On recommendation of the Tuberculosis Commission, and under the provisions of Section 27, Cap. 46, Consolidated Statutes (Second Series), His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to approve the following Regulations respecting the Burial of Persons in St. John's:-

1. From and after the 15th day of February, 1910, no Sexton or other person or persons having charge of the Church of England, Roman Catholic. General Protestant or Salvation Army Cemeteries or burial places of St. John's, shall permit the burial of any person without first having received a burial permit, signed by the Registrar General of Births, Mar riages and Deaths, under a penalty of Ten Dollars, or in default, Thirty days' imprisonment for each offence 2. The Registrar General of Births, Marriages and Deaths shall not issue any burial permit without first having received a certificate, on a form to be issued by him, and signed by a registered Medical Practitioner, certifying to the death of the person for whom burial is required, and setting

NOTE.—The Registrar General has supplied all Medical Practitioners with forms of Death Certificate. In the case of persons who have died without medical attendance, because of inability to pay for such services, the relatives or friends will apply to the Magistrate or Clerk of the Peace who will arrange with a Medical Practitioner to issue the necessary certificate of death.

If it is necessary that expenditures should be incurred for public services which were immediately required and unorseen, which involved disbursements that should properly be chargd to Capital Account, and for which there was no legislative authority, then the proper procedure would be to (1) ask the Governor to issue a Special Warrant to meet their cost, in ill such cases as came under the provisions of Sec. 33 (b) of the Audit Act or (2) in all other cases to charge be expenses to Exchequer Account intil the credit of the said Account was exhausted then, and only then, to raise moneys to meet the balance of expenditure by Temporary Loan unler Section 8 of the Audit Act. For be it observed, while I have the power under the provisions of the said Act elating to the Exchequer Account to refuse to issue a repayment cheque in iquidation of unauthorized expendiures, a power that I would exercise n grave cases, I have absolutely no control over expenditures chargeable to Temporary Loan Account beyond those of reporting them to the Legisature and the ordinary one of clerical audit. It seems to me that it is not the policy of the Audit Act that, by the adoption of any such expedient as this, control or guardianship over such expenditures by the Government should be wholly withdrawn from the Office of the Comptroller and Auditor

Revised New Testament

Full Marginal References Completed After Thirty-Seven Years.

London, Feb. 10 .- After thirty-sev en years' work the task of compiling full marginal references for the Revised New Testament has been completed. A new edition will shortly be issued by the University presses, in which the new references will be people gathered on the premises and substituted for the abridged references of 1898. Since the deaths of the original compilers, Dr. Scrivener and Professor Moulton, the work has been done by the Rev. Albert Greenup Principal of the London College of Divinity, and Dr. MacNeil, Professor of Biblical Exegesis in that institution, and the Rev. James M. Moulton, Professor of Hellenistic Greek and Indo-European Philology at Manchest-University, who is a son of the late Professor W. F. Moulton.

Professor Greenup says he believes that every published commentary on the New Testament has been read. esides many issues of the authorized ersions, giving marginal references, ucluding French, German, Greek and Hebrew. As an instance of the detail with which the work has been carried out, he cites one verse, the references to which it took ten years to complete. Many verses in the Gospels and Epistles have nearly a hundred references
