would deplore that anyone should commit suicide under such circumstances. The first duty of anyone government is to protect the lives of its citizens, and the Irish government has taken the responsibility of deciding this arrest was necessary for that object."

SIRENS NOT TO BE ON BICYCLES

Large Improvement Programme For This City and District

Extensions to High Tension Line, New Sub-stations, More Passenger Equipment, Greatly Increased Shop Accommodation Among Betterments Authorized For N. S. & T. R.

That the N. S. & T. Ry. will begin work on improvements and extensions in this city and other parts of the Niagara District which will approximately cost half a million dollars is the announcement which was made today by the company. An extensive addition to the car shops here that will alone cost about \$50,000, very large expenditures for various improvements on the high tension lines, new sub-stations and the relaying of local tracks on those sections not laid in paved streets, these are among the general schemes that involve the big outlay.

It is stated that ground will be broken at once for the extensions to the car barns which are located on Welland Ave. They will be made in modern and spacious in every way to take care of new equipment which is on order. Mr. E. C. Briggs, of the National Systems engineering department has been here and laid out the proposed improvements.

The improvements in the high tension lines and the building of new sub-stations are being carried out to insure a continued power service and to take care of additional passenger equipment. The relaying of tracks where they are not already resting in paved streets will also be welcomed by citizens.

VINDICATE THE JOURNAL

The Journal is particularly pleased to hear that such a large sum is to be placed by the National Railway Board to the credit of the system which is caring for the transportation needs of this city and district. For months this paper has been advocating that such could be secured in the way of improvements if the City Council sought to impress upon the officials the willingness of citizens to co-operate in legitimate ways to get extension. Last year the City Council of this paper gave a great deal of time to bring about some extensions and improvements such as are now contemplated, except that we urged a belt line for the north end, a fine new station and a short line to Merrinton. These things, too, could have been obtained had it not been for the strange policy of members of the Railway and Industrial Committee who specified everything to the dictates of Sir Adam Beck and the prejudice created by extravagant hydro promises that never materialize. The months have gone and yet no move is made by the Hydro Commission to build what St. Catharines needs and can get and yet as has been frequently pointed out by The Journal the legislative authorities of the city allow time to go by without any active campaign for greater railway advantages.

DESPITE NEGATIVE COURSE

It is gratifying to find that despite the negative attitude of last year's Council the officials of the N. S. & T. are backed up by the officials of the National system in carrying out the splendid extensions and improvements that are mentioned above.

It is a pity that credit for these improvements cannot be placed to the favor of members of the City Council.

A fire which destroyed the barn of Pierre Roy, near Danville, Que. station, caused the death of a G.T.R. telegraph operator named Desjardines, who, with others was helping the owner, through his stepping on a wire which had become detached.

Newman Clark of Four Falls, N.B. a rejected suitor of Phoebe Bell, eighteen years old, shot and killed her at a party at Grand Falls, then shooting himself, probably fatally.

Chamber of Commerce Urges Appointment at Once of a Town Planning Commission

The Chamber of Commerce held a town planning meeting last night and passed resolutions along the lines of bettering the conditions in the city.

H. A. McKelvie was in the chair and W. T. Tait acted as secretary. The principal speaker of the evening was City Engineer Near who made some excellent suggestions as to how the appearance of the city be improved and St. Catharines be made more beautiful and healthier and more agreeable place to live in.

Among other things Mr. Near recommended that a proper city plan be prepared as basis for town planning. Also that proper engineering advice be obtained as soon as possible to advise as to the best methods of reorganizing the local street railway system and providing for extensions of the system as well as the inter-urban roads.

The Chamber passed a resolution asking the Board of Directors to represent to the city council the advisability of appointing a town-planning commission so that preliminary work surveys at any other planning under the present act can be proceeded with so as to be in a position to carry on till the Town Planning Act is amended and a regularly appointed commission is named.

It was also suggested that the Directors use their influence to have the approaches to the Grand Trunk Station and high level bridge beautified.

The meeting also added its voice in favor of proper public lavatories being provided for the city.

FIFTEEN BEACH HAS A NARROW ESCAPE FROM BEING ENTIRELY FIRE SWEEP; FIVE BUILDINGS WERE DESTROYED

Three new cottages built only last year the store, dwelling and garage owned by C. M. Gibson at the "Fifteen Beach" were completely destroyed by fire last night.

Mr. Gibson received a telephone message about 11 o'clock and he and his son Stanley hastily gathered about ten men together and in two cars made a rapid trip to the Fifteen. They took chemicals along with them to fight the fire.

