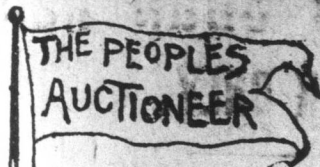

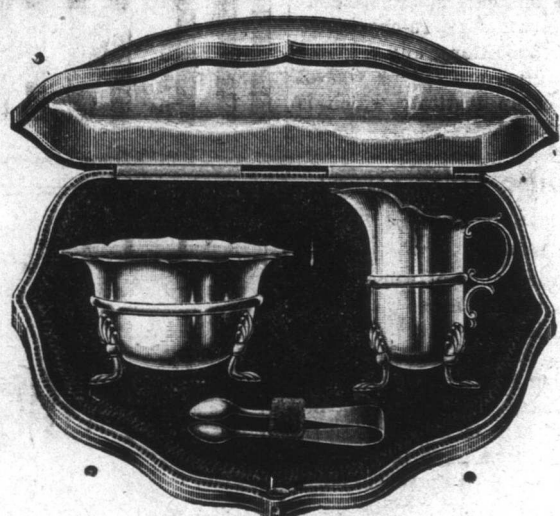

SOLIGNUM. A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL. To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this was suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shotes are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it. Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes. 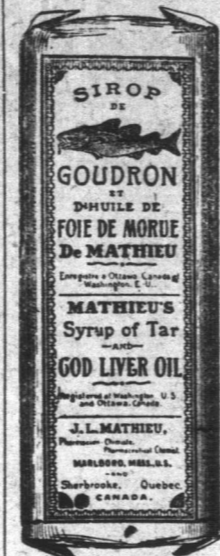

The Cancer Problem.

With the opening in a fortnight of the new Research Institute of the Cancer Hospital, London, will come into possession of the first complete institution in which the cancer problem can be attacked from all sides at the same time.

In a limited space of sixty by forty feet the new research laboratories provide the very latest work in scientific apparatus for the study of cancer. The work will be carried on in five departments, each under its own director, the whole being under the supervision of Dr. Alexander Paine, the chief of the staff.

The various departments are fitted for:—

- 1.—Clinical investigation.
- 2.—The pathology of cancer.
- 3.—Chemical research.
- 4.—Physics.
- 5.—Electricity and radium therapy.

"Ours will be the first complete institution," said the director, "with the heads of the various departments co-operating, and with the work being carried on simultaneously in every branch of scientific medicine."

On the ground floor is the director's laboratory, and a large reading-room, where the workers will be able to consult the latest scientific papers and publications dealing with cancer. In the basement are laboratories for preparatory chemistry and electrical work, including the departments for X-rays and investigations with radium. The committee are at present negotiating for some £3,000 worth of radium. On the first floor are spacious laboratories for research work dealing with the physics, chemistry and pathology of cancer. The top floor will be devoted to special research work on living cancer tissues.

Greenwich, Conn., May 19.—Lester Husted, 12 years old, told the authorities yesterday, that at his father's request, he pulled the trigger of a shotgun, which blew the right side of the elder man's head off.

Frederick Husted, a wealthy farmer of North Greenwich, was found lying in the kitchen of his home, late Wednesday with his head partly blown off and a shotgun lying on a table.

The boy said that his father sent his mother away on an errand, called him into the house and, laying the gun on a table, knelt on the floor, placed his left eye at the muzzle of the gun, and said:

"Pull the trigger; it is not loaded. I want to hear how it sounds."

The boy said he did not pull the trigger, but let it down with his thumb. Then his father got up and cocked the gun and again told him to pull the trigger, which he did.

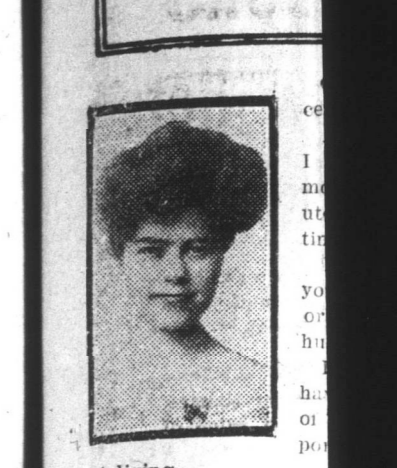



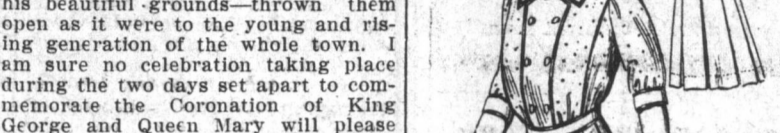
Children's Festival.

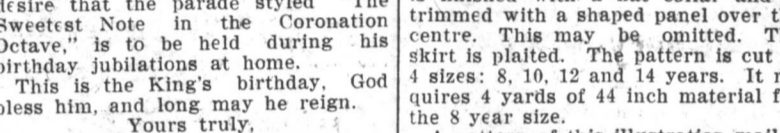

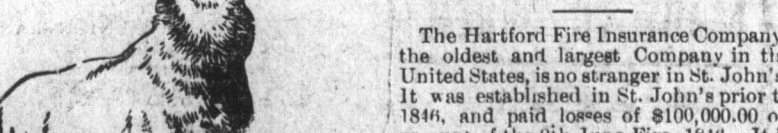

His Excellency and the Coronation Parade.

