

SOLIGNUM

Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL. To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.





B. has forwarded you for publication copy of a communication rom His Excellency the Governor having reference to Brigade matters, I would thank you to publish the reply of the M. G. B. thereto, copy of which I now enclose and which no doubt will also prove of interest to your readers.

June 2nd, 1911. Sir,-I have already acknowledged ours of the 17th ult., in reference to the proposed Coronation Parade of the City Brigades.

Since then in accordance with your Excellency's request the representatives of the four Brigades met on a number of occasions to reconsider their former unanimous decision not to parade individually or jointly on e 23rd inst. No progress could be made, however, because the C. L. B maintained as persistently as before its claims to precedence as an absolute right, and refused to accede to any arrangement which did not

admit the validity of their claims. Under these circumstances agreement was quite impossible, and the other three Brigades determined to return individually their replies to your Excellency's letter. We are, therefore, compelled to do the same. For the first time, I think, in the history of Brigade life in this City we find the Brigades—whatever may have been their differences-failing to act in unity. Heretofore, whatever may have been their disputes, all the Corps have found some common ground of action acceptable to all in preference to an open breach. Even on this occasion and notwithstanding the difficulties of the situation the Brigades had, prior to the receipt of your Excellency's letter, as I have already pointed out, considered the matter seriously and at length, and had unanimously come to the concluthat it was in the interest of the whole Brigade movement to abandon the proposed parade altogether. deference, however, to your Excellency's wish the representatives of the

B. must adhere to its well-known principles. and I cannot think that on that acfrom participation in so important a public parade, on so auspicious an occasion, after all, simply because another Brigade will accept no solution which does not involve the ac-ceptance of an unfounded claim to rights which have no existence.

I am further to say that in subscribing my name to this letter, that it represents the views of our Governing Commitee, under whose direction I am acting, and who are supported by the whole of our officers, and by the friends and supporters of the Brigade in meeting assembled. I am also to say that I respectfully

reserve the right to publish all corespondence relating to this matter should the Committee deem it desirable, as it considers that our Brigade has suffered somewhat from misunderstanding of its position and con-

tentions in this matter.
I concluding, I am to thank your Excellency for the very great interest you have so graciously manifested in the Brigades of the City, and to express our great re gret that circumstances, not attribu-table to the M. G. B., precludes our acceptance of the solution of the present difficulty so kindly proposed by your Excellency.







# Fire Last Night

Naval Contingent. Destroys Chinese Laundry and Private Residence. At 8.45 last evening a fire broke out

in the Chinse Laundry, on Gower Street, occupied by John Lee but own-ed by Charley Fong. Lee's Laundry occupied the lower flat with a shop in front and a drying and washing room in the rear, and Mrs. Miller and her family occupy the two flats overhead The fire was a spectacular one, as few moments after the outbreak the whole building, was enveloped in flames which illuminated the harbor. Being Friday it was the Chinks' busy night, and several hundreds of dol-lars worth of laundry was being handled on the premises. Mr. Fred. Udle turned in the alarm from Box 17, and in a couple of minutes the Eastern and Central firemen with hose reels, ladders, and other apparatus were on the scene, and in an incrediably short space of time they had four powerful streams of water playing on the burning fabric over which flames were shooting high in the air Inspector General Sullivan with Sup Dunn and Chiefs Winsor and Trebble were early on the scene, and the mer fought the flames with considerable skill and daring. A strong force of police were present under Superin tendent Grimes and kept the course of citizens present to the sidewalks opposite. Ladders were run up at the front of the building, and the men running up these forced an entrance to the flats occupied by Mrs Miller and flooded the blaze out there after a hard fight. Some China men were in the Laundry in the dry ing room when the outbreak occurred They gave the Telegram reporter who interviewed them confusing accounts how the blaze originated. Messrs. Vaseg, tailor, and J. J. Brown were in the building at the time, and the former thinks that clothing hanging over the stove in the drying room ignited and caused the blaze. In couple of minutes it communicated with the shop when all the laundry there, clothing, etc., burst into flames and just as the alarm bells rang ou the fire spread to a gasoline tank in the shop and a loud explosion followed sending glass flying across the street with the shutters on the windows, and sending sheets of flame almost to the opposite houses. Two or three men narrowly escaped being cut with the flying glass and had to retreat from the tongues of fire which darted across the street.

Gunners Mates, Gibson and Wilson, of H. M. S. Brilliant, were in Mrs. Miller's house when suddenly the apartment was filled with smoke, and al most instantly fire burst up through the floors. Two children, a boy aged 6, and a girl aged 3, slept on the upper flat. The men ran upstairs and got the children over to Mr. Vasey's opposite just in the nick of time. Had hey not acted so promptly escape must have been cut off. were hardly left the building when the hall and stairway through which they had come were a roaring mass of flame. Citizens helped willingly and removed furniture of Mr. C. Nor-bury, Mr. Chaplin and Jas. Baird. Baird's and Chaplin's house is badly damaged by smoke and water. The Chinamens place is completely gutted back and front, and Mrs. Miller's above is in a similar state and rendered uninhabitable. All her furniture was destroyed, and the unfortunnot a cent of insurance. Only a few days ago she had installed several new beds and other furniture, and she reckons her loss at least \$400. The fire was quickly observed on board H. M. S. Brilliant and Capt Woolcombe ordered out a squad. Soon one hundred of these were at the King's Wharf, and in command of Capt. Woolcombe and Lieuts. 


