These came on the scene with Orange bannerettes, armed with revolvers, which they began to use the moment the trouble started. They took up their position in an unreserved area on a raised bank, at the end of the grounds, where they formed a solid mass. Long before the game started they freely gave expression to their desire to "Kick the Pope." When the visiting teams had lined up they continued their insults and unfurled a hundred of Orange banners. When the Celtic Club banner appeared its bearer was knocked down and brut-ally kicked, and it would have been too much to expect other sympathizers to look quietly on. Soon there were thousands mixed up in the


