THREE CHILDREN BURNED TO DEATH.

At three o'clock yesterday afternoon, Deputy Minister of Justice Hutchings, had a message to the effect that the house of Frank Jones, of Grey River, in the District of Burgess and LaPelle, was destroyed by fire on Sunday night last, and that three children were burned to death. It is supposed that the school teacher of the settlement, who boarded in the house, made her escape. A message similar to the above was received by the Customs Dept.

The funeral of the late Mr. Frederick Burnham, took place yesterday afternoon from his late residence, Military Road, and was largely attended. Amongst the mourners were most of our prominent merchants, members of the Legislative Council and members of the House of Assembly, employees of Hon. George Knowling, besides many friends and relatives of the deceased. At the Cathedral Rev. Dr. Greene recited the prayers for the dead. Interment was in the family plot in Belvidere Cemetery.


Lords of Misrule.

In mediaeval times there was a master of Christmas revels, who was known as the Lord of Misrule. This merry person was, for the time being, "monarch of all he surveyed," and everyone was forced to do his bidding. Stowe tells us that, "In the feast of Christmas there was in the King's House, wheresoever he lodged, a Lord of Misrule, or master of merry sports, and the like had ye in the house of every nobleman of honour and good worship were he spiritual or temporal."

The Lord Mayor and Sheriffs of London had also their Lords of Misrule, and even in the homes of the more humble folk someone was usually appointed to play the part of King during Christmas.

These mock-monarchs began their sovereignty on All Hallow's Eve, and ruled—or, if you prefer it, misruled—till Christmas. In Scotland they were known as Abbots of Unreason, but were suppressed by a special Act in 1555.

In Tudor times their reign was marked by much costly display, so much so that in the Christmas of 1561, a Lord of Misrule rode through London followed by one hundred gentlemen on horseback hung with gold chains.

The Disastrous Colliery Explosion

So terrible is the disaster at the Universal Colliery, which lies near a tributary at the Rhymney, amongst the barren hills of East Glamorgan-shire, that the whole industry must be reduced to a numbed silence. The immensity of this calamity—the greatest, numerically, that has ever visited the British coalfields—coming at a time when science has half promised us that to-morrow shall see the end of all colliery explosions, stuns and bewilders. Pity and grief for the time must be supreme; but the energy and heroism of the rescuers, some of the best stuff that Wales possesses, give the first trumpet call to renew the battle, and, whatever errors may lie hidden for the present with the dead men behind the wall of fire at Senghenydd, we can, at least hope that they may direct us nearer the truth, and so be the means of saving generations of pitmen yet to come.

America, Once Sea-Queen, May Sail Over the Cup Course Again.

Boston, December 13.—Sixty-two years ago last August, the schooner yacht America, won the famous trophy bearing her name in a race round the Isle of Wight, 17 vessels competing.

The America, now practically forgotten, is to be sailed round the course, when the Shamrock IV, battles the defender off Sandy Hook next fall.

This sensational statement was made here in a gathering of yachtsmen. The Hon. Butler Ames, owner of the schooner, will, it is expected, loan the old war horse for a spectacle that should attract a multitude of yachtsmen.

The yacht can be placed in trim at small outlay of time and money, it is believed. A sailing master and crew may be secured without much difficulty for the series that is to settle the destiny of the blue ribbon trophy of the sea—for a year, at least.

The America is now moored at Summer Street bridge, near the South station. She is housed under a shed that conceals deck and structures. Little more than the spars and the ornate stern are visible. The fabric is as weather-stained and unkempt as the nearby hulks that rot and rise and fall with the tides. Once a week a caretaker from a suburban town crawls under the shed and pumps the schooner's bilge. Otherwise the once-queen of the sea is neglected.

When Gen. E. F. Butler owned the America, following tragic experiences in southern waters during the war, Capt. "Jim" Reed was her sailing master. Capt. Reed is now a Boston pilot attached to one of the schooners that man out for incoming foreign ships. Yachtsmen interested in rejuvenating the America suggest that Capt. Reed be "borrowed" to handle

IS THE TRUE XMAS SPIRIT DEAD?

[Many writers would have us believe that it is. Christmas, they say, is no longer the season of family gatherings, of universal good-will, and of open-handed generosity. It is now looked upon merely as a wearisome function, entailing extra expenses and involving loss of much valuable time—a pessimistic theory, with which the writer of this article does not hold.]

With our hand on our heart we thank Heaven that we do not belong to the "smart set." We have been reading one or two articles on "The Mockery of Modern Christmas," "The Modern Christmas Spirit," and so forth. This kind of thing, by "Rita,"

"Look at the young. Look at them before the shop windows, only grumbling 'Same old rot' before the piles of toys which represent starvation to the unfortunate workers. Look at them at the pantomime—bored, listless, weary ere the entertainment is half over; roused only by something specially vulgar or specially up-to-date on the part of the comedian; criticising the principal's girl's figure with the insolent pretence of wise young manhood; wishing the holidays were over; unable to appreciate simple country joys; critical of gifts; impossible to please even with lavish generosity; hostile to younger brothers and sisters; insolent to parents; impatient of advice or control."

A horrible picture. We have never seen this kind of "young." We would dearly love to kick them. But with tremendous eagerness we declare that he must belong to the smart set—which is why we thank Heaven that we are not of it!

Because in the ordinary professional and trade and laboring classes neither he nor the parents he must have exist. It is about as true to say that the real spirit of Christmas is dying out as it is to say that our race is rushing on decadence and degeneration at a pace nothing can stop. There is far too much of this pessimism nowadays. We believe that the great reason why so many articles are turned out at this period of the year—assailing the decadence of the Christmas spirit, is that it is so much easier to attack an institution than it is to praise it with any sort of originality. The popular tone in writing today is to be smart, to be despairing

of anything and everything, to attack and criticize with venomous pluck. It is very, very easy and it is stupendously ridiculous. Time, changes everything. Naturally the manner of our observance of Christmas has changed. The suburban builder does not provide us with fires in which we can burn yulelogs (unless we are reckless with good cheer and heavily insured); similar reasons prevent us from indulging in the old-time "revels"—our neighbors would probably county court us for wilful disturbance if we did so; railways have made communication between members of a family so frequent that the meeting at Christmas is not an event so isolated and therefore, so hilariously joyous as it was in the coaching days.

But the spirit of Christmas remains. Walk the streets of London on the evenings before Christmas Day if you doubt the fact. Note the shops crammed to suffocation with eager buyers, mark the crowds gazing into the windows, observe the parcels with which one and all are laden, the bright faces, the laughter, the fun, the good temper. All these people are not buying gifts for themselves—they are carrying home presents for others. Hence, warmed by generosity, the universal air of good-will. And goodwill is the true spirit of Christmas, is it not?

Then there are the railway termini to visit. We doubt the old coaching yards ever to have presented so animated an appearance. And, lastly, there are the English homes themselves to observe on Christmas Day. We are convinced that if our grandfathers were more wildly delighted with their "stockings" and their presents than are our own children and nephews and nieces, each Christmas Day must have thrown them into an attack of convulsions or hysterics. The spirit of Christmas dead! Rubbish!
