A Blunder and a Fraud.

An excellent article appears in the People, which we republish elsewhere in this issue, on the abandonment of the Morris Government of the Experimental Farm. It expresses views to which we have frequently given currency in our columns, and exposes the drama of incompetence and folly of which the final act was the sale of the Experimental Station. The writer deprecates the way the agricultural problem is being treated by the institution and administration of a policy which is a means of employment and payment to party men for services rendered. There is much point in this. The policy has been used to provide salaries for three members of the Morris Party in the House of Assembly, to pay a whole army of secretaries scattered throughout the country, and to provide innumerable sops for a host of party hangers. The money which was originally meant for experiments to find out by trial, crops, stocks and manures suitable for Newfoundland has been wantonly wasted as political sops. Experiments on the station were immediately abandoned, trial crops ploughed in, cattle bought by the Government and sold to butchers, and finally the station was sold. We agree with the writer in the People that it is not only a poor way of treating a great question, but a way that is essentially wrong and unjust, and

Stories of Pope Pius IX.

The Lady Who Told the Pontiff She Wished He Were Dead.

Lady Paget in the Nineteenth Century has a chapter of recollections dealing with life in Rome during the first years of completely united Italy, when Lady Paget's husband was British ambassador to the Quirinal. Among her stories are some of Pope Pius IX., which show that pontiff in a most amiable light. Though the Pope had twice excommunicated the king, they really loved each other, says Lady Paget, "for they were made of the same kind of stuff, and both belonged emphatically to the days that are past and gone. Impulsive in action, prescient and generous of temperament, they allowed themselves the luxury of sometimes letting their feelings deviate from what others might consider the strict path of duty."

When King Victor Emmanuel died his chaplain, against all rules, gave him absolution for everything, though he was under the major excommunication. The Pope sent for the priest, inquired most feelingly about the king's last moments, and when the chaplain confessed Pius IX., with tears in his eyes, cried: "Hai fatto bene! Hai fatto bene!" ("You have done well! You have done well!")

Another story illustrates Pius IX.'s sense of humor. It concerns Menele Corcelles, the wife of the ambassador to the Vatican, a delightful old lady, who often visited Lady Paget, in spite of prohibitions. "For," she declared, "I am the granddaughter of L'arayette, and I do what I please." She never addressed the cardinals as eminence, but hailed them in chispy tones as her "dear cardinals." When one day she visited Pius IX. he asked her whether she had seen all the sights of Rome. "Yes, holy father," she replied, "but I should dearly like to see a conclave."

This story was told by the pontiff himself.

The Lord's Day Alliance.

The friends and supporters of the Lord's Day Alliance must have met an unusually embarrassing and painful experience last night at the more than ordinary amount of awkwardness displayed by its chosen representatives.

While we take exception to Bishop Jones in giving to this child of paganism (Sunday), the appellation of the "English Sunday," we admire the frankness and good sense, as well as the Christian spirit manifested in his aversion to religious legislation.

The true spirit of the L. D. A. was, however, revealed in the address of the learned gentleman from Canada who, though endeavouring hard to represent the L. D. A. as having a real interest in, and desire for, the welfare of the laboring man, by seeking to aid him with a day of rest, stultified himself by showing its avowed determination to compel the observance of that day as a religious institution. The serpent which, possessed with venomous sting, has been concealed in the grass, now reveals itself to the people of Newfoundland, who, we believe, are too wise to fonde it, knowing that poison is in its fangs.

If, as these gentlemen argue, it is wholly to defend the interests of the laboring man that they desire a day of rest, why not leave it to the decision of any company or corporation to choose which particular day that shall be, whether Sunday or any other day of the week?

That the L. D. A. has for its avowed purpose the endorsement of Sunday as a religious institution, can no longer be denied.

But, granting this premise, it is unquestionably religious legislation, which is in turn a union of Church and State, that unholy wedlock which has its history written in the blood of the martyrs of the Dark Ages.

Are the people of Newfoundland to be duped by these would be spiritual advisers, into yielding up the liberty so dearly bought by their ancestors?

O Liberty, so dearly bought, art thou! Though thousands shed their blood for thee to win thee O sweet Liberty, yet men forsake thee now.