A bucket brigade was formed and a furious fight against the flames commenced with water from the lake.

The wind was blowing from the west and the wonder is that the whole beach was not swept clean by the flames. There were about twenty-five cottages in all there.

The bucket brigade worked manfully and with the aid of the chemicals they were finally able to stop the fires progress after it had completely destroyed the fine buildings entailing a loss of about \$5,000. This is partly covered by insurance.

There were several boats in the

burned buildings and these were destroyed.

Mr. Gibson is unable to give any theory as to the cause of the fire which started in the store. He had been at the beach the previous night and at that time everything appeared to be in good shape.

Some stock had already been put in the store as Mr. Gibson expected to open the season in a few weeks.

This is the first winter in some time that no person has been at the beach all through the cold weather.

Canada to Lose Tom Flanagan, As Big Irishman Has Departed For Jamaica

Canada is to lose Tom Flanagan, the big Irishman, who has been very prominent in the sporting world for the past fifteen years, has left for Jamaica, where he will make his home in the future. He will locate in Kingston, where he has purchased the controlling interest in a large hotel, and he will also look after the interest of Toronto capitalists who have holdings in the island. Flanagan continues his sporting activities in his new home and the little island will be heard of as a great deal often as a result of the great Thomas being one of its inhabitants.

Flanagan first, as a sportsman, prominence when he organized the Irish-Canadian Athletic Club of Toronto.

He was responsible for that organization, promoting many big meets, and after Tom Longboat turned professional, Flanagan also made the jump to act as his manager. When the war broke out he organized the Sportsman's Patriotic Association at Toronto, and did valuable work in the way of securing funds for the benefit of the soldiers. He was instrumental in organizing the Sportsman's Battalion in that city, and was paymaster of the unit until it left England. Returning to Canada he was appointed head of the Dominion police a position which he held until a few weeks ago. He was a familiar figure in Toronto and will be greatly missed by a large circle of friends both there and in other parts of the province.

Need of Public Conveniences Called to Attention of Council By the Local Board of Health

The Board of Health at a meeting last night passed a resolution asking the city council to pass a by-law that all horses, cows, pigs, goats, etc. in the city require to be registered and a fee of 25c charged for each registrant. This it was felt would help in a sanitary way.

The Board also decided to ask the council to consider the advisability of providing public conveniences at the increase grounds be connected with the sewer. At present there is absolutely no convenience provided in the city for transients.

Fees for the use of the present ambulance were set: City Cases, \$2, Port Dalhousie \$5, Merriton \$3, other places outside \$2, plus 50c a mile. That Mr. Murray's fees as driver outside of isolation cases be respec-

tively 75c, \$50, \$1, and \$1 and 5c a mile.

A LOSS TO LITERARY WORLD
Literature has lost a gifted and penetrating writer in the death this week of Mrs. Humphries Ward. Her name has become a household word in homes all over the civilized world.
Though having published other work previously it was not until "Robert Elsmere" made its appearance that the real foundation for her literary reputation was laid. This novel dealt in a gripping way with current religious problems and attracted the notice of a far reaching public.

The late Mrs. Ward was a prolific writer and wrote rapidly from her pen, so that she left to posterity a legacy of many books covering a variety of themes. It is worthy of note that her husband, Thomas Humphry Ward, was also a writer of attainment.

QUESTION OF TARIFFS
With the discount rate so heavily against Canada it is not easy to imagine how Hon. Mr. Cregar, as leader of the United Farmers in the Dominion can make a pronounced success in a low tariff campaign. Leaders of thought who ordinarily would be in sympathy with such a policy will hesitate to advance what apparently at the present time would have a detrimental effect on the Dominion.

What is obviously in the best interests of Canada at the present time is stability and a greater sentiment in favor of the promotion and success of Canadian business. The Dominion is carrying a tremendous heavy debt consequent of its participation in the war and the interest on the money as well as the principal when due must be met in one way and another.

While not ordinarily an advocate of tariffs, The Journal can scarcely reconcile this situation with any policy which detrimentally affects the industrial and commercial activity of the country.

There may be reasons advanced by the Farmers party which are strong enough to convince the public that the removal of tariffs on many articles would be a good thing for Canada but as yet they are not advanced with sufficient weight to appeal to students of economics and every day affairs.

