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Debate on the Non-Confidence Motion.

(CONTINUED.)

Quebec, May 16th.

The Speaker took the chair at three o'clock.

After routine business, the debate on Mr. Dorian's amendment to the motion that the Speaker leave the chair for the House to go into Committee of Supply, referred to some points raised by a member for Chateaugay on Friday night. That Hon. gentleman had asserted that he had been pleased to call attention to the numerous measures of the Government. Now, if they were little, there was less cause for complaint than if they were more. It was not the quantity of measures that was in issue; it was the quality, and in taking this line of argument he pronounced the strongest possible condemnation upon themselves.

The member for Chateaugay had said that the opposition to the late Government had prevented them from bringing down their measures last autumn, but that the present confidence in the Government was such that they were now in a position to do so.

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THE AMERICAN WAR.

(CONTINUED.)

HEADQUARTERS, May 16th, 2 P. M.—The enemy continues to strengthen his works. It is fully expected, however, that a vigorous offensive movement will complete the evacuation of the rebel lines in the near future.

Yesterday afternoon the rebels suddenly developed a line of battle on our left, coming from the woods, and gobbling up our pickets, and driving back the reserves.

General Meade and Wright, with staff, were on the front at the time, and were engaged in the most gallant manner.

Immediately afterwards General Wright threw out a force under cover of artillery, and took their position, which was an important one.

WASHINGTON, May 16.—Secessionists have a story about that Buckner and Breckinridge have joined Lee, and the position of Johnston's army has been changed.

Buckner's junction is considered in military circles as possible, but not probable.

NEW YORK, May 17.—The World's correspondent, at bivouac near Chester, Va., on the 14th, says that our infantry are gradually being re-organized.

Last evening Gen Terry carried off his first line of works on the left, which command the Petersburg railroad approaches.

The rebels were repulsed by Terry, who, with his cavalry, guided by a negro through intricate pathways, outflanked them.

The loss in the attack in front was large, both in men and in material.

After skirmishing another half mile the line was again taken.

The rebels did not advance much, and it now looks as if our left would be swung around, thus completely surrounding the fort.

An immediate attack on the main work is expected.

It has been ascertained that Beauregard slipped by on Tuesday last, and is probably having captured to 800 prisoners.

Our wounded in being transported to Belle Plaine suffered terribly. Many died on the way.

Fredricksburg is a general hospital, full of the wounded, who are being well cared for as possible.

WASHINGTON, May 16, 5 P. M.—To Major General Dix: We have despatches from Gen Grant to 8 o'clock on the 15th. He states that offensive operations have been necessarily suspended until the roads become passable; that the full confidence in the success of the campaign is now concentrated on the main road from Fredericksburg to Richmond.

A conference called at 10 o'clock yesterday to discuss the plan for the evacuation of Lee's army at midnight last night.

General Sherman's forces are in vigorous pursuit.

The Richmond papers of Saturday state that the rebels had surrendered at Candor, Va., with 9,000 men.

Gen. Sigel, with his whole command, withdrew some two weeks ago from the north-western part of the State.

Gen. Sherman was in the presence of John Hunter, who reported that the rebels were in the act of evacuating the State.

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On Saturday last General W. S. Smith's command was at the former place, and had ordered all the citizens to work on the fortifications.

NEW YORK, May 17.—The "Fetion" reports, with date to the 8th, we learn that Mr. Foster gave notice, in the House of Commons, that on the 13th Mr. A. Baring would call attention to the fact that an armed steamer is now in Liverpool, which having been originally equipped for the purpose of carrying the mail, had been converted into a vessel for the transport of the baggage under whose flag she sails, and will attack the Premier whether he thinks the admission of such vessels to British harbors is consistent with international obligations, professions of neutrality, and the preservation of British interests.

Lord Palmerston is reported to have been unable to attend the Parliamentary debates, but was progressing favorably.

It was announced that Garibaldi would decline subscriptions to purchase his own steamer.

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THE AMERICAN WAR.

(CONTINUED.)

It is reported that an order will be issued to-night for a draft for 300,000 men. The time fixed for the draft is the first of June.

PHILADELPHIA, May 18.—A special to the Bulletin says that a telegraphic messenger, employed by the Secretary of State, was crossing his forces into Richmond, by way of Green and Danville.

There are five iron-clad monitors at Richmond, and there are heavy batteries on the Bluff, from Warwick's to Lee's.

They are every effort to put their strength in Lee's army against Grant. He says the prevailing opinion in the country around Richmond, is that if they can hold the capital during the campaign, the war will terminate, unless they every effort is directed to its defence.

The British service was conducted as usual, with the following important exceptions:—At the commencement of the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, during the singing of the Introit, the candles on the altar were lighted as usual. So soon, however, as the hymn was finished, the Bishop of London, who was seated on the throne, turned the candles off.

As he imagined there was considerable astonishment in the congregation, some of whom, we have heard, retired, he said that the candles were not to be lighted, but that the service was to be conducted as usual.

We also understand that the Scotch choir was the form which fell to be sung in ordinary course, but that the Bishop of London had ordered the choir to sing the hymn which was the order of the service by making the offertory precede the exhortation.