Was it indeed the spirit of the meek and lowly Jesus in the L. D. A. of Canada, that threatened their American settlers with an invasion of the West Mounted Police for desecration of the so-called Lord's Day? If our clerical friends of the L. D. A. would use the sword of the Spirit which is the Word of God, rather than that of Caesar, they would not need to cling to the arm of the State for power. LONDON, Sept. 16. According to the Chronicle's Belfast correspondent, there is political significance in Saturday's football riots, and accounts of the "fair" as sent over the wires broadcast are likely to convey an erroneous idea, says the Chronicle. Celtic Park, where the match was played is at the extreme end of the Nationalist's quarters. During the week there were rumors of possible trouble, but no one paid serious attention to them. It now transpires that the whole affair was organized among members of the Unionist Club in the Belfast shipyards. These came on the scene with Orange bannettes, armed with revolvers, which they began to use the moment the trouble started. They took up their position in an unreserved area on a raised bank, at the end of the grounds, where they formed a solid mass. Long before the game started they freely gave expression to their desire to "kick the Pope." When the visiting teams had lined up they continued their insults and unfired a hundred of Orange banners. When the Celtic Club banner appeared its bearer was knocked down and brutally kicked, and it would have been too much to expect other sympathizers to look quietly on. Soon the workers' thousands mixed up in the scuffle.

The Daily Mail, Tory organ, says editorially: "While we are most anxious to in no way exaggerate the importance of this encounter, it was unquestionably a political riot, and not an ordinary fight between partisans of the football club. Popular passion of Belfast may pass beyond control, and it is clear Churchill now realizes that the Home Rule Bill cannot be forced through in its present form."

BELFAST, Sept. 16.

Queen's Isle shipyard was the scene of another outbreak of sectarianism this morning. Several artisans were badly handled. Excitement in the shipyards in which the largest number of employees are engaged, has risen to fever heat. Many men refused to work to-day at Harland and Wolfe's plant. Only a few Catholics are working in the other yards, as the managers last week advised against them returning to work on account of the feeling of the Protestants against them. The military which had been confined to barracks, since Saturday's disturbance at Celtic Park football ground, was ordered to-day, to keep peace.

LONDON, Sept. 16.

The retirement of Sir Montagu Allan has led to the discussion in shipping circles here, as to whether the C. P. R. will openly absorb the administration of the Allan Line. The two next Allan steamers of 17,000 tons, turbines, will be ready in next season, should in conjunction with the two new C. P. R. 15,000 ton turbines on the Pacific, place a joint through service, and put them in a position to command a complete coasting trade between British and Canadian Governments for mails and admiralty purposes.

HELGOLAND, Sept. 16.

The North Sea German Imperia fleet, comprising 22 battleships, 4 large and 1 small cruisers, torpedo boats and a number of auxiliary vessels was reviewed on this island this morning by the German Emperor. A. The conclusion of the review His Majesty accompanied the fleet to see where manoeuvres occupying four days, will be held. A Zeppelin dirigible balloon, with 16 passengers will need the review.

TOKIO, Sept. 16.

The document is dated Sept. 12th, 22 hours previous to taking his life, and indicates the death of the Countess had not been decided upon when the instrument was prepared. Nogai distributed his property among his wife and friends, and makes donations to a number of public institutions. The Port Arthur hero suggests that his body be given to the medical college, only his teeth, hair and nails to be buried.

Special Evening Telegram.
PARIS, To-day.

The basis of the proposed peace settlement between Turkey and Italy includes the tacit acceptance by the Porte of the Italian occupation of Tripoli as an accomplished fact. Turkey is permitted to retain a Mediterranean port at one of the extremes of Libya, with a strip of territory, allowing of communication with the Arabs of the interior. Provision is also made for the recognition of the spiritual suzerainty of the Sultan in Tripolitania, for the payment of monetary grants to Arab chiefs by Italy, and also for the payment to Turkey, annually of certain amounts towards the burden of the national debt, the payment being guaranteed by the revenues derived from Libya, and for the cession to Turkey of some portion of the Italian territory in the Red Sea as compensation for the loss of Tripoli. The Italian delegates objected to the suggestion of a retrocession of a part of Massowah and as a consequence this may be eliminated from the terms of settlement. The status of the Aigian Islands, seized by Italy, has not been raised, as Italy is aware that the Powers would not agree to their retention by Italy.