What might well be done, would be the appointment of a permanent Tariff Commission, although there are almost too many such bodies now, that would be constantly studying and regulating tariffs just as the Railway Commission of the Dominion handles railway questions. The result would be that where there were reductions or increases they would be more scientifically adjusted. It is not improbable that some such plan may be brought forward by the Government, and if the body appointed carried the same public confidence as the Dominion Railway Commission its work would be valuable and appreciated.

The possibility of a general railway strike, originating in the difficulties on the Lancashire Railway has been dispelled.

NEW YORK, March 27—Beating up one's mother-in-law is no ground for separation.

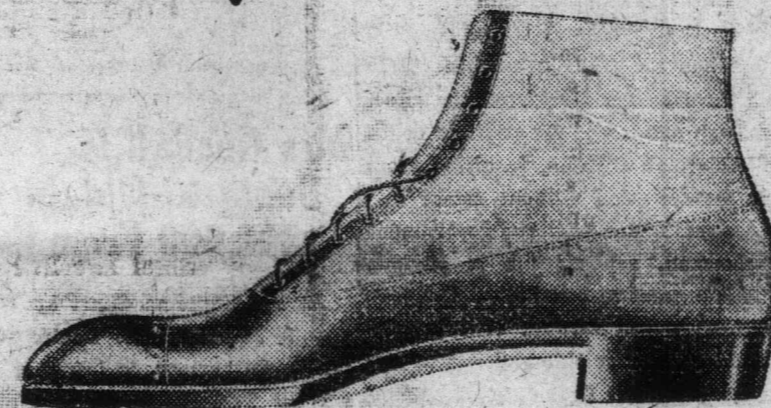

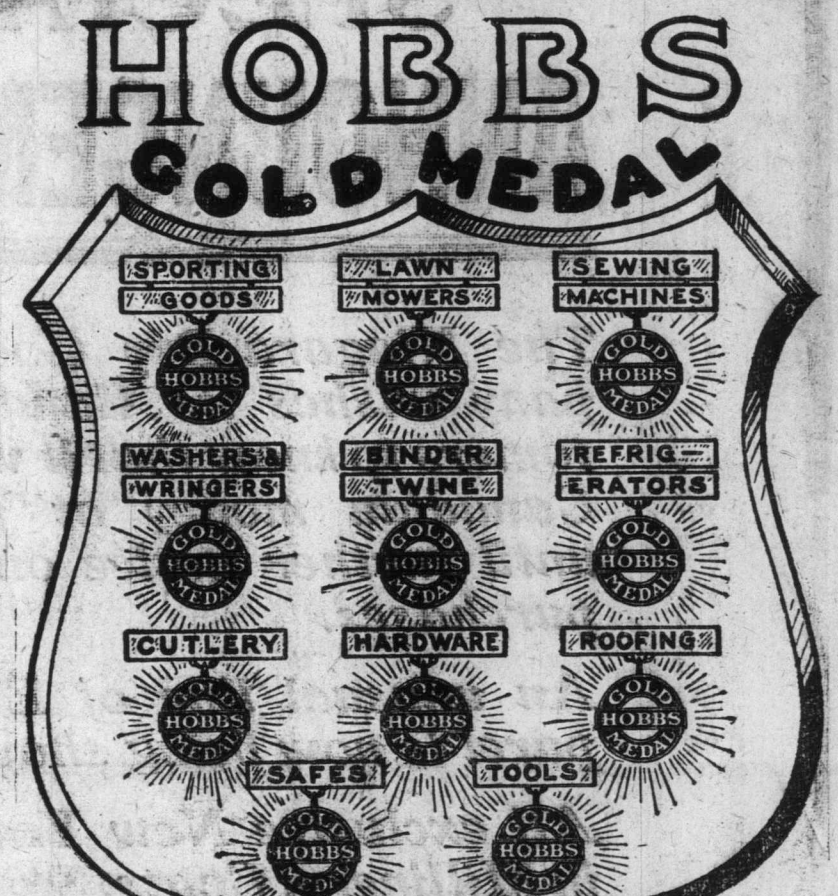

C. N. R. WILL NOT ELECTRIFY LINE

The rumors in connection with the electrification of the roads operated by the Canadian National Railways are unfounded, so far as the general system is concerned," said President D. B. Hanna yesterday. "We have taken over the railway known as the Toronto Eastern Railway, and also some other lines, and we have an agreement with the Hydro to sell these roads to the Hydro Commission, and when taken over by the commission they will naturally be electrified. This also concerns that line known as the old Central Ontario Railway, where passenger traffic is far in excess of the freight transportation, but this applies to that section only, not to the Central Ontario Railways in general, some people have, understood from my speech to the Canadian Club in rockville.