St. John's, June 3rd, 1911. Editor Evening Telegram: Dear Sir--I enclose herewith a further communication from His Excellency the Governor relating to the Coronation Parade, with his request for publication of same. The letter was received by us yesterday evening, too late to deal with today. A reply, however, is under consideration, a copy of which I shall be pleased to hand you in due course. Yours truly, CHAS. H. HUTCHINGS, Major M. G. B. Government House, St. John's, Newfoundland, June 2nd, 1911. Dear Sir--The Governor asks me to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of this day's date in reply to his circular letter addressed to the Commanding Officers of Brigades, dated the 17th of May. His Excellency notes that your Brigade finds itself unable to comply with the views of the other three Brigades of the Colony in respect to the question of order. With regard to the last paragraph but three of your letter you would appear to be under a slight misapprehension. Far from any desire to exclude your Brigade the general wish, His Excellency is sure, is that you should take part in it. It is for you to say whether you will do so. The Governor thinks it right to point out that the abandonment of the parade by the Church Lads' Brigade was in his opinion an impossibility, no matter how much they might desire to meet your views, inasmuch as the Patron of the Church Lads' organization is His Majesty the King. The arrangements so far include the Royal Navy, the Church Lads' Brigade, the Catholic Cadets, the Newfoundland Highlanders, all of whom have signified their intention of turning out in the order named. You will readily see that it is out of the question that any dispute should occur on the parade ground, and the Governor still hopes that your Brigade will take its place next after the Catholic Cadets at the Review in honour of His Majesty. Mr. Parmlter went across the harbor in her yesterday. She is on exhibition at Knowling's upper wharf.

Fire Last Night

Destroys Chinese Laundry and Private Residence.

At 8.45 last evening a fire broke out in the Chinese Laundry, on Gower Street, occupied by John Lee but owned by Charley Fong. Lee's laundry occupied the lower flat with a shop in front and a drying and washing room in the rear, and Mrs. Miller and her family occupy the two flats overhead. The fire was a spectacular one, as a few moments after the outbreak the whole building was enveloped in flames which illuminated the harbor. Friday it was the Chinese' busy night, and several hundreds of dollars worth of laundry was being handled on the premises. Mr. Fred. Udle turned in the alarm from Box 17, and in a couple of minutes the Eastern and Central firemen with hose reels, ladders, and other apparatus were on the scene, and in an incredibly short space of time they had four powerful streams of water playing on the burning fabric over which the flames were shooting high in the air. They saved some of the clothes, but the rest of the laundry was lost. A strong force of police were present under Superintendent Grimes and kept the course of citizens present to the sidewalk opposite. Ladders were run up at the front of the building, and the men running up these forced an entrance to the flats occupied by Mrs. Miller and flooded the blaze out there after a hard fight. The Reserve firemen were also quickly on the scene and did excellent work. There was a good supply of water. Some Chinamen were in the laundry in the drying room when the outbreak occurred. They gave the Telegram reporter who followed them, containing accounts of how the blaze originated. Messrs. J. Vasey, tailor, and J. J. Brown were in the building at the time, and the latter thinks that clothing hanging over the stove in the drying room ignited and caused the blaze. In a couple of minutes it communicated with a loud explosion followed sending glass flying across the street with the shutters on the windows, and sending sheets of flame from the opposite houses. Two or three men narrowly escaped being cut with the flying glass and had to retreat from the tongues of fire which darted across the street. Gunners Mates, Gibson and Wilson, of H. M. S. Brilliant, were in Mrs. Miller's house when suddenly the apartment was filled with smoke, and she instantly fire burst up through the floors. Three children, a boy aged 6, and a girl aged 3, slept on the upper flat. The boy ran upstairs and the children over to Mr. Vasey's, opposite just in the nick of time. Had they not acted so promptly their escape must have been cut off. They followed the stairs through which they had come were a roaring mass of flame. Citizens helped willingly and removed furniture of Mr. C. Norbury, Mr. Chapin and Jas. Baird. Baird's and Chapin's house is badly damaged by smoke and water. The Chinese laundry, which was situated back and front, and Mrs. Miller's above is in a similar state and rendered uninhabitable. All her furniture was destroyed, and the unfortunate woman is ruined as she carried not a cent of insurance. Only a few days ago she had installed several pieces of new furniture, and she reckons her loss at least \$400. The fire was quickly observed on board H. M. S. Brilliant and Capt. Woolcombe sent out a squad. Soon one hundred of these were at the King's Wharf, and in command of Capt. Woolcombe and Lieut. Picham and Lt. Col. Macdonald proceeded to the scene at double quick and on arrival there Capt. Woolcombe tendered the services of his men to the firemen in extinguishing the flames. The naval men who had fire apparatus with them remained on the scene until the fire was out, and the marines were given different positions on the street where they stood with rifle and bayonet acting as sentries and keeping order in the crowd. The men also brought a fire engine, and this was kept at the King's jetty to be available at a moment's notice should any other work be required. The action of the naval authorities was highly praised by citizens generally.

Men of all denominations composed the original committee, and men of all denominations are now completing it, unasked and unsolicited, for the Christian Brothers and orphan children. 

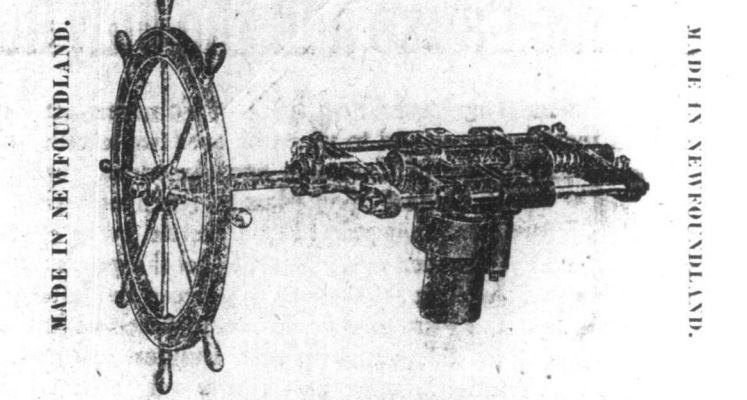