TOKIO, To-day.

Admiral Togo visited the death chamber in which the body of the late Count Nogai was laid, and remained a long time kneeling deeply affected. The Lord Chamberlain, representing the Emperor, also paid homage to the dead general.

Waste in Fisheries.

A Paper Read Before the Council of the Board of Trade on the Question of Fishery Offal and the Treatment of the Dog-Fish Pest.

Mr. President and Gentlemen.—With your permission I respectfully submit for the consideration of this Council some thoughts relating to the question of the waste and by-products of our fisheries and the finding of a commercial value for non-food fish such as Dogfish, Sculpin, Rays, etc. For some time past I have been giving some study to the principles underlying this problem, and the possibility of applying scientific methods and investigation with a view of creating a commercial value for the enormous quantity of waste now going on in connection with every branch of our fisheries, and although I admit that from a practical standpoint I have not made much progress in detail, still I have been led on by the study of the waste of our fisheries and other resources to a fuller consideration of the larger and more vital problems that affect the Colony's future. I recognize that a paper dealing with the many phases of our industrial life would require far more consideration and time than busy men could devote to it at this season of the year. But as this

Terrible Dogfish Pest
is uppermost in the minds of every man who takes an interest in public affairs, I venture to invite your consideration of this paper to-day. I feel that it is fitting and desirable in the interests of the Colony to have such important matters as the subjects dealt with in this paper subjected to the searching, and I feel sure friendly criticism of this Council. In this Board are gathered the representatives from every Branch of our Trade and Commerce, we meet here free from the many questions that may divide us commercially, socially, and politically, and we find in this Council a common non-partisan platform for the discussion of vital questions that affect the people, the trade, and the natural resources of Newfoundland. It should be the duty of every well-wisher of the Colony to see that this Board of Trade increases in membership, in power and influence so that the hands of all properly constituted authorities should be strengthened or restrained by the proper and just exercise of this recognized medium of public opinion. I hope to see the day that this Board will be so enlarged as to embrace the rising generation of

Young Business Men
who are coming up to the front in every part of Newfoundland, and that every effort will be made to have these rooms made a friendly meeting place, a sort of mid-day club, where all business men, especially out-port business men can during their visits to St. John's drop into these rooms and feel at home, write their letters and telegrams, and meet their conferees without any feeling or fear of an assumed superiority on the part of any person.

this difficulty, but as a layman I think there is a

Terrible Waste Going On
in the loss of the carcasses. It seems absurd for a steamer capable of carrying 50,000 seals coming to port with any 20,000 and leaving 20,000 carcasses behind. However, with the advent of the improving types of new steamers and the steady decline of the fishery, it is certain that the solution of the question of waste as far as the Seal Fishery is concerned is at hand, because the extinction of the herd will solve the problem. If we read the history of the Pacific Seal Herds we will be forced to the conclusion that unless the Legislature, Ship Owners, and Fishermen agree on new Legislation, this valuable industry is doomed. On the 2nd of the Victoria Sealing Company voluntary offered for sale at public auction in Victoria, B.C., thirty-five vessels, that were engaged by them in the Pacific Seal Herd industry. The sale of this fine fleet of sealing ships should be a note of warning to all interested in this branch of our fisheries.

If we consider the Cod fishery we see another example of waste. First the entrails are often thrown into the sea to "pollute the grounds, and the choicest parts of the fish such as the head, tongue, roes, are thrown away as waste. Then again we have the waste of the Lobster fishery. If we recognize the principle that in the economy of nature, there is no such thing as waste, surely there must be as in the Mussel Shell some commercial value in the

Shell of the Lobster.
It is difficult to believe that such a secular substance as a Lobster Shell does not contain some chemical ingredients that only want the magic touch of the scientist to give it value. An impartial consideration of these questions leaves no doubt on the candid mind but that there is a great waste going on. Some of our merchants have recognized this, and with that spirit of enterprise that compels our admiration they tried at their own cost to solve this problem, their efforts resulting in failure, it was found that the cost of collecting the shell, or waste from the fishery stations was greater than any of its by products.