"So far as the increase in rates is concerned, we are simply marking time awaiting the decision of the United States Interstate Commission of Railways," he said. "The Railway in that country has practically agreed that the railways are entitled to an increase, and it has been our policy so far to follow generally the United States in that matter." Mr. Hanna said he did not think that the increased motor traffic would have any effect whatever on the traffic on the railways.

LATEST DESTROYERS TO FORM THE ORIGINAL OF CANADIAN NAVY

OTTAWA, March 26—The light cruiser and the two torpedo boat destroyers which Canada is to receive as a gift from the British Government will be of the latest type in their particular classes.

These vessels will serve as the beginning of a fleet until such a time as a permanent naval policy is formulated for Canada. In the meantime moreover, they will enable the Dominion to retain the nucleus of a trained personnel for service when that policy is developed or in case of necessity. The cruiser, acceptance of which Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of the Naval Service, announced in the Commons this afternoon will be a vessel of from 4,500 to 5,000 ton displacement, having a speed of 30 knots and armed with six six-inch guns, two anti-aircraft guns and two torpedo tubes. Her crew will consist of 350 officers and men. The cruiser will be representative of a type of very speedy ships of medium sized armament and moderate displacement which proved useful during the war for scouting and reconnaissance, for convoy and escort work for use against raiders and for destruction of enemy commerce.

The cost of such a vessel in Canada is estimated as in the neighborhood of \$4,000,000.

The destroyers are ships of 1,000 tons displacements capable of attaining 35 knots an hour and armed with three four-inch guns and four torpedo tubes.

They carry crews of 90 officers and men. In addition, Canada has two submarines of the latest British type boats of 900 tons armed with two guns

and six torpedo tubes each capable of running 17 knots an hour on the surface and 10 knots an hour when submerged.

When the cruiser and torpedo boat destroyers will be handed over to Canada has not been definitely determined. They will be delivered and come from England to Canada as soon as the Minister of the Naval Service has so far completed the reorganization of the service as to be ready to receive them. It is believed however that they will likely be turned over to the Dominion Government some time in

July next. When they are placed in commission in Canadian waters the Dominion will have three really efficient ships of their class, instead of two obsolete cruisers, the Niobe and the Rainbow, stationed on the Atlantic and Pacific respectively.

Affects 1,000 Men The demobilization, to which Mr. Ballantyne referred in the house today will affect in all about 1,000 men naval officers and men and civilians employed at headquarters in Ottawa and at the naval dockyards at Halifax and Esquimaux.

All persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year, 1919, received or earned \$1,000 or more.

All other individuals, who during the calendar year 1919, received or earned \$2,000 or more.

Every corporation and joint stock company, whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

CLASS 1
Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 31st of March, 1920:

Trustees, executors, administrators, agents and assignees must use Form T 3.

Employers making a return of the names and amounts paid to all directors, officials, agents or other employees must use Form T 4.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies making a return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1919, must use Form T 5.

PENALTY
Every person who is required to make this return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of \$10.00 for each day during which the default continues—and all such penalties shall be assessed and collected from the person liable to make the return in the same manner in which taxes are assessed and collected.

CLASS 2
Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920:

All individuals other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1.

Farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1 A.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies must use Form T 2.

General Instructions
Obtain Forms from the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation, or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

The annual meeting of the St. Catharines Council of Women was held yesterday afternoon at the Welland.

The Chiefs who are handling the preliminary details are: Chief Bethune, of Three Rivers, Chief Armstrong, of Kingston, Secretary and Chief Kappel of Stratford, Keys of Galt, Earl of Milton, Kerr of Leamington, and Heath of Saskatoon.

Beginning Sunday midnight Niagara Falls, Ont. will have daylight saving. A straw vote was taken yesterday in the big plants, and the manufacturers and employees were practically unanimously in favor of daylight. A meeting of the city council was held in the afternoon, and the Mayor will issue the proclamation today bringing daylight saving time into effect Sunday midnight. Daylight saving will be adopted in Niagara Falls, N. Y. coming into effect at the same time.

C. W. Bliss of Calgary, a guest at the Prince George, Toronto, states the prospects for good crops in Alberta are excellent. He says that there has been plenty of snow, and states that the farmers are looking for an early spring. He says that the fall wheat is in excellent shape in most places. Mr. Bliss says the reports of extreme conditions in Southern Alberta are highly colored. Conditions are undoubtedly anything but good, he says, but no one is actually starving as has been erroneously stated.