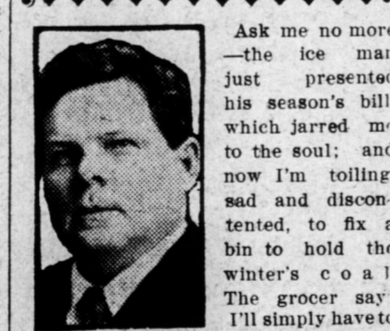

Beam Trawling Controversy.

The resolution of Congressman Gardner calling for an investigation of beam trawling and carrying an appropriation of \$5,000 for expenses, passed both houses of Congress on Aug. 23. The resolution was as follows:

Resolved, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that the Commission of Fisheries be, and is hereby, authorized and directed to make an investigation into the method of fishing known as beam trawling and to report to Congress whether or not this method of fishing is destructive to the fish species or is otherwise harmful or undesirable.

Sec. 2. That in the event that the Commissioner of Fisheries finds this method of fishing to be destructive, harmful or undesirable, he shall recommend to Congress such legislation as he may deem necessary.

Sec. 3. That an appropriation is hereby authorized for carrying into effect the provisions of this resolution.

F. G. Robinson, secretary of the Boston fishermen's committee, has issued an open letter to the press in reply to a defence of beam trawling by John R. Neal, which was published recently in the Boston "Post." Mr. Robinson says:

While there is no trouble to quote from scientists' opinions that were formed years ago before there was time to definitely determine the amount of damage done by this method of fishing (opinions that would not hold good now, and at that time were apparently sound and were in defence of this method of catching fish) at the present day, with the data at hand from the English government reports, it is very easy to see that those opinions were formed erroneously.

For instance, Mr. Neal says: "These commissions and noted scientists agree that there is not the slightest danger that man can reduce the supply of fish in the ocean. The natural enemies do more to destroy fish than man ever has or ever can, according to the reports of these men who have given the matter special study." To prove the fallacy of this statement, I will ask the general public to consider for one minute the following facts:

First, it is conceded that before the white man landed on these shores there were plentiful, even right in our harbors. Since this country became populated by the white men, who put devices into the water for catching fish, they have gradually decreased in number. While there is more fish landed to-day than ever before, the distance they have to go for them, and the immense increase in the fishing gear, has become extremely large in the number of vessels and fishing tackle used, has been responsible for that increase of fish landed.

The same amount of fishing gear, and same number of men and vessels used in a similar way 50 years ago, without doubt, would have produced five or ten times as many fish as they do at the present day, and I would ask the public if it is not a little peculiar that when the Indians alone occupied this continent, and there were no natural enemies to the fish, that there is at the present day, that the food fish increased instead of being devoured by the natural enemies, and is if not a little peculiar that the fish became extremely numerous just as soon as white men commenced to employ his methods of capture?

When our forefathers landed on these shores, they could catch as many brook trout in an hour as they could lug on their backs from almost any stream in New England. Twenty years ago brook trout was almost extinct in New England brooks. To-day the Massachusetts Fish Commission are hatching brook trout, turning them loose in certain brooks, and prohibiting man from fishing in those brooks for a certain number of years, in those streams that are protected brook trout become plentiful, and in all streams that are not protected they are what the fishermen call "fished out" and almost absolutely dry of trout.

No doubt, our friends, the exponents of the beam trawler, will tell us that the natural enemies of brook trout can read the signs "Fishing prohibited in this brook" so they did not destroy brook trout when the States says they shall not be caught, but I would like to ask the public why our Massachusetts Fish and Game Commission and our legislators on Beacon Hill have gone so far astray as to prohibit man from catching brook trout when man can do nothing to appreciably diminish the supply of fish?

What applies to our brook trout also applies to our deep sea fishing, and the beam trawler is a hundred times more destructive to small, immature fish as well as spawning fish than the sportsman's rod and fly can possibly be in our trout brooks.

The fishermen court a good, thorough investigation, and are very sorry to see that our National House of Representatives has one dissenting voice to an appropriation that will bring to light the actual facts from interested parties. For this appropriation can only mean a tax of a very small fraction of a mill to the individual in the United States to give this very important cheap food supply of the common people investigated and protected for the common people if they find it necessary, and we feel sure that the gentlemen in Congress who voted against this appropriation did so not thinking of the importance of this conservation to the food fish supply of the nation.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette.
